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
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Red Skelton Talks About The Pledge

And now boys and girls, let me hear you recite the Pledge of Allegiance:


I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one

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


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

Anne Spring, who grew up in Manchester, England, has some distant friends and acquaintences from there, who happened to be in New York, or on their way to New York, at the time of the September 11th terrorist attack on the World Trade Center. After they returned home, the British travelers were asked to write a piece about

their memories of the frightening events for a newsletter which is published by their neighborhood association.

Following are selected articles which were written by two of the British citizens:

We had sailed to New York on the P&O ship Aurora and had planned to stay for three nights and then fly back. We had two very busy, happy days in New York.

On Sept. 10, we took the ferry from Battery Park to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. On our return we looked at the Manhattan skyline and I said "Let's go up the Twin Towers tomorrow." This was greeted with eager approval.

Over dinner that evening we discussed our sightseeing for the following day. Our son showed a distinct preference for going to the top of the Empire State Building instead of the Twin Towers, to which we agreed. Little did we know!

The following morning we left our hotel at 8:45 a.m. in Times Square, walked down Broadway and Fifth Avenue toward the Empire State Building. It became apparent that something was wrong because of the excessive police and fire engine sirens, but I thought "Well, this is New York."

We saw a restaurant we liked and decided to pop in and book a table for dinner. The door was opened by a very anxious New Yorker and we were all invited in to watch TV, just in time to see that a plane had hit one of the towers.

"What a tragic accident," everyone thought! But wait, another plane is flying into the second Tower! This is no accident! The horror on the faces of the people present and their typically New York exclamations said it all.

There we were, only about half-a-mile away! Reports

then came from the Pentagon, more horror and then later, a fourth plane, which we had been told, was shot down by the U.S. Airforce; My God, is this World War III, we thought.

Panic set in and we wondered what to do and where to go. I said "Central Park! There are no sky-scrapers there!" So that is where we went, and so too did the rest of New York. The traffic was at a standstill and the Park was full of 'men in suits' and mobile phones that wouldn't work.

After a long hot day looking at the cloud of smoke from Lower Manhattan, and listening to the U.S. Military circling the skies, we eventually made our way back to our hotel in Times Square. We hoped the New Yorkers would get home, but I don't know how, because all the bridges and tunnels were closed and there were no trains or underground services. Manhattan was sealed off!

The following day was traumatic also. There was a bomb scare at the Empire State Building and for two hours we feared more atrocities there. We should have flown home on Sept. 12 but we were in a "war zone."

The next day Times Square was evacuated, including our hotel, but the bomb-scares turned out to be hoaxes. All this was very nerve wracking, coupled with the fact that Manhattan was still sealed off and we couldn't get out.

Eventually, five days after the tragedy, we were taken by coach to Boston to sail back home, as there were no flights available in the forseeable future. We have to say that P&O were brilliant during this emergency.

we could see a grey sludge about 500 yards away: it was the Atlantic Ocean.

We sat om the plane for 9 hours. By this time 7 other passenger jets had landed to be filmed and recorded by the astonished townsfolk, who number just over 8,000.

Eventually we were taken off the plane, escorted through a cordon of Royal Mounted Police and registered by the Red Cross. At 12:30 a.m. local time. about 3:30 English time, we were taken to the local Holiday Inn where we were billeted for the next 3 days. We were lucky; many stayed in gymnasia and school halls.

On Wednesday morning

sunshine, low hills sloping into the blue Atlantic and a welcome that would have made a winter's day in these northerly parts glow with warmth.

The people of the town, the staff at the hotel (the premier hotel in town--I know, I saw the other one!), the shopkeepers, the staff at the superb library could not have been more helpful, more gracious or more hospitable.

How a town of 8000 managed to accommodate close to 2000 travellers is a mystery, but they did, and they did it royally. For three days we were lodged, fed and cossetted, uninformed. We had no idea when we would leave or where we would go.

One couple sat in the hotel as their daughter was married in Las Vegas, where they were heading. Tours from New York were missed; all but the planes carried on. We packed the local stores hunting for socks, pants,

we woke to brilliant luggage remained on the plane. On the 3rd day, Friday, a

Salvation Army major told us "Your prospects of leaving today are zero, and that's being optimistic." A hurricane was coming up the east coast towards us!

At 2 p.m. we were told we would leave at 3:30. We left at about 8 pm., and arrived in Newark, N.J. at about 9:45 p.m., to commence a delayed holiday.

What are the memories? Foremost the unbridled horror of the attacks on the U.S.; the reported anguish of John Kelly, who for years designed covers of a magazine--John was an eyewitness of the W.T.C. attack.

Also, the generosity of the people of Stephenville, the bewilderment, hurt and distress of so many New Yorkers who nevertheless, unfailingly welcoming, helpful; and courteous, but most of all, full of spirit and pride. They were brilliant, and so was

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

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

To Touch An Angel

A MAN wrote me not long ago and asked me what I thought of the theory of angels. I immediately told him that I am highly in favor of angels. As a matter of fact, I am scared to death of them.

Any adult human being with half sense, and some with more, knows that there are angels. If he has ever spent any period in loneliness, when the senses are forced in upon themselves, he has felt the wind from their beating wings and been overwhelmed with the sudden realization of the endless and gigantic dark that exists outside the little candle flame of human knowledge. He has prayed, not in the sense that he asked something, but that he yielded himself.

Angels live daily at our very elbows, and so do demons, and most men at one time or another in their lives have yielded themselves to both and have lived to rejoice and rue their impulses.

But the man who has once felt the beat of the angel's wing finds it easy to rejoice at the universe and at his fellow man.

THIS sense of cosmos, or angels, or the divine accommodation of a man with the universe, usually happens to a man suddenly. Angels do not take part in work for civic causes or help raise money for the United Fund. A single human heart has to long to touch an angel before it can sense one.

It does not happen to any man often, and too many of us dismiss it when it happens. I remember a time in my final days in college when the chinaberry trees were abloom and the air was sweet with spring blossoms and I stood still on the street, suddenly struck with the feeling of something that was an enormous promise and yet was no tangible promise at all.

And there was another night in a small boat when the moon was full and the distant headlands were dark but beautiful and we were lonely. The pull of a nameless emotion was so strong that it filled the atmosphere. The small boy within me cried.

Psychiatrists will say that the angel in all this was really within me, not outside, but it makes no difference.

There are angels inside us and angels outside, and the one inside is usually the quickest choked.




"The angels keep their ancient places," wrote Francis Thompson in protest. "Turn but a stone, and start a wing!"

tackle Jerry Wunsch said.



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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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Knowing How To "Smell A Norther"

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




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A Genealogist's Christmas Eve

The Texas Farmers Union that counter unfair practices (TFU) expressed his by other countries. According disappointment in the narrow to Sims, fast-track legislation passage of fast-track would allow the adminislegislation.

"Fast track legislation only reduces the oversight capacity of Congress throughout the negotiating process. And, current farm bill proposals appear to be at odds with the position of U.S. trade negotiators," Sims said.



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
