## KILLING BOLL WEEVILS TO BEAT THE BAND

The prevalence of boll weevils has aroused the farmers as never before in the history of Rusk county. Throughout the southern portion of the county—Mt. Enterprise, Concord and Caladonia—a well organized campaign is raging against this, the greatest of all cotton pests. They are using lights which they make of snuff bottles, soda water bottles and all other kinds of bottles, which they fill with lamp oil, using cotton rope for wicks, and any handy vessel for water, using a small amount of oil in the water. In addition to the lamps all punctured squares are being picked up and burned. It is said by experienced boll weevil killers that the most effective way to stop their destruction is to destroy the first three families by picking up the punctured squares and burning them. This can be done by children, and a farmer told the writer yesterday that one child can keep ahead of an average plow, two furrows to the row. Why in the world, then, is it that the farmers will permit these miserable weevils to destroy their cotton. It is a matter of record that a negro near Mt. Enterprise, last year, picked and burned the squares on his cotton patch, made an overwhelming crop, paid his debts, and put several hundred dollars in the bank, while his neighbors' cotton was completely destroyed. That negro today is pursuing the same method, and his neighbors are doing the same. While writing this article two farmers came into the office, and declared that the picking up process is a success, and that they are going at it in earnest right now. There is no argument in the world against this plan, and it is the only one that will save the cotton crop when a few days additional work will save it. It is a matter of record that a negro near Mt. ## CONGRESSMAN J. C. BOX MAKES INTERESTING TALK

Thursday afternoon at the courthouse, Hon. John C. Box, congressman from this district, delivered an interesting address to a good-sized bunch of voters. ### ECUADOR HAS FEW SCHOOLS

Colleges in South American Country Out of All Proportion to Primary Institutions.

If the proportion of whites in the population of a country is to be taken as an indication of its intellectual status, then one might fairly expect only a very moderate intellectual achievement from Ecuador. One of the smallest of Andean countries, with its few mountain towns linked with the rest of the world practically not otherwise than through its one important seaport, its entire population is only about 1 1/2 million, and of this number all are Indians and blacks excepting the four hundred thousand of mixed origin and a mere one hundred thousand whites.

At best, the twelve hundred primary schools, with a nominal attendance of eighty thousand, do not begin to account for all the children of school age, and the thirty or forty secondary schools have to do with no more than forty-five hundred pupils, all told.

Like all Andean countries, however, Ecuador gives preference to all who assume to follow a professional career, and for higher instruction she counts the three universities of Quito, Guayaquil and Cuenca, with six provincial schools of trades and professions.

### Officers Copy d'Annunzio

Gabriele d'Annunzio's bald head has set the fashion for the officers of his little army in Fiume, many of whom have shaved their craniums and are endeavoring to grow miniature Vanduyke beards as copies of the poet's chin adornment.

The Fiume aviators have adopted the craze with greater zeal than other branches and call themselves "Iron Heads." Youthful officers in their teens and early twenties have shaved their heads and are wearing little pointed beards in an effort to look as much like the poet as they can.

Mixed uniforms of French horizon blue and Italian gray green are worn by d'Annunzio's men with great pride.

### Increase in Japan's Coal Output

Shipping and Engineering notes with interest that the output of coal in Japan during the first 11 months of 1919 was put at 25,825,000 tons, showing an increase of 2,740,000 tons, or about 10 per cent, as compared with the corresponding period of the previous year, in spite of the pessimistic reports made from time to time of the gradual exhaustion of the mines. This was attributed to the revival of old mines and the increase in the number of new mines, owing to the profitable prices obtaining, although the output in Kyushu, which constitutes 60 per cent of the total output, did not materially change.

### Scores Thomason On Prohibition Record

Waco, Texas, June 28.—Reports from various sections of the state concerning the broadside oratorical campaign which was staged on Friday and Saturday, June 25 and 26, by one hundred speakers who made three speeches each, in behalf of the candidacy of Pat M. Neff for governor, indicate that this coupe was rather sensational. In almost every instance the speakers featured the prohibition record of R. E. Thomason during 1917, asserting that Mr. Thomason had voted against the submission to the people of the constitutional amendment with respect to statewide prohibition, as recorded in the House Journal, page 892.

