FAME IS SUCH a fleeting thing. What was the name of that fellow who said "Anybody can achieve fame for about 15 minutes?" Unfortunately most of us go through life without ever achieving our 900 seconds in the sun.

For instance, do you remember that Neil Armstrong was the first astronaut to set foot on the moon? That happened 25 years ago.

Twenty five years from now will anyone remember that Major Jackie Parker became the first female fighter pilot in the U.S. Armed Forces on April 13, 1994?

Being "rich and famous" is an ambition which most young folks aspire to until they reach about age 30 and discover that it's not worth the effort.

Most of the famous names that we remember best are associated with products that we buy, such as Stetson, Folger, Revlon, Kodak, Winchester, Chrysler, Smith-Corona, Betty Crocker, John Deere, Calvin Klein and Ralph Lauren. But fame which comes at the expense of the public seems rather tacky to us, since we are the ones paying the price. Right?

It would be nicer to have the type of fame that comes when a lasting monument is established in your name, such as Mt. McKinley, St. Paul's Cathedral, Hoover Dam, the Lincoln Tunnel, Lake Meredith, Stemmons Freeway, or Ellis County Texas. (Couldn't resist that last one.)

But true fame comes when your name becomes not just a household word, but part of the language. Think about the Bowie knife, the Bunsen burner, the Stradivarius violin, and the Graham cracker. Is a Mackintosh the name of an apple, a computer or a type of raincoat?

Poor old Thomas Edison didn't even get the light bulb named after him, but A.M. Ampere and James Watt, the Scottish inventor, fared a little better. The enshrinement of some others needs no explanation: Rudolf Diesel, George M. Pullman, Louis Pasteur, the Earl of Cardigan, Louis B. Braille.

Would the old Indian Geronimo be pleased to know that when his name is evoked it is usually followed by an exclamation mark?!

Charley Lynch was a Virginia planter at the time of the American Revolution when he formed his neighborhood into vigilante mobs to go out and string up the Tories. He did not believe in the jury system, and from him comes the term lynch mob.

The sidewiskers of Ambrose Everett Burnside, a Union Civil War general, became the fashion of his day. At first they were "burnsides," but later because of the location on the face they became "sideburns."

Sam Maverick went against tradition when he did not brand the calves in one of his herds. Unbranded cattle became known as "mavericks."

The Earl of Sandwich, John Montagu, was a notorious gambler. He insisted on putting his lunch between a couple of pieces of bread so that he could eat without having to leave the gaming table.

Luigi Galvani used electric shocks in his experiments on animals. It was probably an accident when he invented the metallic arc which eventually came to be used to put a thin coating of zinc on other metals to prevent rust. And so we have the word galvanize.

The Marquis de Sade gave us the words sadism and sadistic and J. I. Guillotin proposed a "humane" method of execution during the French Revolution. This only proves that when your name reaches the status of fame, it does not necessarily have to be associated with something nice.

Perhaps I'll come up with something important and they'll call it the Carollis and nobody will be able to do without one. Guess I'd better get busy.

## Children Photographed For Safety Documents

Parents can obtain free photographs of their children at the KidCare Photo ID event on Friday and Saturday, April 29-30, at the Friona Elementary School Cafeteria. The event is being hosted by the Parmer County Sheriff's Department and the Friona Police Department.

One in seven missing children are found because of a photograph distributed by the NCMEC, so authorities recommend that parents obtain standardized safety documents such as the KidCare Photo ID for their children.

The Parmer County law officials are hosting the KidCare Photo ID event as part of a national effort to provide parents with personal safety IDs of their children in the event of an emergency.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) and the Polaroid Corporation have developed the KidCare Photo ID as part of a national campaign to increase awareness about missing children and educate parents about the steps they can take to help protect their children. The KidCare ID is a NCMEC approved form of standard identification for children.

"Everyone has pictures of their children, but most parents do not have a suitable photograph if their child becomes lost or missing," explained Ernest Allen, president of the NCMEC. "It is very important to have a recent, unobstructed head and shoulders photograph of the child. The photograph should be stored in a safe place with the vital statistics of the child at the time the

photograph is taken."

The law officials are offering the free KidCare IDs as a public service to families in the area. "We're pleased we can play such a vital role in helping to keep children safe in our own community," said Byron Boyd. "We certainly hope no one will ever need to use these documents, but parents can at least have peace of mind to know they have the information in a safe place at home should the need arise."

