REFUSES GERMAN REQUEST TO ENTER RUHR DISTRICT

Paris, March 31.—Paris has denied the request of the German government for permission to send troops into the Ruhr district, in the neutral zone near the German border.

The French reply, which was handed the German representative, said to grant the request would be a violation of the Versailles treaty, and only the most imperative and evident necessity would justify the step. It said military intervention in the Ruhr district would be useless as well as dangerous.

DALLAS ATTORNEY MURDERED IN BED.

Dallas, Texas, March 31.—J. R. Bright, an attorney, was shot and instantly killed as he lay in bed and his wife is at a hospital with a bullet wound under her heart. Relatives say Mrs. Bright was "extremely jealous."

THE KING STANDS PAT

London, March 31.—Offers of a loan to the king by a group of financiers, which would have given him a loan of \$100,000,000, were not received by the king. The king's advisers and a general strike in the city were inevitable. The king is standing pat, neither accepting nor refusing the offer.

FLOOD ADDS TROUBLE OF MISSISSIPPI VALLEY

La Crosse, Wis., March 31.—Flood conditions of the upper reaches of the Mississippi river today had assumed a menacing aspect. The river had passed the 10-foot mark, flood stage here, and was rising at the rate of three feet every 24 hours. At Winona, Minn., 30 miles up the river, the intake bridge was closed for fear of a wash-out. The lowlands of the Wisconsin side were flooded for miles and the west end of Winona was under water.

DAY LIGHT SAVING REPEAL BILL FAILS IN NEW YORK.

Albany, N. Y., March 31.—The Fowler bill, designed to repeal the day light saving law, failed of passage in the assembly late Tuesday. The vote was 75 to 61, one less than required. The same bill was adopted by a 20 to 20 vote in the senate Monday night.

INCLUDED IN AUTO CRASH

Chicago, Ill., March 31.—A team of horses, owned by Mrs. J. J. Smith, was included in an auto crash in Chicago. The team was killed and the driver was injured. The accident occurred on a street in the city.

SUPPLEMENTARY AMENDMENT SALT MISSISSIPPI PAYABLE.

Washington, D. C., March 31.—The supplementary amendment to the salt tax law, which was passed by the house of representatives, is now being considered by the senate. The amendment provides for a 10 percent increase in the salt tax.

THE BLUE RIDGE CASE

Frankfort, Ky., March 30.—The case of the Blue Ridge, which was brought to the attention of the court by the state of Kentucky, is now being heard. The case involves the rights of the state of Kentucky to the Blue Ridge.

KENTUCKY WOMEN ARE ASSURED OF SUFFRAGE.

Frankfort, Ky., March 30.—Suffrage for women in Kentucky in the next presidential election was apparently assured by the action of Governor Morrow in signing the measure passed by the legislature granting women the right to vote for presidential electors.

AGED DOUGLASS WOMAN DIED LAST FRIDAY.

News was received in the city Monday that Mrs. Melvina Kelley, an aged lady of the Douglass community, died at her home Friday morning at 4 o'clock. Mrs. Kelley was born in 1844, and had been a resident of Texas for practically fifty years. Her husband, Robert Kelley Sr., died about two years ago, leaving Mrs. Kelley with her children. She is survived by three children, who are D. M. Kelley, L. R. Kelley and Mrs. Mary Watkins or Douglass. She is survived by a large number of grandchildren and one brother, Lonzo Davis, who lives chiefly in the Douglass community. Mrs. Kelley was a member of the Baptist church in good standing, having been so since she was a small girl. She was buried Sunday afternoon in the Finley graveyard, a family burying ground, about three miles west of Douglass, on the old Finley place, Rev. Kelley, a distant relative, officiated at the funeral services. The Sentinel joins with her many other friends in extending sympathy to the bereaved relatives.

FLOOD WARNING SENT OUT FOR NEW ORLEANS

New Orleans, La., March 31.—Flood warnings issued by the weather bureau here today predicted that flood stages of 35 feet will be reached by the Mississippi river at Baton Rouge and 28 feet at Donaldsonville, La., by April 10. A stage of 34 to 36 feet in the Ouachita river at Camden, Ark., and 37 feet in the Atchafalaya at Melville, La., also was forecast.

