J.B. Sudderth, trustee for the Blanche Sudderth estate, says there have been two or three parties interested in buying the restaurant equipment, but so far, none have worked out a deal on the building, which is owned by the estate.

We desperately need a restaurant in Bovina, and we are holding out the hope that someone will come forward who is both interested and able to make a deal for the facility. Either that, or that the Grahams will find it possible to extend their closing deadline while negotiations are going on.

The restaurant is one of the hubs of activity in Bovina. It is used for a myriad of meetings, and its closing would be a big blow to the organizations who stage luncheon or breakfast meetings there.

Also, as the premier eating place in town, people who eat out regularly would have a much more limited selection. A number of salesmen stop regularly at the restaurant, and its closing might mean that Bovina would lose a certain amount of out-of-town dollars brought in by this manner.

We're still hopeful that something will be worked out to save the restaurant.

The city of Victoria in South Texas, had to work at it, but they have a local celebration, too. There is called the Annual Armadillo Confad and Exposition.

Some of their events include the Yelling Contest and the Beer Can Smash. They crown a "Miss Vacant Lot," and the "Best All-Around Person in the World." Sounds like they have a gung-ho Chamber of Commerce to come up with such outlandish ideas.

J. D. Kirkpatrick Rites Held Friday

J.D. Kirkpatrick, 49, prominent Bovina farmer and businessman, died Wednesday of last week at Memorial Hospital in Clovis.

Mr. Kirkpatrick had been in ill health the past three years but was active until his death. He was at the Clovis hospital for a regular dialysis treatment on a kidney machine when he died of apparent heart failure at 8:30 a.m. He had undergone open heart surgery in June 1972 and began regular treatments on the kidney machine in September of that year.

Funeral services were held Friday morning at First Baptist Church of Bovina with Rev. Larry Heard, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.

Mr. Kirkpatrick was born June 10, 1924, at Lakeview. He attended Lakeview and Petersburg Schools. He served in

the U.S. Navy from 1942 to 1945. Mr. Kirkpatrick was married to the former Miss Lilly Byrd March 8, 1947, in Plainview. The couple farmed at Hale Center three years, moving to Bovina in December 1954.

A former high school Golden Gloves champion, Mr. Kirkpatrick also fought in the open Golden Gloves division, in the Navy and professionally for a time in the New York-New Jersey area before an injury brought his career to a halt. At the time, he was regarded as a leading boxer and some sports writers predicted he would win the world championship.