It was announced from the office of Mr. Neff that this corps of speakers had addressed at least fifty thousand people on these two days. Mr. Neff made no personal reference to any of his opponents in the six speeches which he made on Friday and Saturday.

### Wears Marine Uniform Has Never Seen U. S.

Peking, China, June 28.—The only U. S. marine in the world who has never seen the United States is on duty at the American Legation here. He is Private C. W. F. Childress, who was born of American parents in China. When he became of age a few weeks ago he decided to join the U. S. Marines and enlisted in the Legation.

Childress is a tall, good-looking lad who can speak the Chinese language like a native. His services as an interpreter are especially valuable to the marines. Through association with his parents and other American residents of China he is thoroughly familiar with the traditions and customs of the United States. He is looking forward to the day when he will see the country whose flag he serves.

### 2,000 War Prisoners Drowned In Russia

London, June 28.—Two thousand British, Austrian, German and Finnish prisoners of war were drowned when the bolshevik steamer on which they were herded was sunk recently in the Neva river, according to a dispatch to the Central News agency.

### County Demonstration Agent C. H. Deabler, Secretary H. L. McKnight and the reporter journeyed to Appleby Saturday afternoon.

On arriving there, Mr. Deabler made a talk on livestock, stressing "The Cow," and also made a talk on the boll weevil. "It is true that the Lord sent the boll weevil and put him on earth; but it is also true that He sent the tick, the rats, the fleas, the snakes and other pests. Now, are we going to kill the other pests and not give the weevils a round? I say no. The weevils can be combated, and we must combat them." The Appleby delegation heartily approved of his talk, and most of them promised to enter into the great fight.

### INSANE MAN'S WORK

Chicago, June 26.—Nolan B. Robinson, 23 years old, a fugitive from the insane asylum at Elgin, Illinois, was captured today and is held on the charge of beating with an iron bar and slashing with a knife his wife, baby, father-in-law, and mother-in-law, all of whom, the police say, cannot recover. Robinson, who served four years in the navy, kidnapped his baby and fled to Texas. He was arrested and returned, and then tried to kill his wife. He was sent to the asylum and escaped three days ago.

### JOINT VICTIMS

Scranton, Pa., June 24.—The general public and the mine workers were declared joint victims of the profiteering of the coal operators by Phillip Murray, vice president of the United Mine Workers of America, in presenting today to the Federal Anthracite Coal Commission a demand that workers in the Pennsylvania anthracite coal field be granted a minimum wage of \$6 per day.

### The Bubonic Plague Appears At Beaumont

Beaumont, Texas, June 28.—With the discovery of the second case of suspected bubonic plague here the authorities began an extensive rat eradication campaign here today.

### WODEN YOUTH ARRESTED FOR WHOLESALF FORGERY

Sheriff Woodlan and County Attorney L. G. King effected the arrest Monday of Guy T. Sargent of Woden, charged with the forgery of seventeen checks on which he realized money. To twelve of these bogus checks he signed the name of N. T. Sisco, to four the name of W. L. Linder and to one the name of L. J. Chism. The young man's campaign of forgery began in May and was pursued inlustrously up to the time of his apprehension.

The boy is only about 18 years old, of good appearance and has no mark of the criminal about him. His parents reside in the Woden community.

Young Sargent made a full confession of guilt to the officers. Why he resorted to this criminal manner of obtaining money is a puzzle.

### Thomason to Speak At Cushing July 7

Cushing, Texas, June 28.—Hon. R. E. Thomason, candidate for governor, will be the principal speaker of the day at the big barbecue to be held at Cushing July 7.

Arrangements are being made to care for six or seven thousand people on this day and large crowds will come from all over this section.