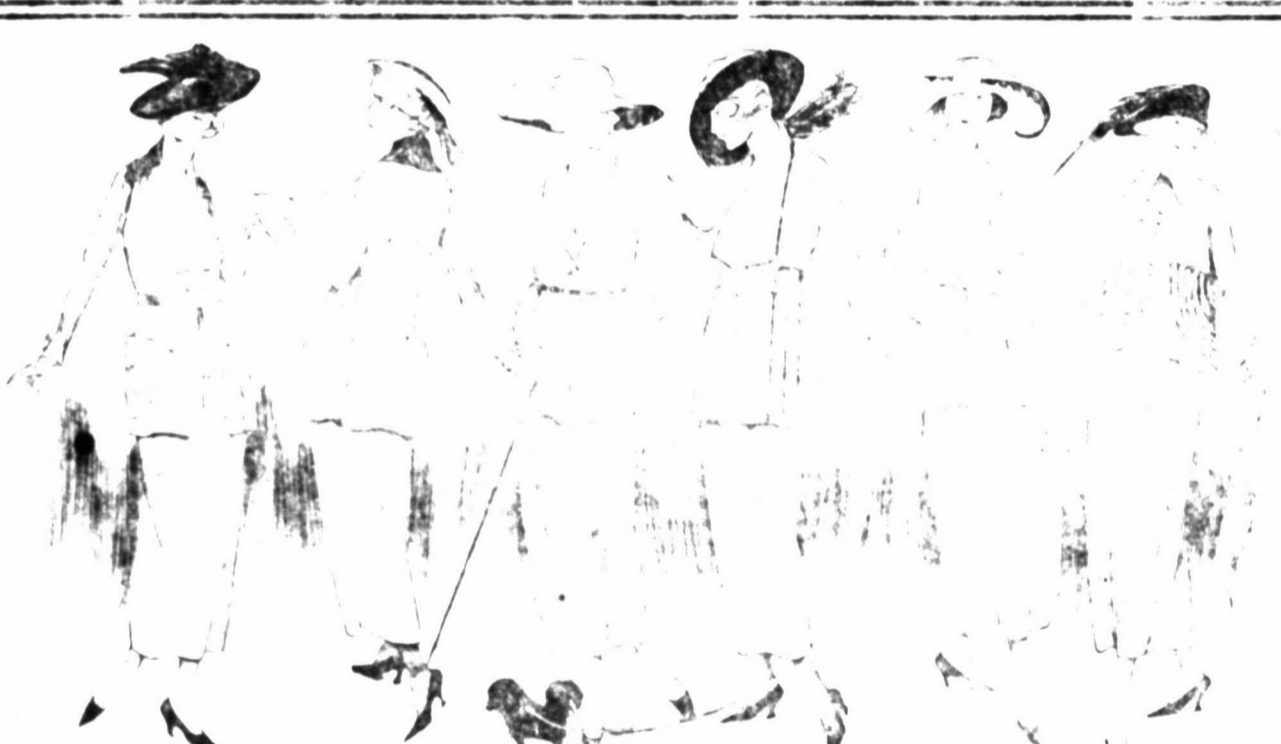
TEACHERS' EXAMINATION

NACOGDOCHES PUREBRED LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION.

Sixty five of the leading livestock men and farmers of Nacogdoches county met at the Chamber of Commerce rooms Thursday and organized the Nacogdoches Purebred Livestock Association.

Officers were elected as follows: Pres., W. B. Wotham, Garrison; Vice President, Eugene Blount, Nacogdoches; The following were named as a Board of Directors: T. E. Burgess, Nacogdoches; Capt. H. H. Cooper, Nacogdoches; Will Blackburn, Douglass; Henry Birdwell, Chireno; R. E. Burk, Sacul, The Pres., Vice Pres., and the Board of Directors will meet at the Chamber of Commerce rooms on April 2nd, for the purpose of adopting a constitution and by-laws also for selecting a Sec. for the association.

H. L. McKnight of the Chamber of Commerce acted as chairman of the meeting, and in a few words outlined the plans for agricultural improvement of Nacogdoches county, through the selection and improvement of livestock and the introduction of some livestock on each farm in the county.

Sunt. R. F. Davis of the Nacogdoches schools, welcomed the stock men to Nacogdoches. He pointed out the great improvement of milk cattle in East Texas since the days of his boyhood when he used to "rise" before day and milk seven head of brindle cows, to get enough milk to supply a family of ten.

