Congress Adopts Resolution to Submit National Prohibition to the Several States

Washington, Dec. 17.-The resolution to submit to the states a national prohibition amendment to the federal constitution was adopted late today by the house.

With a vote of two-thirds required for its approval, the vote of the house, announced by Speaker Clark, was 282 to 128, or 25 more than required.

Washington, De. 12 .- Representative Dies today declared his intention of voting against both the constitutional amendment providing for national prohibition and the woman's suffrage amendment. He said:

"Unless the administration which is charged with the successful conduct of the war makes it known that in these disturbed times it believes it wise to launch all the states of the union into a heated controversy over prohibition and woman suffrage I shall vote against both of them. If a turmoil of debate upon these questions carried on all over the country will put to rout a single German or aid in any way in bringing victory to the United States in the world war, then I will vote for either or both of the amendments. But it is my judgment that this is hardly the time for launching these quesions when the nation should be centering its thought upon the defeat of Prussianism."-




