


A total of \$1,183.00 was raised this year through the Christmas Card Project, sponsored annually by the Bovina Woman's Study Club.







On Friday, the team once again had a good start. Dickson and Snead scored early points, as Friona trailed, 18-17 at the end of the first quarter.


Brian Herring and Chad Hamilton each had five-point efforts as the Chiefs took a 35-31 lead at intermission.
