MORE THAN HALF A MILLION VOLUNTEER

American Citizens are Rallying to Every Department of the Service of the Country

Washington, June 24.-More than a half million men have volunteered in the American army and navy during the period less than three months that have just elapsed since war was declared to exist. The army, navy and national guard represented an aggregate strength of little more than 300,000 men when the war resolution was adopted. Today between 700,-000 and 800,000 men are enrolled in the various branches of the fighting service, and the great majority of them are armed, equipped and under training. They will be joined at the end of the summer by nearly a million men selected for the new national army from the millions registered for war duty on June

AMERICA MUST PAY AN ENORMOUS PRICE

Atlanta, Ga., June 20 .- The diligence. They are not doing "Apathetic Spirit of the American People in Regard to the War," was the keynote of an address here Wednesday by Maj. Gen. Leonard A. Wood, commander of the southeastern department, U. S. A., before the eighth annual meeting of the International Association of Rotary Clubs. The nation, he said, has not yet awakened to the fact that "we are fighting a powerful foe, and the quicker we realize that sacrifices must be made in order to win the war, the quicker the war will end." With soldier's bluntness, General Wood told the delegates America would win in the ent, but "not until a terrific price has been paid in blood."

General Wood's address late Wednesday closed the regular business session, and the delegates journey Wednesday night to East Lake, one of Atlanta's country clubs, where they were given a supper.

Rotarians Wednesday devoted their general discussions chiefly to the war and the part the international association will be called upon to play.
