





RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination in the county of Nacogdoches, State of Texas, to be held at Nacogdoches on October 23, 1920, to fill the position as rural carrier at Nacogdoches and to fill other vacancies that may occur on rural routes from other postoffices in the above mentioned county.