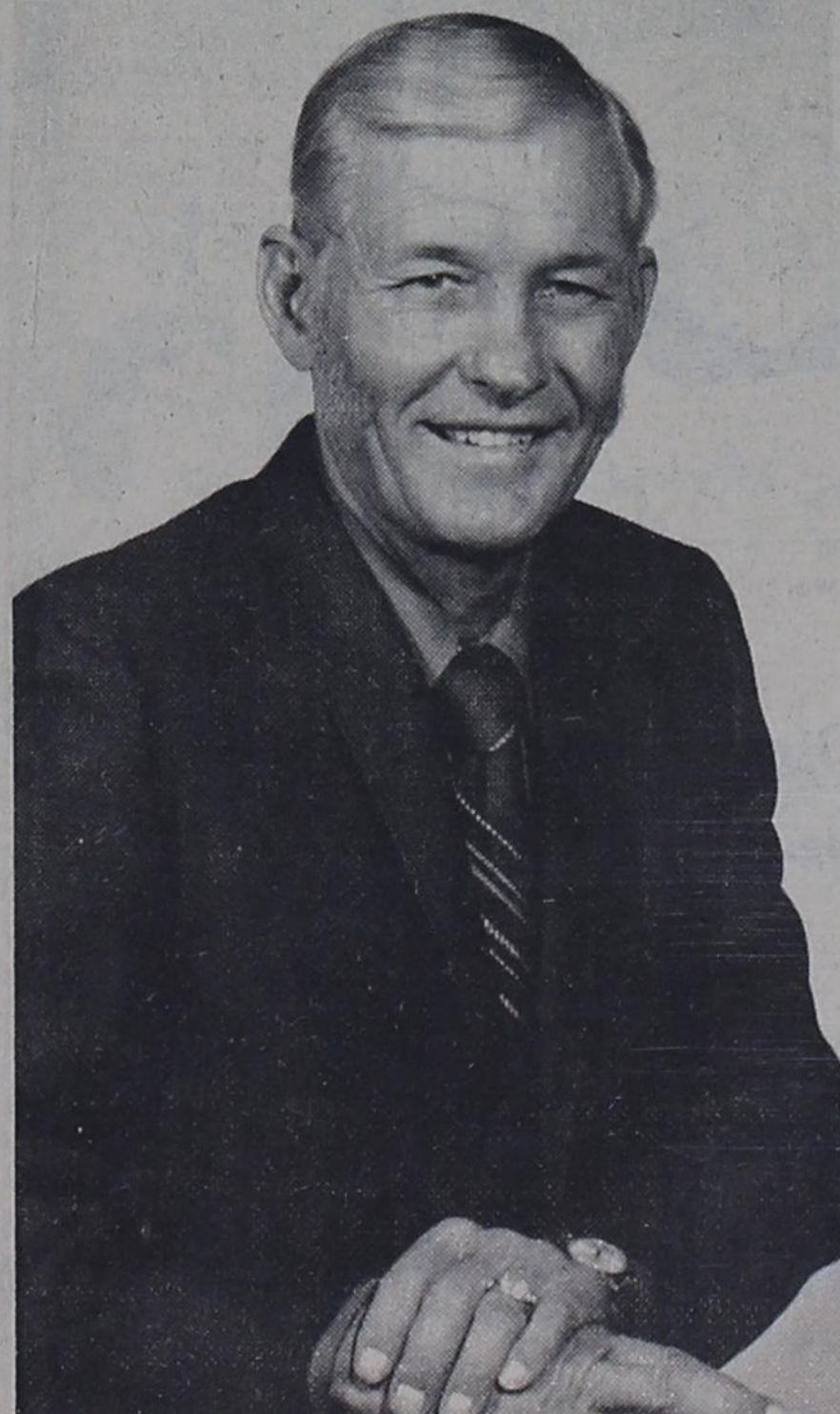
A member of the First Baptist Church of Bovina, Mr. Kirkpatrick had been a deacon since 1959, was superintendent of the church's Training Union Department and had taught Sunday School classes. He served two consecutive three-year terms on the board of trustees of Bovina School and

was president of the board for two years.

Mr. Kirkpatrick had served as a director of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and was a member of the Bovina Roping Club and Bovina Booster Club. He had served on the board of directors of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Association and was a stockholder and director of Agri-Sprayers, Inc., and Bovina Pump Co.

Survivors include his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Carol Glascock of Vernon and Debra Kirkpatrick of Corpus Christi; two sons, Daryl Kirkpatrick and Randy Kirkpatrick, both of Bovina; two sisters, Mrs. Syble Goad of Albuquerque, N.M., and Mrs. Helen Collum of Colorado Springs, Colo.; two brothers, Howard Kirkpatrick of Oklahoma City, Okla., and Kenneth Kirkpatrick of Colorado Springs, Colo.; and two grandchildren, Dana Glascock

Accident Kills Ex-Bovinian In New Mex.

Funeral services for Ted C. Hamlett, 36, of Clovis were held Friday afternoon at Steed Memorial Chapel in Clovis with Rev. Jessie Shavor of Durango, Colo. officiating. Burial was in the Grady Cemetery.

Mr. Hamlett, a native of Clovis, lived in Bovina about 10 years ago. He was a welder for Shorty's Welding Shop in Clovis and a veteran of the U.S. Navy.

The former Bovina resident was killed about 5:30 p.m. Monday of last week when the truck tractor he was driving went out of control on New Mexico State Hwy. 467 north of Portales. The tractor left the highway, overturned at least twice and rolled 84 feet, according to investigating patrolmen. The vehicle came to rest 245 feet from the point it left the highway, landing upright and rolling over Hamlett who was thrown from the vehicle.

