SABINE CO. SHERIFF KILLED LAST NIGHT

Father and Other Relatives Reside in this City. Several Going to Hemphill Today.

From Wednesday's Daily. Last night, Mr. J. Bright, a well known citizen and grocery merchant of this city, received a message bearing the sad news that his son, Mr. B. C. Bright, sheriff of Sabine county, had been killed at Milam, a country town of that county.

Owing to the distress occasioned by the sadness of the message, full details of the tratragedy were not obtained, but it is presumed that he was killed by a negro while trying to place him under arrest. 
