ducts, but it'would appear that to this time we are not using it as we should. Inquiry develops the fact that among Houston concerns at least, there is no effort, made to produce an edible peanut meal. Special atiention is given to the oil and when that
is extracted the remainder is is extracted the remainder is
prepared only for consumptiois by the cattle of the State. There can be little doubt that peanut meal is as valuable for the use of people as is the oiband the mills are passing by a
great opportunity when they do not prepare it for that use.
With flour as high asit has been all this winter the peanut meal could be made to serve a most valuable purpose. Besides that, there are many farms in South Texas which will not grow wheat with any degree of success. But there is not a farm in the State s where the peanut will not make a
p paying crop. And if it were paying crop. And if it were
possible for the South Texas farmer to take his peanut crow to the mill, sell the oil, and have left the meal for the use of his left the meal for the use of his own family as food another step