Survivors include three sons, Calvin, Mark and Clayton, and one daughter, Melissa, all of California; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hamlett of Clovis; a sister, Mrs. Kathleen Hall of Durango, Colo.; four brothers, Terry Hamlett of Portales, Maurice Hamlett of Clovis, Larry Hamlett of Texarkana, and Bobby Roland Hamlett, who is with the U.S. Navy in Oxnard, Calif.

Unique Project Is Launched Here

Bovina's CowBelles began the first phase of a project last week which will, at the very least, create an interesting and unique feature on Main Street of this city, and hopefully, inspire further improvements of like nature in the downtown block.

Enlarging on a project initiated by the Bovina Woman's Study Club, the CowBelles hope to transform the ramshackle, vacant building on the corner of Third and Main Streets into a "landmark" in Bovina, according to Mrs. C.C. Naegle, president of the local organization.

The Study Club project involves assigning the numerous vacant buildings in the downtown block to civic and church organizations to clean-up and decorate, in methods chosen by the individual groups, in a manner designed to

make the buildings more attractive.

The CowBelles of Bovina are planning to take the project one step farther and are going "all out" on their assigned building.

Relying on volunteer labor and donations of cash and materials, the women are painting the outside of the building—brown on the Third Street side and white on the Main Street facade.

An outline of the state of Texas with the CowBelle insignia superimposed over the map will be painted in white on the Third Street side of the building, which is owned by Dr. James B. Moss of Clovis.

The front of the building, which is painted white, will feature two large windows framed in wood with well-known Texas cattle brands burned into the wood frames. The windows will be used to display CowBelle literature and

promotional material.

The main feature of the building, however, will be brands of Parmer County farmers and ranchers burned into cedar squares which will be affixed to the front of the building.

Farmers and ranchers are being encouraged to purchase the cedar squares, at \$5 each, from the CowBelles for this purpose. Mrs. Naegle emphasized the organization will not profit from the sale of the squares, stating that the charge will enable the CowBelles to complete the project at very little expense to the club's treasury.

Those purchasing the squares may use their personal branding irons to complete the cedar square, or the CowBelles will arrange to have the brand burned into the cedar. Persons desiring further information may contact Mrs. Sonny Jones or Mrs. M.H. Carson.

As an additional service to the farmers and ranchers wishing to have their brands affixed to the building, the CowBelles will maintain a permanent record of all brands on the building.

Mrs. Naegle pointed out that this will be a much needed and useful service when, and if, the Bovina Restaurant closes its doors. In the past, a record of brands has been kept at the restaurant for those wishing information about who owns which brand.

When the front of the building is covered, Mrs. Naegle said, the cedar squares will be placed on the side of the building.

The Bovina CowBelles plan to publicize the unique project in state and national CowBelle literature and conventions with hopes that other clubs in Texas, as well as other states, will undertake a similar project.

