THE GRAND LARCENY IN SUGAR

Just now the greatest get-rich-quick game in America is gouging in sugar It's a mighty sweet and rich business for profit cormorants. The Sugar Equalization Board held the refiners down as to price. So in the name of Great Britain and France they bought up the Cuban sugar crop and exported it to those countries at a higher figure than the board would allow these men to sell it in the United States. And this government let them do it. As a result the increase in the price of sugar will add almost a billion dollars to the burdens now being borne by the American people, writes Arthur Capper from Washington, D. C. Athough our exports of sugar to Great Britain alone have jumped 200 percent, and we have in recent months shipped more than 300 million pounds of it to the United Kingdom, there are fairly well authenticated reports of wast hoards of sugar in New York and New Jersey. One recent deal reported is the sale through brokers of \$120,000 worth of sugar by a New York packing company to a Jersey City merchant for 20 1-4 cents a There is always hope for the fool pound, the sugar to be sold at 22 cents retail.

The hoarders are holding up Eastern wholesalers and retailers, who in turn must hold up the consumer. Sugar at 11 cents-the war price-is tremendously scarce in these localities. But sugar at 22 and 23 cents is as plentiful a sever.

Under the circumstances, the least this government can do is to put an embargo on shipping any more sugar abroad while the price at home is almost prohibitive and profiteering in sugar is so disgraceful and general. In the United States we normally consume 83 pounds of sugar a year per capita. An increase of a cent a pound in the price means \$91,300,000 a year



TEXAS TAX MONEY.

Austin, Texas, Feb. 2.-Between January 1 and March 3 this year \$21,-500,000 will flow into the state treasury, according to calculations of John W. Baker, state treasurer. These calculations allow twenty percent for commissions and delinquent taxes, and \$3,000,000 of the amount has passed through the treasury.

During this period a considerable portion of the money derived from taxes will also be spent. Schools alone will receive \$4,500,000, and payment of free textbook bills will absorb \$1,-500,000.

State depositories available can care for only \$8,900,000, and for this reason the recent call for bids from other banks which desire to act as state depositories was issued. Collections between January 1 and March 3 will exceed the capacity of present depositories by approximately \$12,-000,000 but as stated above money will be going out as well as coming in. Mr. Baker estimates that the income will exceed expenditures approximately \$7,000,000. This is the amount which will be available for apportionment to the new depositories.

On January 8 bids from eight-seven banks which desired to be named depositories were opened and tabulated. They asked for a total of \$7,-870,000 of state funds, and offered an average interest rate of 4.28 percent. Mr. Baker said that the depository board probably will award all these banks contracts, and that funds will be diverted to those offering the highest interest rate first. If it is later learned that too many depositories have been selected, those with the lowest interest rates will be released from the contracts.

One noticeable feature of the bids opened was that the interest offered for large sums was comparatively high. Several banks offered above 4 per cent and asked for \$500,000. The highest rate offered was 5.76 percent.

Under Mr. Baker's estomates by Barch 3 the state will be drawing slightly better than 4 percent interest on approximately \$15,000,000, or more than \$50,000 a month. As the year grows older expenditures will reduce the amount in state depositories to a great extent.






