

Beaumont villafie, where there are over four hundred French civilians, is the particular target of the Germans. All last night they deluged Beaumont with poison gas. American troops continued to advance to day between the Meuse, and Bara, advancing in one place over

AMERICA AND ALLIES TO GO THROUGH **AUSTRIA TO FIGHT GERMANY**

TERMS INCLUDE COMPLETE DEMOBILIZATION AUSTRIAN FORCES, SURRENDER HALF MILITARY EQUIPMENT, PORTION OF AUSTRIA, ALL AIRCRAFT, INTERN-MENT ALL GERMANS IN AUSTRIA-IN BRIEF COM-PLETE SURRENDER IN EVERY WAY.

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The terms of the Austro-Hungarian armistice as announced today accomplish the complete surrender of Austria and the opening of Austro-Hungarian territory for American and allied operations against Germany.

They include the complete demobilization of Austrian forces, the surrender of one-half of his artillery and military equipment, the occupation by the allies of such places as may later be selected. Austrian railroads will be used for operations against Germany. Austria must evacuate all invaded territory, leaving behind all equipment and supplies including coal. A surrender of a portion of the Austrian surface, submarine fleets disarmed, and other put under American and allied control, is included in the terms.

Austria must surrender all German submarines in Austrian ports. Free navigation of Austrian-waters by war and commercial fleets must be made available. All air craft must be put out of commission and centrated under allied control.

German troops in Austria-Hungary, Italy or the Balkans must be interned within fifteen days.

The allied blockade against Austria remains unchanged.

The Danube route is to be kept open by the occupation or dismantling of fortresses to be selected by allied commanders. All Austrian harbors and other equipment in occupied Italian ports will be left untouched. The destruction of any property by the retreating forces is specifically forbidden. The evacuation of Austrian territory roughly corresponds to the boundary lines claimed by Italy under Italia, Irredenta or the treaty of London. The right of allied occupation is reserved.

> We are going to be required to practice the same economy this year that we did last year, and we will have to get along with a little less of certain foods than what we normally consume. Among these is sugar. The food administration expects to make available for export to our allies 5,500,000 tons more food than we sent them last year, and it must be done even though we have not raised much more than we did last year. We are winning battles, but we must not expect to go back to our normal way of living even though peace is signed tomorrow. In order to make democracy's victory complete we must see that our allies are fed as well as our own soldiers in France.