There will be other state candidates here on this day and the public is invited to attend.

### STRIKE OUTLOOK IMPROVES

Philadelphia, Penn., June 28.—A general improvement was indicated today in the trainmen's strike situation, according to a statement by the Pennsylvania Railroad. Many shopmen who struck Saturday have returned and the force is now 91 per cent of the maximum.

### Unemployment Cause Of Italian Unrest

Rome, June 28.—Reports of disorders in isolated separated parts of Italy appear to corroborate the impression that they are part of a deep scheme to overthrow the social order throughout the entire country. Unemployment is alleged as the reason for the strikes and rioting.

### PROMINENT RAILROAD MEN ARRIVE IN CITY

Monday afternoon on the 1:20 o'clock Houston train bound for Shreveport, Messrs. Roy Walker, superintendent of the H. E. & W. T. railroad, and Mr. A. J. Stenzel of the T. & N. O., and Mr. Weinert of the A. & N. R. and another gentleman whose name could not be obtained, arrived in the city for the purpose of attending the regular session of the commissioners' court in order to determine the proper tax rate to be placed on the railroads in Nacogdoches county.

### RAT EXTERMINATION URGED

Washington, June 25.—Calling attention to the discovery of bubonic plague in several American cities and renewing the warning regarding the introduction of the plague from Mediterranean ports known to be infected, Surgeon General Hugh S. Cummings today urged communities throughout the country, especially along the coast to inaugurate rat-extirpation campaigns.

### AVOWED PURPOSE TO OVERTHROW GOVERNMENT

Washington, June 25.—Evidence of the formation of the United Communist party by the consolidation of the Communist-Labor party and the Communist party, with the avowed purpose of fomenting a revolution against the existing government, was received today at the Department of Justice. Communist publications in the hands of the department announce the formation of the new party at a secret convention of delegates of the two old organizations. Officials said steps are being taken to guard against the spread of the propaganda.

### \$5 MORE PER PUPIL

Dallas, Texas, June 24.—"Five dollars more per pupil is assured to the schools than last year since Governor Hobby signed the \$4,000,000 school appropriation," said Peyton Irving, Jr., state supervisor of high schools here today. "The money was given by the legislature for increasing salaries," Mr. Irving said, "and trustees are morally if not legally obligated to give it to the teachers. One city recently became involved in serious complications through giving bonuses. The fair thing to do is to make teachers' contracts include the increase; if contracts have been made they can be abrogated and others made with increased salaries."

### URGES RATIFICATION

Washington, June 25.—President Wilson sent messages to Governor Bickett and Senators Simmons and Overman of North Carolina suggesting that he need not point out to them the "critical importance" of action of the North Carolina legislature on the federal suffrage amendment when it meets in special session next Monday. Governor Bickett, at Raleigh, commenting upon the president's message, said he hoped the Tennessee legislature would meet in special session and ratify suffrage, thus relieving North Carolina of doing it.

Smyrna, June 24.—The Greek army has begun an offensive against the forces of Mustapha Kemal Pasha, the Turkish Nationalist leader, according to an official statement issued by Greek army headquarters today.

