





Bankers Say They Lend More Money on Property When **Buildings Are Well Painted.** AN INDICATION OF THRIFT. One Concern Advances 25 Per Cent. More if Repainting is Done Every Five Years,

Does it pay to paint carefully farm buildings? Does it add to the selling value of a farm when buildings are properly kept up and regularly painted? A careful inquiry of a number of leading bankers in the Mississippi valley, including such states as Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri, reveals the fact that in nearly every case the bankers did not hesitate to say that they would lend all the way from 5 to 50 per cent. more on land where farm bufidings were well painted and kept in good condition. They maintain that well kept-up and well painted buildings and fences are an indication of thrift and that the thrifty farmer is a good client, and to him money can be safely loaned. An average of the returns from these bankers shows that the increased loan value because of painted buildings is around 22 per cent.

Some of these bankers make interesting comment. A Michigan concern says that, while not especially prepared to advise definitely in response to this inquiry, the officers would loan more money on farms where buildings were painted than where they were not so treated. This bank also finds that where houses, barns and fences are well taken care of the farm is a profitable proposition, and bankers in general consider the farmer a good client. Another Michigan bank says "farm buildings out of repair and needing paint indicate that the owner is slow pay." Such farms are rated at about one-third of the assessed value for loans. Where the farm buildings are in good shape the rating is onehalf. 

A farmer who will keep his buildings painted takes a much deeper interest .n his work than one who does not. Another Minnesota bank says that well painted buildings have resulted in securing from (Padgitt's ad has bee car- his bank sometimes as high as 25 per cent, more money than where the buildings are not painted. An Ohio concern says that it will loan 25 per cent. more money on a well kept farm where buildings are painted at least once every five years. A southern Illinois bank says that it has no fixed rule about this, but it does make a decided difference when owners of farm lands apply for loans. If the buildings are well painted and thus well preserved the loan rate would not only be cheaper, but the amount of money borrowed would be larger. A northern Illinois bank does not hesitate to say that it would loan fully 50 per cent. more on a farm where buildings were well painted and in good order than where they were not. The vice presi-

dent, who answers the inquiry, goes on to say: "There probably are many farmers good financially and morally who permit their buildings to remain unpainted, but as a rule the most substantial people who live in the country keep their buildings well painted." An Iowa bank, through its vice president, states that it would make a difference of at least 25 per cent, in favor of the farm with painted buildings. Another Iowa concern says that it would make a difference of at least 20 per cent.

All this being true, it is perfectly evident that it is a good business proposition to keep the farm buildings well painted. They not only look better and are more pleasing to the owner, but the farm would sell to better advantage, the loan value of the property would be greatly increased and the buildings themselves would last much longer and need less repair.-The

### PAINT AND ILLITERACY.

Curious Fact Comes to Light That Localities Least Using Books Avoid Paint Also.

Washington, D. C .- A curious fact has been brought to light by the Educational Bureau and the Bureau of Industrial Research here. It is that in the states where illiteracy is most prevalent paint is least used. The paint referred to is the common or barn variety, of course, for the backwoods countries have no need for the finer pigments or facial adornments. It is true, though, that in the sections of all states where white illiteracy is highest painted homes are rare and painted outbuildings and barns are practically unknown. Probably the illiterates do not use paint on their buildings because they do not understand its value as a preservative,

A structure coated with sheets of India rubber would not be as well protected from decay as a structure coated with a good oil paint. This is due to the fact that a sheet of rubber is not so durable or as waterproof as a thin dried film of paint. The latter material when applied dries to a continuous elastic film containing finely divided particles of metallic, wear resisting

pigments. A square foot of such a film upon a wooden surface costs less than a penny, yet it will beautify and protect a dollar's worth of surface for many years. This is a low rate of insurance.

Dwellings, barns, outbuildings, sheds, posts, fences, stock enclosures, wagons, implements, windmills and other structures, whether of wood, iron or cemen ahould be preserved, through the use of paint, from rapid decay. High grade paint may be used successfully for all such purposes. Colored paints will be found the most seviceable, the coloring matter in the paint adding from two te three years to the life of the coating





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## **AMERICAN TRADE** HOLDS ITS OWN

COMMERCIAL ATTACHE SAYS MARKET CONDITIONS IN AR-GENTINA FAVORABLE.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 9 .- "A study of market conditioins and methods 'n Argentina has convinced me that, so far as this particular country is concerned, American trade will continue Robert S. Barrett, commercial atin Beunos Aires, declared today in a report to the Bureau of Foreign and

Domstic Commerce.

In answering the "most pertinent question" now in the minds of business men of the United Stateswhether this country can retain the commercial prestige gained during the war-Mr. Barrett found numerous reasons for optimism. He said firms in the United States were coming to a better understanding of their South American trade because they were studying its needs. Increased establishment of branch houses in Latin-America and buying offices in the United States.

He warned, however, that competitive freight rates, trained men, absolute honesty and investment in South American securities, were necessary to maintain the position which United States goods now hold in the countries to the south of the equator.

"While perhaps the United States', percentage of the total imports into Argentina may not be so large, as it has been in teh past four years, during which competition from European countries was greatly affected by the war, the value of its exports to Argentina will be largest in the next, few years than ever before," Mr. Barrett said.

