Two soldiers, members of the military police detachment of the 57th Infantry (regulars) on duty at Goose Creek, were shot and badly wounded at 1 o'clock Tuesday morning as they stood in front of A. S. Hall's barber shop, on the main street of Midde Town. Hall is in the county jail here, charged with assault to murder, but in an interview

denied the shooting. At 3 o'clock Tuesday morning an ambulance was sent from Camp Logan to bring the wounded soldiers to the base hospital. En route it broke down, and another had to be sent. At a result of this mishap the wounded men did not reach the base hospital until after 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

The shooting followed a complaint a citizen of Goose Creek made to the military police, this citizen alleging that Hall had made threats against him. Military policemen, it was said, went to Hall's barber shop and knocked down the door. A noise was heard inside, and then a shot was fired.