T. E. Burgess, the veteran Jersey man, explained briefly, the many advantages that would come to Nacogdoches county if our people would raise more and better dairy cows. Among other statements, Mr. Burgess said: "During the last year I have had inquiries for more than twenty-five car-loads of good dairy cattle. These inquiries have come from South Texas, West Texas, Louisiana, and even as far away as Alabama. I could not supply the cattle as wanted, for the simple reason that they are not to be had here. Good grade cows have sold for as much as \$175.00 a head here in Nacogdoches within the last year." Mr. Burgess has it as his opinion that a livestock association for Nacogdoches county would greatly stimulate the raising of high class cattle and would prove profitable to those who engage in it.

Eugene Blount discussed the value of the short horns. Among other things Mr. Blount said:

"Two years ago I bought a number of short horn cows and now have quite a number of high class individuals in my herd. I am making this investment not primarily for my personal gain, though it is proving profitable to me, my chief interest was, and is to assist in the introduction of better cattle in this county. My present plan now is, to improve my herd in the following manner: When I have old four animals from my herd, I propose to invest the proceeds from the sale in one individual animal in a still higher breeding."

Mr. Blount has recently purchased high class short horn male at a cost of \$1500.00. This animal is now under treatment at the A. & M. College for inoculation against splenic tick fever. The animal will arrive here in a few days and will be used to head Mr. Blount's herd of short horns.

Capt. I. L. Sturdevant was called upon to discuss the banker's interest in better livestock. Capt. Sturdevant expresses his great pleasure in the movement to introduce more and better livestock in Nacogdoches county. He spoke in his usual happy optimistic vein and assured the stock men and farmers that the bankers of Nacogdoches county were ready to lend their credit to further the livestock industry. He pointed out specifically that the Nacogdoches Chamber of Commerce was not a city institution. He explained clearly, that under its plan of organization, it would be made to serve the whole interest of the whole county and not the special interests of any special group.

W. B. Wotham, the Duroc Jersey man of Garrison, made a very practical and interesting talk on "What the auction sales over the country had done and are doing for the advancement of the swine breeders." Mr. Wotham said among other things, "the breeder who expects to keep abreast of the business, must get away from home occasionally. He must go to the fairs and certainly to an occasional auction sale. Only in this way, can he keep in touch with the latest developments in his business."

Mr. Wotham has recently added some very fine blood to his already well bred, herd of Duroc Jerseys. Capt. H. H. Cooper, the Holstein

pioneer breeder of the county, gave a very interesting and amusing account of his experience with Holstein bought above the tick line, when turned loose in a tick pasture in Nacogdoches county. Capt. Cooper is well pleased with his start in the Holstein business and proposes to blaze the way for the more general introduction of the Holsteins in this section.

Guy Blount gave a very interesting account of his experience with the Brahmas or "sacred" cattle. Mr. Blount has quite a nice herd of these interesting animals and is planning to increase the herd both in quantity and quality. Discussing the advantages of the Brahma Mr. Blount said: "It is not true that the Brahma is a vicious animal. If properly handled, they are as docile as any breed of animal. On a recent visit to the Pierce ranch I saw Mr. Bordon go out on a 4000 acre pasture and call to him a full grown Brahma bull that knelt at Mr. Bordon's feet. I saw him do this not only with one bull but with a number of them."

Mr. Blount explained that a cross between the full blood-Brahma and our native cows, produced an animal that is practically immune from the tick. He explained that this is due to the extra thickness of the Brahma hide.

Will Blackburn who is recognized as one of the leading Poland China breeders of the county, stated that he was having satisfactory results with high class Poland China's. Mr. Blackburn has one individual that measure 72 inches in length and stands on a 10 inch leg. The 10 inch refers not to the length of the legs, but to its circumference at the smallest point. Mr. Blackburn has recently attended a number of auction sales, and stated that in every instance, he had learned more than enough to pay for his time and expense while away.

B. K. King of Douglass is a veteran breeder of short horns. Mr. King admitted that he was both merchant and farmer with a decided preference for the "farmer" half of his vocation. Mr. King calls attention to the urgent necessity for farmers and stock men to organize to the end that they may realize the value of the produce they bring to market. His talk was practical, sensible and was listened to, with pleasure.