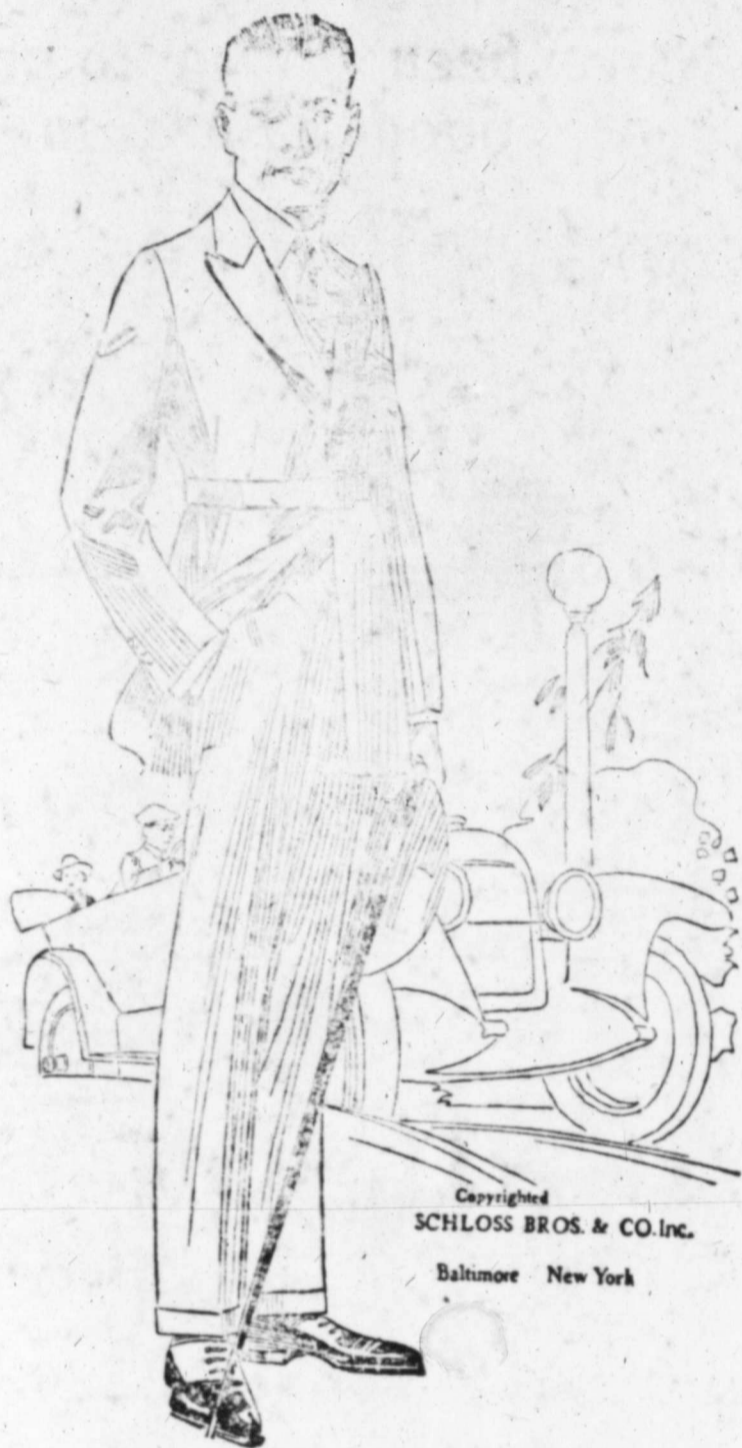

### PLANS FOR ONLY TWO ELECTIVE STATE OFFICERS

Santa Fe, N. M., June 24.—If a recommendation made by the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico is favorably acted upon by the next session of the state legislature and a constitutional amendment is ratified by the people, this state will be the first in the union to reduce its elective state officers to a governor and lieutenant governor.

At a meeting of the association in October, 1919, it was recommended that the number of elective officers be reduced to prevent the duplication of work, provide for greater efficiency and reduce state expenditures. Under the plan proposed the governor would nominate and "by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appoint all other state executive and administrative officers created by the constitution or laws of the state of New Mexico, including those hereafter to be created, and all such officers shall hold their respective offices during the pleasure of the governor."

### SNAKES DESTROYING MINNOWS

Austin, Texas, June 24.—Moccasin snakes are causing trouble in the vicinity of Livingston by eating ambrosia minnows, which are being placed in lakes and pools to devour mosquito larvae, according to E. H. Magoon of the International Health Board, who is connected with the anti-malaria work in that district. Otherwise, he said, the campaign is moving smoothly and is proving successful.

### MEXICAN BAND AT FAIR

Dallas, Texas, June 24.—Plans are under way with a view of bringing one of the great Mexican national bands to Dallas during the coming state fair.

