DUBLIN .- Raids for arms are continuing in Ireland and some are reported daily. As a RECEIVES-MEDAI rule the Sinn Feiners meet with no resistance in commandeering whatever weapons are discoverable in a raided house. But occasionally the owners fight and the raiders suffer. An attack was made recently by six armed men with blackened faces; on a woman's house at Farbane. A retired army officer living in the house captured two of the raiders and drove the others away. The prisoners were committed for trial to the Assize.

In a case near Tulsk, in Roscommon, a party of men with blackened faces raided a farmer's house in search of arms. They demanded his gun, and when he refused, dragged him out and handled him roughly. He escaped into the house and finding his jun turned it against his assailants, who fled.

The weapons seized by the Sinn Reiners are in many instances seized by the police in counter raids. The other day several shot guns and ammunition were found in Tipperary. 

Fresh Beef Travels on a Rapid Schedule

Fresh beef for domestic markets goes from stockyards to retail stores within a period of about two weeks. Although chilled, this meat is not frozen; hence it cannot be stored for a rise in price.

A steer is dressed usually within twenty-four hours after purchase by the packer. The beef is held in a cooler at the packing house, at a temperature a little above freezing, for about three days.

It is then loaded into a refrigerator car where a similar temperature is maintained, and is in transit to market on an average of about six days.

Upon arrival at the branch distributing house, it is unloaded into a "cooler", and placed on sale.

Swift & Company requires all beef to be sold during the week of arrival, and the average of sales is within five days.

Any delay along the above journey means deterioration in the meat and loss to the packer.

BRITISH FLYING SQUADRON TURNS TABLES ON HUNS

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, July 20 .- How a British flying squadron turned the tables on German airmen who had been bombing their aero dome is related by Lieutenant W. A. Barnes of the Royal Air Force.

"We had been giving the Hun a lively time," the officer says, bombing his dumps, billets, com munications and towns nightly. When, therefore, he bombed our aerodrome two evenings in succession and completely upset all our arrangements, it was generally agreed that he had scored one over on us. Much as his enterprise was admired, however, it was decided to try to check it.