Eugene Burk of Sacul, is another merchant and farmer with a decided preference to the farming business. Mr. Burk frankly admitted that he was an infant in the livestock business but promised with the help of his fellow breeders to "grow" in the business.

P. D. Stokes of Garrison, proved to be one of the most interesting talkers of the day. Mr. Stokes honestly admitted that he had moved fourteen times in twenty-eight years but that every year of the twenty-eight, he had moved not only for his own family, but some to sell. Mr. Stokes has quite a nice herd of Poland China's and in the course of his talk issued a friendly challenge to his neighbor, Billy Wortham, to "get busy" with his red hogs or be defeated by the Poland China's. Mr. Stokes said: "It seems to me that so far, I have been unable to accomplish anything worth while in life. I am now ready to join this organization and to co-operate with my neighbors in the undertaking, for I believe I can yet do something worth while for myself and my country."

In the opinion of those who heard Mr. Stokes, he has already accomplished more than many men who are unhampered by physical disability.

E. Hogan, Jr., told in a modest way of how he had made twenty-four crops in Nacogdoches county and was now feeding "bought" feed for the first time in twenty-four years.

"And still," Mr. Stokes said, "some people will tell you that this country can not be a successful livestock section, because it is impracticable to raise feed."

Mr. Hogan's father has made forty-two crops in Nacogdoches county and has never bought a pound of feed.

P. B. Melton of Appleby, stated that at one time in his career as a farmer and stock man, he purchased a number of high priced dairy cattle and that his wife accused him of borrowing to "carry" the cattle but that in the end it "turned out" that the cattle were carrying the farm.

Dr. J. D. Ellington was introduced as a "tooth carpenter" by profession, gentleman by instinct, and livestock breeder by preference. Dr. Ellington stated that he was keenly interested in better dairy cattle and that he was satisfied and happy in his efforts to raise the standard of his favorite breed.

Arthur Seale made a very happy and inspiring talk on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, of which he is President. Mr. Seale assured the stock men and farmers that the energies of the Chamber of Commerce would be directed largely to the im-

provement of agricultural interests in Nacogdoches county.

The chairman then introduced Mr. C. H. Deabler, the new County Demonstration Agent who will begin his services here April 1st. Mr. Deabler has had a very successful experience as County Agent in Brazoria and Hardin counties. In a few well chosen words, he assured our farmers that he was at their service day and night.

Mr. A. L. Ward, Sec. of Texas Swine Breeders Association, was then introduced and in a very earnest and practical way, explained the many advantages of the purebred livestock associations. Mr. Ward's travels take him to every part of Texas and in this way he has gathered from observation as well as from study, a rich fund of livestock information. Mr. Ward made a very favorable impression on his hearers and was urged to come back at a future date and deliver a lecture on the breeding, feeding and general care of livestock.

At this point in the meeting, a committee on nomination composed of Guy Blount, Chas. Watkins and B. Melton was named to submit a list of names as officers and directors of the association. The committee brought in the names of the officers as they appear above, and the unanimous election of the entire list followed.

The Chamber of Commerce served a plate lunch consisting of sandwiches and coffee with cigars. The lunch was served on the porch of the Chamber of Commerce building and proved to be an occasion of both social and educational opportunity.

It was the sense of those present, that the organization would hold quarterly meetings for the coming year. Mr. McKnight suggested that some of these meetings would probably be held at other points of the county than Nacogdoches. He stated that the Chamber of Commerce would be glad to entertain the stock men any time they prefer to come to Nacogdoches.

Bradley King offered the suggestion that the farmers would probably be glad of an opportunity to entertain the Chamber of Commerce, provided the business men would agree to come to the county.

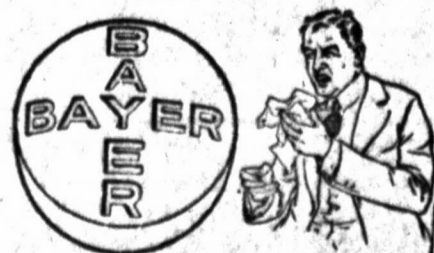

AGED LADY DEAD

Mrs. Elizabeth Crawford, one of the oldest persons in the county, died at 10 o'clock Thursday night at her home in Appleby. Had she survived until next July she would have attained the age of 90 years.

Mrs. Crawford had been ill for several weeks, and a few days ago was stricken with paralysis, which was the direct cause of her death.