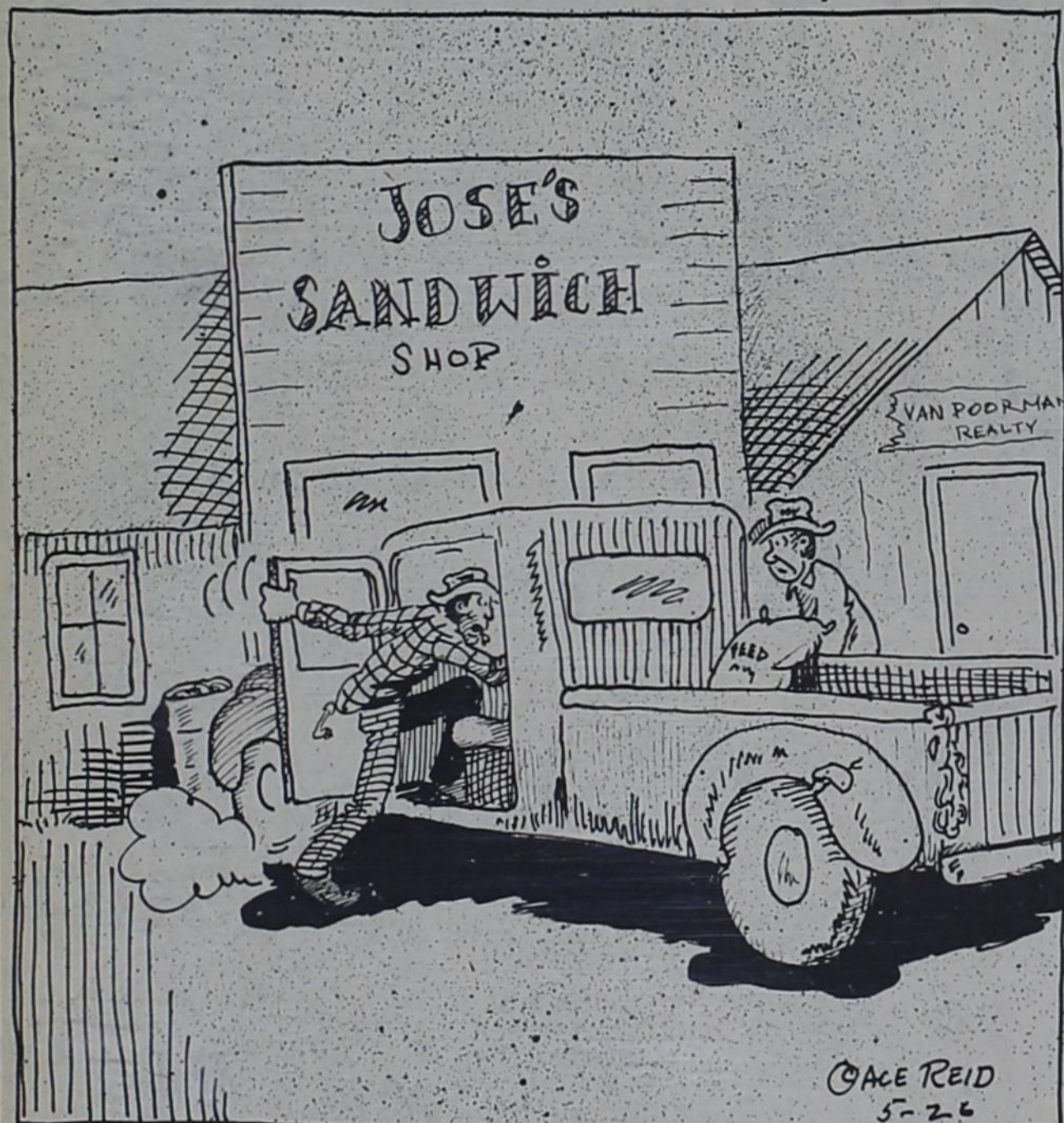

Kim King of Nazareth, Class B state tennis champion in 1973 and '74, will conduct a tennis camp in Bovina June 10 through 15.

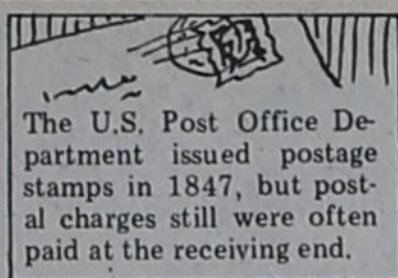

3 Wrecks, Shooting Plague Law Officers

A rash of collisions on Bovina streets and an accidental shooting last week and early this week plagued law enforcement officers here.

Arthur White, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray White of 601 Third Street, was seriously injured in the shooting incident Tuesday night of last week.

The toddler reportedly climbed atop a cabinet in the house and was playing with a small handgun when he was accidentally shot in the lower abdomen. His parents told officers they did not know how the accident occurred.

The child was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona where he underwent surgery that night. He is reported to be in good condition by the hospital staff.

A motorcycle-automobile collision about 11:45 a.m. Wednesday of last week at the intersection of Third Street and Avenue F resulted in minor injuries for the operator of the Kawasaki cycle.

Mario Martinez, 23, of Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis was apparently attempting to make a right turn onto Ave. F from the left lane of Third Street when he struck a

1966 Cadillac, driven by Mrs. Jim Guest of Bovina, who was in the right lane of Third. Both vehicles were south-bound.

Martinez and his cycle were flipped over the automobile, coming to rest on the northwest side of the street. Martinez was unconscious until shortly before he arrived at the Friona hospital in the Parsons-Ellis ambulance.

He was treated for his injuries and released.