Plans are that the band accompany high commerce officials and the industrial exhibit from the southern republic.

Senor R. N. Davalos of Monterey left Dallas for Mexico recently to confer with President Huerta regarding the sending of an exhibit and a band to the Texas fair.

### SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

Washington, June 24.—Assistant Attorney General Frierson advised Governor Roberts of Tennessee today that the legislature of the state could ratify the woman suffrage amendment without submitting the issue to the people. The governor plans, at the request of President Wilson, to call a special session of the legislature for that purpose.

### Sees Certain Victory

Washington, June 24.—Miss Alice Paul, chairman of the Woman's party, said today that Governor Roberts' decision to call a special session of the legislature to act on the suffrage amendment "means certain victory." A recent canvass of both the Tennessee houses, she said, indicated a safe majority in favor of ratification. "This will, of course, be a triumph for the Democratic party," she said. "It already has had the effect of pushing the republicans to efforts to secure action in Vermont."

### DIFFICULT OF SOLUTION

Chicago, June 24.—A well-confirmed report in labor circles today said the Railroad Labor Board was divided three ways, the labor holding out for an award which the company and public representatives think exorbitant, and the company group refusing to concede the award which the public group thinks reasonable. George W. Hanger, representing the public, declared today that there is nothing in the present situation to warrant the assumption that the board faces a deadlock. He said there is every indication that a satisfactory agreement can be reached within a reasonable time. Union leaders are not so optimistic. Brotherhood men who had adopted a passive neutrality later became openly hostile and declared they believe the board would be wrecked on the same deadlock that ended the previous tripartite attempt to solve the railroad problem.

### CABRERA IS SAFE

Mexico City, June 26.—Luis Cabrera, minister of finance in the cabinet of President Carranza, is reported to have reached United States soil and is said to be at Texas City. The movements of Cabrera since Carranza's death have been a mystery. He was reported once in prison. Cabrera is said to have large sums of money deposited in New York and in Europe.

### TRANSPORTATION SITUATION WOULD BE PARALYZED

Chicago, June 25.—Officials representing all the recognized all-railroad unions met here today in an effort to keep the men in line and put a halt to the unauthorized strikes which have been sweeping over the country for the past few weeks.

W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and spokesman for the union leaders, laid the responsibility of the present situation on President Wilson in a statement saying the president had permitted the Railway Administration to "dally along" nearly a year after the men had presented their demands; that it took the president forty days to appoint the Railroad Labor Board after the Esch-Cummings bill authorizing it came a law. Lee said, "We are here to discuss some way of avoiding the danger because of the government's delay in passing on our wage demand. Unless immediate action is taken we fear the transportation situation will be paralyzed."

### ABUTTING PROPERTY MUST PAY STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Austin, Texas, June 24.—The constitutionality of the act authorizing Texas towns to construct permanent street improvements and assess the cost against abutting property and providing for its enforcement and the collection of assessments was upheld by the Texas Supreme Court in the case of Noah Spears vs. the City of San Antonio. The court also affirmed the decision in a similar case from Dallas.

### GIRL'S ASSAULT SOUGHT

Dallas, Texas, June 25.—Several hundred farmers are searching northern Dallas county, according to reports to the sheriff's office here, for a man following an assault on a young woman found tied and gagged in a cane patch yesterday. Dallas county officers hurried to the scene. Leaders of the searchers are said to have declared they will not turn the man over to the officers if he is captured.

### STRIKE OUTLOOK BETTER

Chicago, June 26.—W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, today began work in an effort to bring back into the brotherhood 15,000 workers expelled for unauthorized strikes during the past year. He said: "With the promise of a wage-scale decision before July 20 retroactive on May 1, there is no reason for further dissension in our ranks. Already we have taken back 15,000 men who were expelled, and we will take back others who make proper amends."

It is reported that the board agreed upon a tentative average increase for various crafts of 22 percent, but members of the board refuse to corroborate the report.

