



BIG MAN AND LANDIORD MA) ES MACOGDOCULS ROADS

From Houston Post.

Nacogdoches, Texas, April 26, 1919 The county commisioners are doing good work ont he main public highways. Col. Guy A. Blount, the commissioner of Beat No. 1, known as the town beat, and who is a civil engineer, is putting his roads in fine condition. Col Blount owns 10,000 acres of land in a body southwest from town, on which he has a plantation. An artificial lake fed by the Alazan Creek covers 100 acres, Water by hydraulic pressure is furnished the buildings and barns on the farm. Enough water is wasted from this lake to furnish electricity for 20 miles around. The lake is stocked with trout and white perch and fishing is best in the county. He has 12 large silos, which furnish food to fatten 500 steers which have been shipped to market within the last few days, bringing a fancy price. Col. Blount raises principally on his farm feed products, only making 75 to 100 bales of cotton per annum, if a full crop 1,000 to 1,500 bales of cotton could be produced each year. 


