## A LOSS THAT IS UNNECESSARY

The loss to cotton farmers through the decline in the price of cotton is by no means the only loss they are suffering. The depreciation in the value of cotton left out in the open, subject to weather damage, also constitutes an important factor in curtailing the farmer's income from his cotton crop.

The Department of Agriculture in the United States last season conducted an investigation into losses from weather damage. Between November 25th and June 13th, the tests made showed that the damage done to exposed cotton averaged \$69.60 per bale, while the loss on properly stored cotton, resulting from the action of the weather, amounted to only 60 cents per bale.

The level of prices was much higher than now, of course, and the damage figures appear larger per bale than now. In fact, the average loss last year from weather damage was almost as much as a bale of cotton is worth now.

But the slow movement of cotton this year will tend to increase this damage, relatively speaking. Holding of cotton in small towns and on the farms is more general, due to the lack of demand. The presence of a great deal of damaged cotton in the market helps to depress the market, and complicates the problem of getting rid of the accumulation of low grade stocks.

This ruthless waste of a great product can be stopped by the further development of the licensed warehouse system. Many banks refuse to loan money on cotton stored in open yards or upon farms. In the licensed warehouse the bale of cotton is an asset that can be realized upon more readily, and when it is sold it loses little or nothing of its value through material depreciation.—Houston Post.

## THE NEGRO IN THE NORTH

Northern industrial centers are not turning out to be the Utopian havens for the Southern negro that many negroes were made to believe when there was an extraordinary demand for labor in those centers.

Now that production is being curtailed and there are more workers than jobs, it appears the negro of the North is getting the worst of the deal, among the various classes of labor.

When necessity arises to reduce working forces, the negro is the first to be let out, and he is discriminated against in many instances where labor is being re-employed. The North, according to these reports, is not nearly so insistent on giving the negro a square deal industrially, as it is that the South shall give him a square deal politically.

While the negro enjoys some social privileges in the North that he is not accorded in the South, the prejudice against the negro as a worker is undoubtedly much greater in the North than in the South, and as unemployment increases the discrimination against the negro in industrial circles may be expected to increase.

The unfavorable industrial situation in the Northern cities is likely to cause a great deal of suffering among the negro residents this winter. In many districts they are living in crowded and extremely uncomfortable quarters, and even if there was not a housing shortage, the prejudice against their entering many neighborhoods, would prevent relief from this condition.

Jobless, hungry and cold, many a Southern negro is having his fond memories of Dixie revived these days, and no one need be surprised if the return of negroes to the South, already reported under way, results in a rather general home coming between now and next spring.

These experiences should teach thousands of negroes to appreciate their opportunities of the South, the section they know, and the section that knows and understands them, and help to allay the racial unrest that the war provoked.—Houston Post.

## EGGS IS EGGS

Discussing the price of eggs this morning, it was ascertained that one dozen eggs are now bringing on the local market about the same amount of money as a bushel of corn. It is yet some time until Christmas and it makes one shudder to think what eggs will be worth at Yuletide. A wholesale man in this city said that he could buy eggs in the state of Tennessee and have them shipped to Lufkin for the retail trade cheaper than the prevailing prices. He also said that he could buy corn in Kansas and the shipping charges on same from there to Lufkin would be greater than

the cost of the corn. About the only commodity bought in carload lots these days, he said, that the freight charges were not more than the product is salt, and that there is such little profit in salt, he figures that the railroad companies have not the heart to charge more for hauling it. Even salt it "out of sight" in price, compared with pre-war quotations, salt now being worth one dollar and five cents wholesale.—Lufkin News.