No one really knows the full extent of the missing children problem. In one study conducted on the issue, the U.S. Department of Justice found that there were over one million children who are reported missing each year.

Authorities at NCMEC point out that most of the children who are abducted are taken by a family member (e.g., estranged parent), who do not generally have the child's best interests in mind. Experts at NCMEC advise, however, that many crimes against children can be prevented through education.

Parents can obtain free KidCare IDs for all of their children on April 29 from 2-7 p.m. and April 30 from 9 a.m.-12 noon. Volunteers will be on-site to help weigh and measure children and will guide families through the KidCare Photo ID event.

For more information about the KidCare Photo ID event, contact Byron Boyd. A good turnout is vital to the success of the program, Boyd said.

## Traffic Fatalities Are Lowest Since 1965

Fewer people died in traffic accidents in Texas in 1993 than in any year since 1965, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Last year, 3,037 persons died in traffic mishaps on Texas streets and roadways, a decrease of 0.7 per cent from the 1992 statewide death toll of 3,057. The decline was the eighth in the last nine years.

"You have to go back 28 years, to 1965 when 3,028 died in traffic accidents, to find fewer fatalities than we had in 1993," said DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson.

Texas traffic death rate--the number of fatalities per 100 million miles driven--was the lowest in the state's history at 1.8.

"Unfortunately, not all the news is good," Wilson said. "The overall number of traffic accidents in the state was up and the number of persons injured in traffic accidents increased by 6 per cent."

The DPS received reports of 390,417 traffic accidents in 1993, an increase of 2.1 per cent from 1992 figures. These accidents resulted in some degree of injury, from minor to life-threatening, to 298,891 people.

Four in ten traffic deaths last year were linked to alcohol or drug use by drivers, an analysis of DPS traffic statistics showed.

"In 1993, 1,219 persons died in traffic accidents in which intoxication was a factor," Wilson said. "That amounts to 40.1 per cent of all of the fatalities last year."

Not wearing safety belts also was a significant factor in traffic deaths last year, Wilson said. "Of those killed in the front seats of cars and light trucks last year, nearly sixty per cent were not restrained."

Motorcycle fatalities also were up in 1993, compared with the year before. Last year, 157 motorcycle operators or passengers were killed in accidents, an increase of 17.2 per cent over 1992 motorcycle deaths.

# Happy Homemaker

Does any homemaker ever have too many recipes for salads or casseroles? For the past several years it has seemed that more and more meals fall in the category of "One Dish." Of course, most of us add a salad, a dessert and a drink. What more could anyone ask?

This week, we plan to concentrate on casseroles and are borrowing them from the Miller-Roysden Cookbook-Generology.

The first two have chicken bases.

A la Chicken In Cornbread Ring was submitted by Glenda Williams Miller.

## CORNBREAD RING

- 1 cup corn meal
- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup shortening

Mix dry ingredients. Beat egg. Add milk and melted shortening. Pour over dry ingredients. Mix well. Bake in greased eight inch ring mold at 425 degrees 25 minutes or until golden brown. Turn out onto platter. Fill center of cornbread ring and around outside

with chicken mixture. Makes eight servings.

## A LA CHICKEN MIXTURE

- 1 chicken, boiled and boned
- 1/3 cup oleo
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1/3 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon marjoram or thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 cups chicken broth

Melt oleo. Saute onion and celery. Add flour and seasonings. Add milk and chicken broth gradually. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Add Worcestershire sauce and chicken. Heat thoroughly. Pour into cornbread ring and serve immediately.

## CHICKEN CASSEROLE

- Amanda Mason Miller
- 1 cup cream of chicken soup
- 4 ounces diced green chilies, drained
- 1/4 teaspoon dehydrated minced onion
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 large firm ripe tomatoes
- 6 ounces corn chips or Doritos
- 10 ounces cooked boned chicken, diced

Grated cheddar cheese

In small mixing bowl, combine soup, chilies, onion, milk and water. Peel tomatoes and slice thinly. In a greased two quart casserole, make a layer of half the corn chips. Top with half the chicken, then half the tomato slices. Pour half the soup mixture over chicken. Sprinkle with half the grated cheese. Repeat layers in the same order, ending with the cheese. Have oven preheated to 350 degrees. Bake casserole 45-50 minutes, or microwave on high for twelve minutes.

