MISLEADING AND FUTILE PROPAGANDA.

A number of rather notable people, including police officials and health officers in larger cities, where the prohibition of the liquor traffie has not yet been very gracefully accepted, are trying to discount the good results of the dry regime by alleging that drug addicts are rapidly increasing.

They admit that prohibition has decreased crime, drunkenness and deaths from alcoholic overindulgence, but at the same time they try to make it appear that the increase in the use of various habit-forming drugs has offset the good from the absence of alcohol.

In the first place, the reports of the increase in drug using are doubtless exaggerated, for a good deal of this talk bears all the earmarks of propaganda. The liquor traffic is up to its old tricks of trying to frightan the people into the belief that if they prohibit liquor something else more terrible will come along. The liquor traffic always assumes that "something is going to get you," and that liquor is the lesser of the evils.

But granting that the drug habit is on the increase, that falls far short. of being convincing argument for the repeal or the modification of the prohibition laws. CATHOLIC SOCIETIES TEACHING AMERICANISM
