the erection of the building.

They cold-bloodedly figure that if they can frighten the American people, if they can make them unduly uneasy about the fate of our boys, if they can make them weary of the war before we are really in it at the firing front, they will have prepared a soil fertile for the spread of German peace propaganda.

And that is precisely what the kaiser and his Prussian war-makers want. They want an America that will listen to peace talk without being too critical, too skeptical, too sus picious. They want an Ameri ca that they can lure into their peace spider-trap. They realize that they have lost the objects for which they went to war. They have not crushed France. They have not defeated England. They have not taken Paris not Calais. They have not starved the allies into submission. They have not swept allied ships off the seas with their murderous submarines.

In the meantime Germany is getting hungrier and hungrier. her finances are becoming ever more precarious, her losses in men are mounting ever higher, her industry is going ever more to the dogs, her people are beginning to wonder whether, after all, the kaiser is quite a heavensent leader.



October 5. -Five reasons for selecting and saving double the usual amount of seed corn in the localities where the corn crop is maturing in good condition, are put forth by the United States Department of Agriculture for the consideration of farmers in a statement issued today. The Department believes that much more than the usual acreage of corn will be planted next spring and that now is the best surest, and easiest time to get the necessary seed. The five reasons for increasing the seed corn supply

1. First-class seed corn is scarce almost every spring.

2. Extended plantings and replanting practically exhausted the hold-over supply last FIGHTING TONNAGE June.

3. In some sections this year's crop has been destroyed by drought or early frosts. Farmers of these sections should now arrange to secure their own.

4. In the localities favored with a crop this year, next year's crop may be destroyed, and there should now be selected a supply of locally adapted seed for 1918 and a hold-over supply for the 1919 planting.