- 4 hamburger patties
- 1 large onion
- 4 potatoes, quartered
- 4 carrots sliced thin
- 4 tablespoons butter
- Salt and pepper to taste

Tear four pieces of foil large enough to enclose hamburger patty and vegetables. Place one patty on each piece of foil; add a slice of onion. Place quartered potato on onion slice; add sliced carrots. Top with 1 tablespoon butter. Season with salt and pepper. Pull foil together; fold at top. Bake at 375 degrees for 1-1/2 hours.

# Signup Period Underway For Wheat, Feed Grain & Cotton

Signup for the 1994 Wheat, Feed Grain, and Cotton farm programs began March 1 and will end April 29, according to Curt Miller, county executive director of the ASCS.

Provisions of the 1994 farm program are as follows:

Wheat, 0% ACR, \$4/bu. target price, \$2.58/bu. loan rate, \$.85/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.425/bu. advance rate.

Oats, 0% ACR, \$1.45/bu. target price, \$.97/bu. loan rate, \$.0/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.0/bu. advance rate.

Barley, 0% ACR, \$2.36/bu. target price, \$1.54/bu. loan rate, \$.52/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.26/bu. advance rate.

Corn, 0% ACR, \$2.75/bu. target price, \$1.89/bu. loan rate, \$.40/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.20/bu. advance rate.

Grain Sorghum, 0% ACR, \$2.61/bu. target price, \$1.80/bu. loan rate, \$.46/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.23/bu. advance rate.

Upland Cotton, 11% ACR, \$.729/lb. target price, \$.50/lb. loan rate, \$.129/lb. deficiency pay rate, and \$.0645/lb. advance rate.

County loan rates will be announced at a late date.

Normal Flex Acres (NFA) will again be 15% of the crop acre base, and Optional Flex Acres (OFA) will be 10% of the crop acreage base again.

For wheat and feed grains, the 0/85 option will replace the 0/92 option if CU for payment is designated.

For cotton, the 50/85 option will replace the 50/92 option if CU for payment is designated. 50% of the cotton maximum payment acreage MUST be planted. NO WAIVER HAS BEEN GRANTED FOR 1994.

In 1994 producers will have the option of withdrawing from the farm program up to the final reporting date for the crop. For wheat and other small grains this date is May 16 and for corn, sorghum, and cotton the date will be July 15, 1994.

May 16, 1994 is the final date to certify small grains (wheat, rye, barley, oats, triticale), regardless of their use (harvest, ACR cover, CU cover, etc.). If you do not already have an appointment PLEASE call (481-3311) and make an appointment as soon as possible. This is also the final date to certify

to zero planted acreage if the farm has a base for that commodity.

Producers are encouraged to sign up for measurement service which will be offered on small grains until May 16, 1994. Penalties for incorrect certifications can be very costly. These penalties can be avoided by letting ASCS measure your acreage. Regardless of the use of the small grain, it is suggested that you take advantage of this low cost service if you are unsure of any acreage. Measuring service rates are \$20 per farm, plus .03 cents per acre for each acre over 25. If you haven't done so, PLEASE call and make an appointment. Remember, there is no tolerance on measurement service.

ACR and CU for PAY acres may be grazed and/or hayed until May 31, 1994. No haying or grazing will be permitted on these acres from June 1, 1994 through October 31, 1994.

The insurance closing date for corn, cotton, grain sorghum, hybrid sorghum seed, potatoes, soybeans, sugar beets, and sunflowers in Parmer County is April 15, 1994.

Deliberate burning of any annual crop residue, on a farm participating in ACP, is considered an unauthorized action unless waived by the County Committee.

The County Committee may, with the concurrence of the District Director, approve the burning of an

annual crop residue under the following conditions: (1) Consideration should be given to the soil and water conservation benefits in all cases. (2) Approval should not be given on the same acreage in consecutive years. (3) To permit double cropping. (4) To control diseases, weeds, grasses, and/or insects. (5) To permit harvest of blown-down corn. (6) The waiver must be approved before the residue is burned.

This only applies to the year in which a cost share payment has been made under the Agriculture Conservation Program (pipeline assistance etc.).

The purpose of failed acreage credit is to provide planted acre credit for a crop that has failed due to a natural disaster or other condition beyond the producer's control. The producer is eligible to receive payment for the failed acres. If a crop fails due to a natural disaster, the producer must file an ASCS-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) within 15 days after the date the abnormal condition occurred or was obvious, and before physical evidence of the crop is destroyed. This office must inspect the failed crop prior to being destroyed.

If you farm under a joint venture (husband/wife or otherwise) you must carry the joint venture name on all your farming interest loan documents, settlement sheets, weight tickets, crop insurance documents, and local bills-fuel, fertilizer, seed, etc. It is very important that these requirements be met.

