Mr. Johnson has been placed under bond on a charge of negligent homicide pending an examing trial which will be held within the next few days.

The remains of the dead man were embalmed and prepared for burial by the undertaking department of Cason, Monk & Co., and will be shipped to Tyler this afternoon for burial. Mr. W. The chancellor said British, French and Mohammedan representatives were on the way to Jerusalem to safeguard the holy

Turks Lose Heavily.

Early in November the Britsh activity resulted in the capture of Beersheba, 40 miles south of Jerusalem. Simultaneously a coastal column became active. By November 7 the city of Gaza was in their hands and the British were pursuing the Turks northward after having inicted casualties estimated as in excess of 10,000.





In connection with experiments with the drying of squid an article of food, the United States bureau of fisheries has made several determinations of the water, nitrogen, ash and fat and ascertained the time of artificial digestion. UNIVERSITY ATTENDANCE.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 5 .- It is interesting to note that Nacogdo ches county has contributed 10 students to the University of Texas at the present session, out of a total of 1760 now in the student body. Of this total number 38 are from other states and countries. This is a falling off. of 6 students from Nacogdoches county as compared with last year's record, and a decrease of 3 students as compared with the attendance from Nacogdoches county in 1915-16. It is possible that this decrease may be made up during the winter and spring terms at the University.

In point of attendance Travis county leads all others in the state, as is quite natural, the total number of students from that county-being 378 this year, as compared with 554 last year and 498 in 1915-16. The next county in point of attendance is Bexar county, in which San Antonio is situated, its contribution to. the University this year being 93 students, as compared with 146 students last year, and 148 students in 1915-16. There are numerous diseases that affect the sweet potato. There is no one set method of keeping these diseases in control, because we find them attacking the potato in the seed bed, in the field and in storage. The black rot is probably the severest, but the same treatments practically hold true for them all.

First of all we must be sure of our seed and our seed bed. Select good, sound, healthy seed, and to guard against possible infection immerse them for 10 to 15 minutes in 8 or 10 gallons of water containing 1 oz. of formaldehyde. A formaldehyde solution will also serve as a disinfectant for the seed bed, 1 pint of formaldehyde to 20 gallons of water being the proper dilution. Use this at the rate of one gallon per square foot of the seed bed. Cover the seed bed for 12 hours with canvas in order that the formaldehyde fumes will have ample time to penetrate the soil.

The black rot as well as other potato diseases may easily be carried over from one year to another in the field. The infecting agents or germs will live on potato roots and in the soil itself, besides causing infection to allied plants of the sweet potato, such as the wild morning glory. Keeping the fields clean is therefore necessary in eliminating infection in the field. The sterilization of the seed and the seed bed prove of very little value when the field, where the slipe are to be planted, has produced an abundance of diseased potatoes year after year.

Successive planting on the same land year after year will almost always yield diseased potatoes. Rotation in growing sweet potatoes is therefore necessary. Keeping the potatoes healthy in storage is another problem. A uniform temperaheit, is least favorable to the development of black rot, and is therefore more favorable to the sound keeping of potatoes in the storage house. A fluctuating temperature in the presence of sufficient moisture is conducive to the germination of the disease We wish to extend our grate- snores. Before storing the po-

To eliminate other danger of potato rotting in storage, it is best to dig the potatoes before a wet spell of weather. This is done in order that a "sappy" crop will not be harvested, in which case the potatoes will be rendered more susceptible to rot. For further information address inquiries to this depart-