WITNESS SAYS NAVY HEAD HELD BACK REPORTS.

Washington, D. C., March 26.—Charges that the navy department took steps to prevent reports reaching the public regarding the shortage of the personnel of the navy before the United States entered the war were made today before the senate investigating committee by Captain Joseph Taussig of the naval war college at Newport. Taussig served in the navy department prior to the war and on destroyers overseas afterward. He said Secretary Daniels in his annual report for 1914 stated that the numerical strength of the navy was adequate and in 1915 only an additional 10,000 men were needed, while the navy general board's 1914 report stated that 18,600 men were necessary.

NACOGDOCHES TESTS

Deep tests in Nacogdoches county has begun with great energy, according to reports from the vicinity of Melrose, which is located about 10 miles east of Nacogdoches. A. J. Queen & Company have erected a 112 foot derrick during the past week and it is understood that three other derricks are to go up within the next few days. However, it is not known just who will erect them. Dr. Queen, geologist, who is operating on private capital, said Saturday that he would receive 3,000 feet of casing this week from Beaumont, and also 3,000 feet of drill pipe. He said also that the necessary machinery for drilling purposes would arrive in Nacogdoches in the next few days, consigned to him.

It is understood that E. I. Banard, an oil man of prominence of Pittsburg, Pa., has a number of leases near Melrose upon which he will drill at once. Mr. Carsons of Dallas, it is understood, owns large holdings near Melrose and is also planning to begin drilling operations at once.

Another deep test is to be made at Swift by A. J. Queen & Company, or at least that company will own the controlling power in the corporation drilling the well. The Carolina Company, who is drilling around Oil Springs, will receive a new equipment of machinery in the next few days, and will use this machinery towards the completion of their 100 wells they are hoping to complete this year.

The Nacogdoches refinery for the refining of Nacogdoches county oil is now an established fact. Mr. Par-

ker, who is head refining man for the Carolina company, was here last week looking out a location for the plant, and he left Saturday for Tulsa, Okla., where he will ship the requisites for the refinery at once for Nacogdoches.

Oilmen continue to come to Nacogdoches, and they all seem to be enthusiastic over the situation.

MUST TEST SEED TO PREVENT COTTON LOSSES.

Warning to the cotton growers of the whole Mississippi Valley from Alabama to central Texas, that the cotton crop in many localities may prove a complete failure if good tested seed is not used, is given by the United States Department of Agriculture. While the farmers know that much of the seed counted on for this year is of low vitality, there has not been a full realization, to the danger to the cotton crop. Tests in different localities show that much of the seed this year has been less than fifty percent germination, whereas good planting seed should germinate approximately seventy-five percent.

Farmers are advised by the United States Department of Agriculture to ascertain the character of their seed in advance by utilizing a simple test, substantially the same as the so-called "rag doll" seed test which has been widely recommended by the department for corn seed. By this method the farmer can ascertain in five days the condition of his planting seed.

To test cotton seed by this method an ordinary towel or piece of muslin about 18 inches wide and two or three feet long is used. The cloth should be spread out and marked off lengthwise into three sections so that the two sides can be folded over and made to meet at the center, then two lots of 100 seeds each should be counted and spread out in two different parts of the middle section of portion of the towel. The sides of the towel are then folded over so that the edges meet in the center, covering the seed completely. The cloth should be pressed down firmly over the side then rolled up, a corn cob or a piece of broom handle being used for the core. The doll made in this fashion is tied in the middle with a string and then given a soaking in lukewarm water for several minutes until it is wet through. After draining off the surplus moisture so that it will not drip or become saturated at the bottom, the doll is placed where it can be kept warm and moist. It should be left five days in a temperature of about 80 degrees during the day and 60 degrees at night. It should not be placed near a window where it is likely to get too cool nor near the fire where it may become too warm. The doll should not be soaked again but should be kept moist by sprinkling a little each day.

At the end of five days unroll the doll and count the number of sprouted seeds in each of the two lots. Healthy seeds will send out white radicals or root beginnings not less than half an inch long. The number of well sprouted seeds in each lot represents the percentage of good seed. With this knowledge the farmer can decide for himself whether the seed which he plans to use is fit to plant, how thickly it must be planted in order to provide a normal stand and how large a stock should be reserved for replanting.