"It cannot be expected that the United States will continue to supply Argenting with the greater part of its imports of cotton and woolen goods, glassware chinaware, drugs, heavy chemicals, cardboard and certain raw materials, when normal condititons are restored in Europe, but, on the other hand, imports of such goods as iron and steel, lumber, petroleum products, machinery, furniture, boots and shoes, cement, automobiles, office supplies and special



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

### QUESTIONNAIRE ANSWERS WHICH WILL SOLVE PERPLEXING PROBLEMS OF THIS RECONSTRUCTION ERA.

Query .- The government has launched an educational campaign to encourage building in order to put more men to work. Would not a similar movement to show how the old structures can be best and most economically repaired and made good as new also help?

Answer .- It is learned that such a plan is in effect and is linked directly with the Washington propaganda.

Industry must be turned back from works of war to the ways of peace. Employment must be found, in the meanwhile, for those whose occupation has been interrupted. There is no real surplus of labor in the United States. Rather there is a shortage, which would be acute if normal condiditions were already restored, and one step towards restoring them will come with resumption of repair work.

Government restrictions, imposed by the necessities of the war program, have for many months past retarded or altogether prevented construction, improvement and repairs. These restrictions are now off, and there is scarcely a town, a city, a factory, a dwelling or a farm that does not reveal a crying need for prompt attention. Nothing delays such instant action except the feeling that prices are high for the time being and may be lower. That is not logical. No matter what it costs to repair, the cost is less than the cost of neglect. No matter what the cost of paint, the wind and the weather will collect a higher bill in deterioration and decay.

Query .-- What do you think of paint as an investment, aside from the appearance it leads? Dess it really PAY to paint a house regularly, say, every three or four Tearst

Answer,-Good paint properly applied when needed is the main thing in making a house last long and well. A house worth \$2,500 can be painted at a cost of about \$125. In 60 years that house will need about 15 paintings, the total cost of which will be \$1,895. Left without paint, such a house would fall into complete ruin in 30 years. So taking 60 years as a basis for our figuses we find that with paint a home will last that time in good condition and will cost, plus paint, \$4,875. Without paint the house would have to be rebuilt at the end of 30 years and would be ready for another complete renovation when the sixtleth year arrived. Cost, without paint, \$5,000 for home ready to fall to pleces. Does

### **TROUBLE MAKING** WOMEN, DIE IN "Y" **CANTEEN TAKEN** OVER BY PERSHING SERVICE OVERSEAS

Says General.

Grants Earnest Request of Y. M. C. A. Head-Did Better Than Expected,

The Y. M. C. A. carried the Red Tri-Chaumont (Special) .- At the earnest request of E. C. Carter, general overseas secretary of the Army Young Men's Christian Association, General Fershing has officially taken over the army canteen, and in the future all exchanges, or "canteens," will be operated by the military instead of the Y. M. C. A., as was the ages-old custom before the present war. In replying to bombs, Mr. Carter's request, General Pershing says that as the reasons which impelled him to request the Y. M. C. A. to undertake the canteen work no longer exist, he is glad to approve Carter's suggestion. The general thanks the Y. M. C. A. for the manner in which it handled the canteen, declaring that, "handicapped by shortage of tonnage and land transportation, the Y. M. C. A. has by extra exertion served the army better than could headquarters, are not included. have been expected, and you may be assured that its aid has been a large

factor in the final great accomplishments of the American army. According to Y. M. C. A. officials and investigators of recent criticism coming from overseas, the canteen has been the cause of nineteen-twentieths of the organization's trouble. In his letter to Mr. Carter, General Pershing declares that "the Y. M. C. A. undertook the management of the post exchanges at my request at a time when it was of the greatest importance that no available soldier should be taken away from the vital military functions of training and fighting." Y. M. C. A. men everywhere are sure that with the canteen in the hands of the army, all criticism of the organization's overseas work will cease, because of the impossibility of a civilian organization, handicapped as the Y. M. C. A. has been, operating such a mammoth mercantile enterprise as the post exchange business proved to be. General Pershing's letter to Mr. Car-

Sacrifice Proportionately One-Quarter as Great as That of Army-Sixty-Three Decorated.

angle into the camps and trenches abroad at a cost of fifty-three lives, a sacrifice proportionately one-quarter as great as that of the American ermy, according to a statement issued today by the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A. Of these fatalities thirty-five were due to disease, and the remainder to shell-fire, gas-fever, drowning and wounds. Ten of these were women, one of whom was killed by shell fire and the other in a German air raid. There were also fifty-five non-fatal casualties. These were due principally to machine gun fire, gas, shell fire, and motor transport accidents. Numerous cases of slight wounds and gassings which were attended at dressing stations, but were not reported to

These casualties occurred in a force which at no time exceeded 9.000 workers; of whom it is reckoned that more than one-half were never sent to the front, being employed in the hundreds of huts maintained throughout the training areas and the "leave areas." Sixty-three "Y" workers were decorated, while in all more than 152 received official recognition or distinguished service. Thirteen of these were decorated with the Croix de Guerre, while forty-eight received other decorations. Of these three received the Distinguished Service Cross, three the Order of St. Stanislaus; five the Italian Cavaliere del Corona thirty-eight the Italian War Cross, and one the French decoration of the Corps d'Armee. Seven were cited for the Croix de Guerre, and seven for other decorations, six commended for meritorious conduct, and twenty-nine received honorable mention in dispatches. Several units were cited in their entirety, those serving with the Third division being cited twice. More than a score more reported decorations have not yet been confirmed.

Not one of these men under thirty was fit for military duty, but the citations show that they carried on with the same courage and spirit that identified Americans throughout the war. These records show that they went over the top with the assaulting