### GREEKS ARE VICTORIOUS

Smyrna, June 2.—Greek forces engaged in the offensive against the Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor are advancing in four directions and have taken a number of towns, according to an official communique from Greek army headquarters of Thursday's date. A confirmation of the reported annihilation of the Thirtieth Turkish army corps has been received.

### British Take a Hand

London, June 26.—Brit' anchored before Ismid, Asia Minor, violently bombarded the Turkish lines stretched around the town, killing thousands of Turks, it was estimated, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Athens.

### MAIL FRAUD INDICTMENTS

New York, June 24.—Four oil companies, ten brokerage houses and about fifty individuals have been indicted by the federal grand jury on a charge of using the mails to defraud investors of millions of dollars.

### War on Oil Stock Swindlers

New York, June 24.—The indictments are said to be the beginning of a nationwide campaign against alleged oil stock swindlers, who are credited with cleaning up millions within the last few months. The first batch of indictments was returned after a long investigation by post-office inspectors.

### PRESIDENT G. F. W. C.

Des Moines, Iowa, June 24.—Mrs. T. G. Winter of Minneapolis was chosen president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, it was announced officially at the convention today.

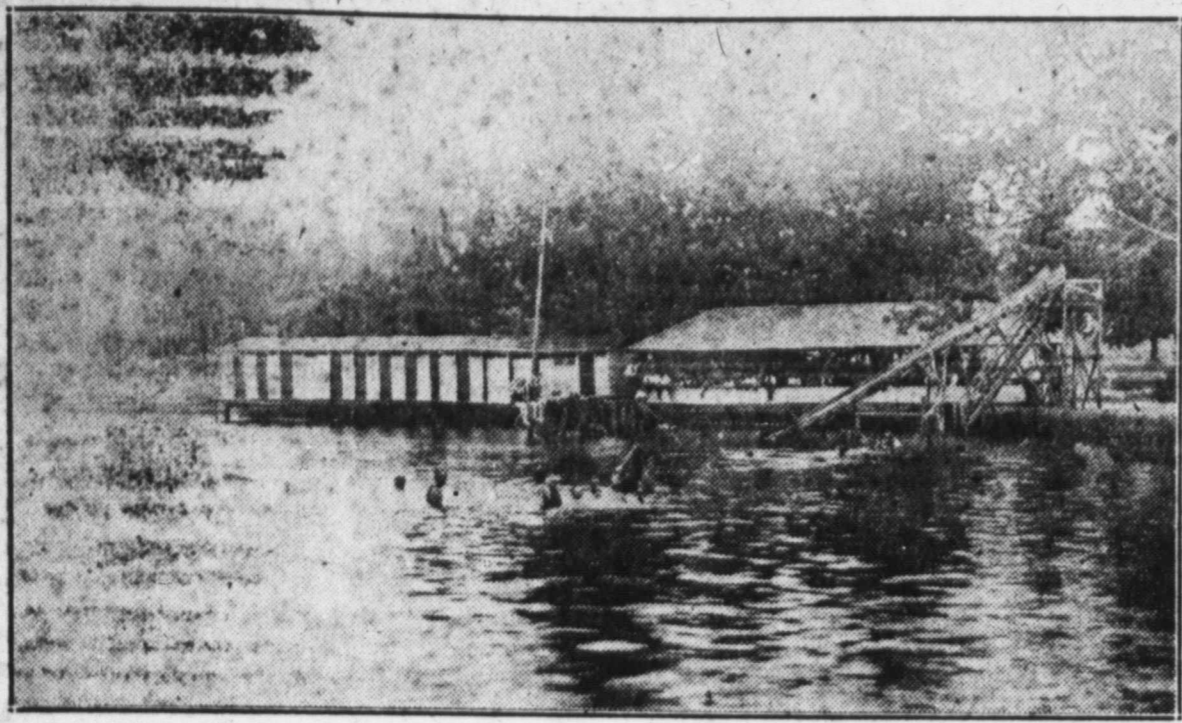