Planting too early is a danger that should be borne in mind, particularly in view of the severity of good seed stocks. Early planting is always preferable to late planting because the growth that plants make during moderate weather in the spring months is more apt to be normal. Furthermore early plants begin to fruit near the ground instead of producing large seed stalks which mow the crop late. But it is possible to plant too early and so have the seed rot in the ground or if the seed germinates the young plants may be killed by frost or stunted by too much cold weather.

Dallas, Texas, March 29.—Mrs. Nannie Webb Curtis, president of the Texas Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and past president of the national association, died today after a lingering illness, aged 59.

PASSPORTS ARE NECESSARY TO GET SQUARE MEAL

Geneva, March 26.—Towns along the Swiss-German frontier are calm, but railroad and telegraph conditions are chaotic and food is growing scarce in Southern Germany. Many wealthy German families, after much trouble in securing passports, are crossing the border to get good meals.

DEATH AND DESOLATION IN TORNADO'S WAKE.

64 Dead, Thousands Homeless

Chicago, Ill., March 29.—Restoration of wire communication in the six Central West states struck by the storm Sunday, causing property damage of many millions of dollars, is expected to swell the death list, which stood at 64 today. There are meager reports from the Southern Michigan peninsula and rural districts of Indiana and Ohio, where it may be many days before wire communication is fully restored. The Chicago district was the heaviest sufferer, with 29 deaths. Thousands are homeless in the states of Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Missouri, Wisconsin and Illinois.

Casualty List Grows.

Chicago, Ill., March 29.—Later reports indicate that 77 were killed in Sunday's tornado. It is thought that these figures will be increased when the rural districts are heard from.

Indiana reports 17 known dead, Michigan five and Wisconsin and Missouri one each.

Toledo reports 20 killed and hundreds injured and Elgin eight killed, over 100 injured and property damage at \$4,000,000.

Northern Indiana Stricken

Indianapolis, Ind., March 29.—Twenty-seven dead and about 100 missing was the toll of the tornado in Northern Indiana, according to reports.

Many Killed in Georgia

LaGrange, Ga., March 29.—The casualties in Sunday's tornado in this section are placed at 50 dead and over 100 injured. Approximately 100 homes were destroyed. The property damage is estimated at \$500,000.

The storm struck Western Georgia and Eastern Alabama, LaGrange bore the brunt of the storm, West Point, Ga., also reporting 10 persons killed. Agricola, Ala., reported five killed.

THE OIL LAND MUDDLE

Washington, D. C., March 29.—The government has filed motions for permission to intervene in the controversy between Oklahoma and Texas in the oil land dispute and that Texas be enjoined from granting title or permits to the land located north of the river's south bank.