Everyone is subject to a payment limitation spot check. End of Year Reviews are conducted by our State Office and it is very important that you conduct your farming operation as you have indicated on the payment limitation forms filed during signup. If you do have changes, the COC must

have a timely, written notification of this change. For example a share change, ownership change, involvement in another farming interest, settling of an estate, forming a corporation, etc.

The five month national weighted average price for corn was \$2.47 per bu. (target price \$2.75) and for grain sorghum \$2.36 per bu. (target price \$2.61). The final deficiency payment rate for corn was \$.28 per bu. and for sorghum \$.25 per bu. The advance payments for corn were \$.36 per bu. and for grain sorghum \$.35 per bu. The result is an overpayment of \$.08 per bu. on corn and \$.10 per bu. on grain sorghum on acreages for harvest.

Participants in the 1993 corn and grain sorghum program who used the 0/92 provisions are guaranteed a minimum payment rate of 72 cents per bushel for corn and 70 cents per bushel for grain sorghum, which were the estimated final deficiency payment rates for these crops for 1993.

When the final deficiency rate is less than the advance, any repayment required is due at the end of the marketing year for the crop. Therefore, producers will not be requested to make the refund of the overpayment until October 1994.

The marketing year for program commodities will be for wheat, barley and oats, June 1-May 31; for upland cotton, August 1-July 31; for corn and grain sorghum, September 1-August 31.

The final planting dates for cotton will be May 31, for corn May 15, and for grain sorghum June 30.

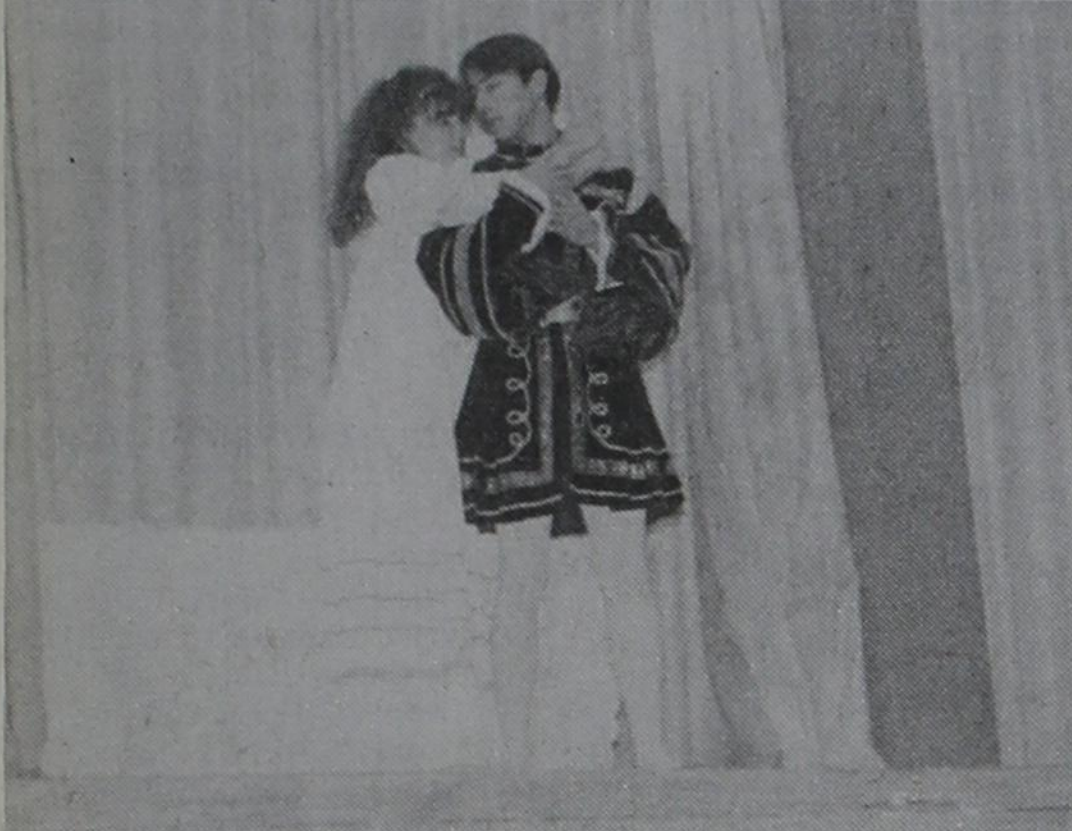


