

AN AMERICAN LINER DESTROYED BY TORPEDO

WASHINGTON, April American steamer Seward was re ported topedoed and sunk without warning in the Mediterranean by a German submarine, in a dispatch to the state department today from Con-Gaulin at Marseilles. All of the crew of 31 was said to have been sav-

NEWYORK, April 9 .- The Amerian steamer steamship Seward, owned by the Alpha Steamship Company, Mediterranean ports. She was in command of Captain Philip S. Johnson, and carried a crew of 38 men, of whom 30 were American citizen, according to the shipping commissioners' record here.

The Seward was built at Seattle in 1907 and registered 3390 tons gross, 2880 tons net. She was 279 feet long with a beam of 42 feet. She carried general cargo valued at \$300,000.

MUNITIONS PLANT WAS BLOWED UP

CHESTER, Pa., April 10 .- A teriffic explosion occurred today in the great plant of the Eddystone Ammunition Corporation at Eddystone, Pa., a mile from this city, and a veritable hail of flying shrapnel was reported to have killed at least 100 persons, and injured at least 200 more. It is suspected the explosion was not due to an accident.

A majority of the dead and injured are women and young girls. The morgue and hospitals are filled, while the sidewalks in front of the little morgue is piled high with mangled

TIMPSON CITY MARSHAL

Timpson Times, Monday. City Marshal E. A. Booth was called to the negro settlement of town last night to quell a disturbance between a couple of negro men. The negroes had gotten into a row, and one of them. George Miller King, told the other that he was going to kill him, and he secured a shot-gun to carry out his threat. When Mr. Booth and his deputy, Hager Hooker, arrived upon the scene, King was on the watch for his enemy. Mr. Booth proceeded to arrest the negro, and when he spoke to him the negro pointed the gun at Mr. Booth with the threat that he would just as soon kill him as anybody else. The marshal and his deputy were just a little too quick for the negro, however, and now he is "laid up for repairs" with three bullet wounds. The officers were perfectly justificable in shooting the negro.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, April 9, via London.-The Ill., writes the following letter: British Monday delivered a strong blow against the Germans from the region southwest of Cambrai to a point south of Lens. An advance of from two to three miles was made by the British on a front extending from Henin-sur-Cojeul. southwest of Arras, to Givenchy-Joel, a distance of about twelve miles.

The official report from 'army headquarters in France makes this announcement Monday night, and adds that the advance continues. The famous Vimy Ridge was carried by the Canadian troops.

by the following figures:

In 1911, the United States-Bureau of Labor found that wholesale prices were 44.1 per cent higher than they were in 1897. With this statement as a working basis, a salary of \$693.73 in 1897, had as great a purchasing power as a salary of \$1000 in 1911. If teachers were paid in consumable commodities at market prices today instead of slary checks, it is likely that they would receive less at the end of each month under such a system than they would have in 1900.

The failure of the teachers' salary to keep pace with the increasing cost of living has compelled many strong men to abandon the profession. This has opened the door to a flood of inefficient boys and girls who are admitted into our schools as teachers. Considering their 'educational ideals and the character of much of the service rendered in the schools it is not improbable that many of them are extravagantly overpaid today notwithstanding the very small salaries they receive. There are some teachers in the service in Texas today who, if paid at all, are paid too much. Better salaries for better teachers, I think, would operate to remove many of these incapable persons from the state's pay-roll.

In Denmark, 82 per cent of the rural teachers are men. The best men of the nation do not hesitate to go into the teaching profession for life. In Texas, business, medicine, law and politics are claiming many of the strong men the school-room should the average Texas teacher gets. GRANT'S TOMB.

Grant's tomb on Riverside Drive, at 123d street occupies a commanding site over-looking the Hudson, and is itsef a conspicuous object in the river view It was designed by John H. Dun can, and is constructed of white granite from Maine with white marble interior. The proportions are imposing. The square structure is 90 feet on the side and 72 feet in height. The circular cupulo with Ionic columns is 70 feet in diameter, and the dome rises 150 feet from the ground. The Apex of the monument is 280 feet above the river.

From the plaza on the south side steps 70 feet wide, ascend to the portico, which has double lines of Doric columns before the entrance with its massive bronze doors. Above the portico two sculptured figures emblamatic of peace and war, flank a panel, on which are inscribed the words: Let us have peace. (You who have studied the lifeof Grant will remember). This was the concluding sentence of General Grant's letter of May 29, 1868, accepting the nomination for the Presidency. It was the expression of his earnest desire for reconciliation between the North and South.

The history phrase was well chosen for perpetuation here. The Civil War was a conflict be tween brothers, the termination meant the restoration of the union. 