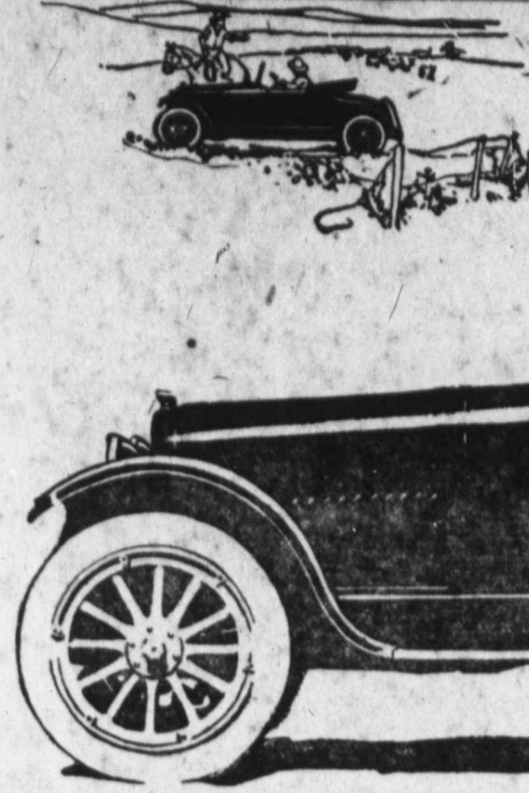

Paris, March 27.—Great quantities of arms have been discovered in Germany by Allied officers, according to advices received here. In Brandenburg alone 3,500 three-inch field guns were found. 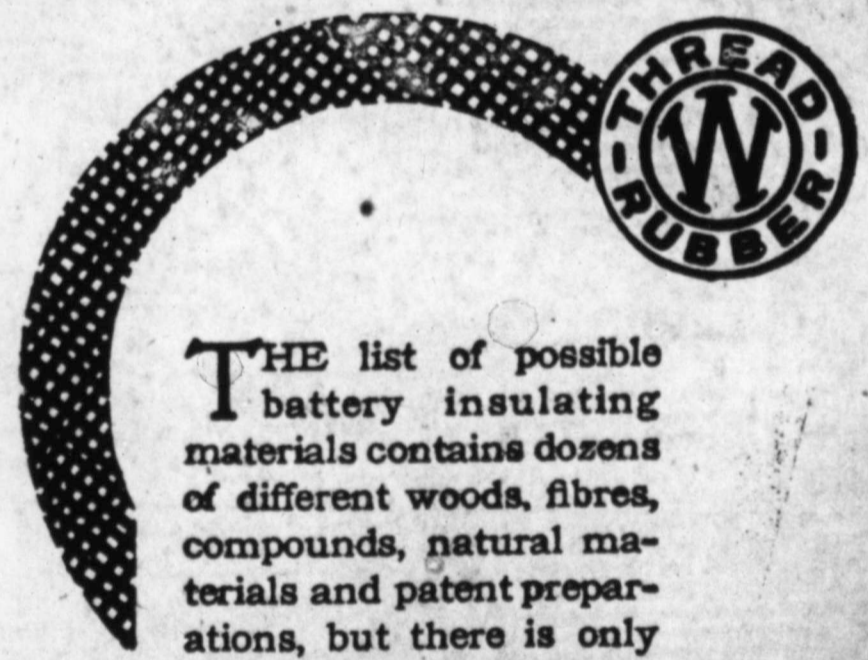

JUST OIL

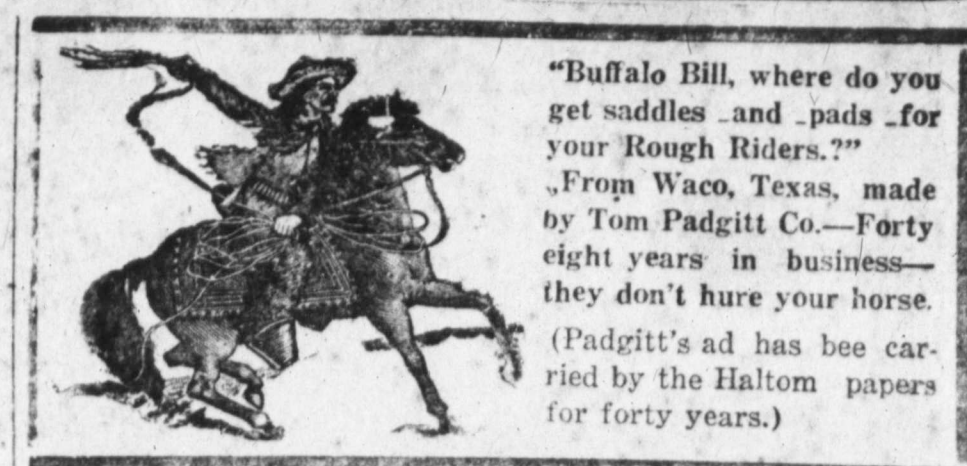

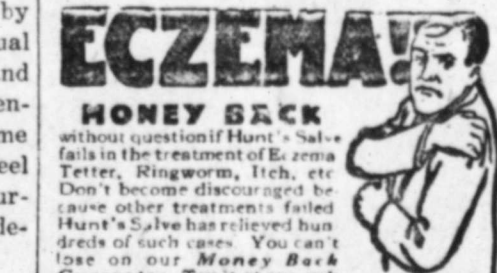

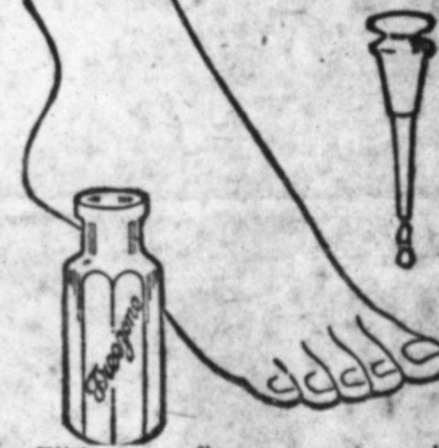
