

SHERIFF AND DEPUTY WERE EXONERATED

Sheriff Has Been Restored To Office With Four Indictments Quashed.

When Attorneys Beeman Strong, Moss Adams and Geo. S. King entered the contest of the trials in the special term of district court, called for the purpose yesterday, the criminal charges against Sheriff Prince and Deputy Sheriff Sweb Myers vanish: ed like a fog before a noonday sun, and likewise the civil action has been withdrawn.

The first motion of counsel of defense was a challenge of the authority of the court, alleging that it was without authority. by reason of the lack of proper advertising. Judge Guinn overruled this plea and forced the cases to trial, when counsel challenged the jurisdiction of the court, pleading that if an offense had been committed against the state of Texas it would be up to the state authorities to file the complaint in Travis county. 

SUFFERS ACCIDENT

The following report of a serious accident suffered by Dr. navy are the fighting arms. As Geo. H. Turner, a well known physician of the county, is taken from this week's issue of the

Garrison News: "While crossing the railroad track Wednesday night in front of the residence of Mr. J. B. Craig, Dr. G. H. Turner in some way killed his automobile engine, and being unable to start it, left the car and started up the track in the direction of Timpson to flag a freight train which was coming in, and fell off the trestle. Mr. Jim Williams ran up the track and flagged the train and prevented its striking the automobile. 
