

GENERAL FUNSTON CLAIMED BY DEATH

Commander of Border Troops Drops Dead in Hotel Lobby at San Antonio.

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. -19. -Gen. Frederick Funston, commander of the Southern department since February, 1915, died suddenly at the St. Anthony Hotel here tonight, a few minutes after he had finished dinner. He collapsed while seated in the lobby of the hotel talking with friends and was playing with little Inez Silverberg, of Des Moines, Ijowa, a guest with her parents at the hotel, when he fell unconscious.

Death was almost instantan

General Funston was 51 years old. Ever since March, 1916, when he was placed in command of all United States forces on the Mexican border, General Funston had worked at an unusual pace. At critical times in border developments he frequently remained on duty 20 hours of the 24. The handling of regulars disposed of at various stations on the border, the Pershing expedition and, of late, rearrangements of regular troops, while providing for the return of national guardesmen, have entailed an enormous amount of detail work, probably exceeding that which fell to a general commanding the United States army since the Civil War. 

WORLD'S URGENT NEED.

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 17 .- "The world's urgent need today is for a greater food supply; its surplus is exhausted," said Mr. J. A. Kempt, of Wichita Falls, today in discussing food conditions in this country and abroad.

"The European war has withdrawn millions of men from productive labor," continued Mr. Kempt, "but they must still be fed; Poland is desolated; the people of Belgium and Northern France, partially supported by charity, are starving; Germany, Austria, France, Italy, England are all on short rations; with more than one-fourth of the world's population engaged in battle and with productive agriculture at a standstill, Europe is facing famine, and for an indefinite time must look elsewhere and chiefly to the United States-for its food supply.

"This country, also, is feeling acutely these conditions; the high cost of living has become an actual burden to thousands of our own people; no relief can be expected until this year's crops are harvested, and not even then unless weather conditions are favorable and our farmers bend all of their energies to the production primarily of foodstuffs.

MUST CLEAN UP.

The following information, which is taken from the Home and Farm, will be of interest and should engage the attention of those expecting to have dealing with the Federal Farm Loan Board:

"One of the most important rulings announced by the Federal Farm Loan Board is that no loans will be made on farm property which is not in a satisfactory sanitary condition.

"Details as to the sanitary requirements have not been announced, but it is understood that dwelling houses must be screened, privies and outdoor closets protected from flies and insects, wells and springs protected from contamination by seepage so as to insure a supply of clean water, and other precautions taken to insure tidiness and healthful conditions.

"In some respects this is a rather extraordinary ruling. A man who is so slovenly that he will not observe the most simple rules for preserving the health of himself and family does not their loan association."
