The Stone Fort National Bank

OF NACOGDOCHES, TEXAS

At Close of Business Sept. 8, 1920

It is almost humiliating to have a stranger to ask where the Old Stone Fort is. Suppose a 1 ading teacher among the recent atte dants at the big meeting had askel the question of an intellectual gra of the high school, would it have embarrassing?

NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

And what if asked about the origin and career of the "Old Stone For. the whens and the whys? Why wa it not sacredly preserved like the Alamo is?. The Alamo has recently been corefully beautified, its grounds and walks restored and the chapel roof renewed.

The original site of the "Old Stone Fort" has always been the "center of the surrounding country." It served as a monumental starting point for a survey of the town plot in 1852 made by Capt. A. A. Nelson. He began at a point 4 feet 6 inches southeast of the southeast corner of the Old Stone Fort. The lines and bounderies were located by measuring from this point on the Stone Fort corner. Another such point was adopted at the north west corner of the block on the south side of the main plaza isually called the public square. This was one of the central points back in the 30's. The old San Antonio road going west through the town passed this point, after passing the Stone Fort. It did not ascend the Iron Hill, nor descend the Orton Hill. These hills, now noted points on Main treet, had not then been built, or dopted and named. Travel had to ass up and down the hollows around hem.

The original roadways east and vest of town had not became roads. They meandered at will through the ionse woods over rough lands; they forked just over the creeks and led off in divergent ways. One of these roads was known as the Marion road. 😵 Later it became the Woden road, by a fork, and in like manner also the Shawnee road. It ran out on the east through Aqua Vitae Park. Another road ran down the Lanana road on the west side, known as the Mecheli Ferry road, and later, the Goodwin's Ferry road, now called Spradley's Fering from house to house in zigzeg then rough neighborhood roads, leading from house to house, in ziggzag or tortuous directions. They have since been circumvented or abandoned. When Uncle Bill Skillern first settled in the wild woods 65 years ago. where he now lives in a thick settlement, his road to town led up via Uncle Asa Moore's home, then known as the George Fenley place. The wild it is emimated that ninety-five perdeer were the only folks to bid him the time of day as they gazed at him and fled from him, a stranger. The old Spanish Bluff road first ed out from town via Dr. Campbell's, rid of it as quick as possible. Chamthen known as the Col. Forbes place. Traces of these old various pathways are yet to be seen. The olden time names of well known points and places are still interesting, but many of them are almost forgotten. For instance, the old Bruton homestead, five miles west of town on the Douglass road, has place. The Hayter White House at 8 ker addition. miles west is yet generally so called. The Monroe Sanders place at 10 miles is seldom mentioned by that name, or by its later name as the Joe Bruton place. The P. M. Sanders place on the lower Douglass road eleven miles from town was its mate. The Wat son place, one mile nearer town, was once the Bill Weaver home from which George Weaver was developed, and at which many events have transpired. ROAD BUILDING PROGRAM TO LAST ANOTHER YEAR

The hightway extending from Nacgdoches out to the Angelina river tovard Alto is now almost completed, according to County Judge J. M. Marshall. About three more weeks of work needs to be done on the highway. Two or three bridges must be built and some vitrified clay culverts the center of the room he was to installed.