## RESOLUTIONS OF THANKS

By virtue of an appointment by Camp Henry Raguet, No. 620, U. C. V., at a regular meeting on the second Saturday in November, 1920, I hereby present the following resolutions:

That, Whereas, the good people of Nacogdoches who did so much for the members of the camp in assisting them in their attendance upon the reunion at Houston on the 6th, 7th and 8th of October, 1920, appearing to fully appreciate the sincerity, promptness and great unanimity with which the South responded to the call to arms, as we believed then and believe now, to maintain righteous principles and defend sacred rights:

And, Whereas, they, we hope and believe, as we who went to war's gory front, do not believe that the result of that unparalleled conflict settled the fact that our cause was an unrighteous one, but God, in shaping the destinies of nations for His own wise purposes, then unknown to us, permitted it to end as it did, that there might be an end to the hatred and disturbing issues that arose from conflicting constructions of certain principles in our fundamental law, and that in the course of time a stronger union between the state perfected, Democratic doctrine perpetuated, and our dual form of government adapted in the nation's birth will live and continue to grow stronger until the world is convinced that it is the wisest and most perfect ever organized by man;

And, Whereas, the U. C. V. organization is so encouraged by the co-operation and the help of the people of the South, it is hoped and believed that histories will soon be written giving such clear and succinct statements of the conditions existing prior to and during the conflict that the reading public can easily find an analysis of the issues between the sections, the causes of the conflict found in the different constructions of our political fabric, the complex organism of a dual form of government, the constitution itself; and the South will be completely exonerated from all blame because of its being an instrument in the hands of an Almighty and All Wise God in shaping the destiny of this republic.

The old flag is more respected and honored by the steadfast old heroes of the South and their descendants and loved as of yore, and as President Davis said in his farewell address to the United States Senate when his state seceded they "hail it with the rising and bless it with the setting sun;" be it

Resolved, That we, members of the said camp, hereby express our appreciation for what the soliciting committee, Messrs. E. H. Blount, L. G. King and J. J. Bowden, and the people of the city have done for us. We respect and love and honor them for the spirit made manifest by their kindness. ## TRUCK GROWERS MEETING

On last Friday evening twenty-one of our substantial farmers met in the Farm Bureau office to consider the advisability of forming an association for growing and shipping truck crops here next season.

After a thorough discussion of the project it was decided to call another meeting for December 21, at which time it is expected that signed pledges will be secured for growing not less than one hundred acres of tomatoes and possibly as much of some of the other staple crops. It was the consensus of opinion that truck farming would prove profitable in this section, under proper management, as it has proven in other sections, notably the Jacksonville and Tyler districts, where truck crops have for the past fifteen years been the leading industries of the country.

Quite a number of those present have tested the tomato industry in a small way, and from their experience they believe it will prove a better paying crop next season than cotton. It is not the intention of those who are promoting the truck business to advise our people to quit cotton and put their whole crop in tomatoes, it would be unwise to do this; but it is believed from experience that crop diversification will pay. It is an accepted fact that our lands around Nacogdoches are as well suited to trucking as any other lands in Texas.

## FERTILIZER EXPERIMENTS

The Chemical Division of the Texas Experiment Station will again conduct co-operative fertilizer experiments in different parts of the state. The number of experiments that will be carried out will be limited to fifty. The object of the experiment is to enable the farmer to decide what fertilizer is best suited to his own conditions by actual tests in the field. The experiment covers one acre for crops such as peanuts, sweet and Irish potatoes. The farmers agree to follow directions, pay the freight on the fertilizer and report results. Applications will be sent on request to G. S. Frapps, State Chemist and Chemist Experiment Station, College Station, Texas. Applications will be accepted as far as possible, in the order received so that the experiment will be distributed over the state, but only fifty applications can be accepted. The results of ten years of such experiments are published in Bulletin 235.

## "TERRACING SCHOOL" ON THE MARONEY FARM

Beginning Thursday, December 10, and continuing through Friday, a school of terracing was held on the T. J. Maroney farm under the direction of County Agent McKnight, C. L. Beason of Owensboro, Ky., and M. R. Bentley of A. & M. College.

Those in charge of the school report the attendance good and the interest very lively. Among those who came to take instructions were Billie Sisco, Buford Forsythe, Ernest Matthews, J. B. Christopher, B. K. King, T. J. Anderson, J. H. Burrows and quite a number of others. Five of the school boys from Oak Ridge came along with their teacher, Prof. Matthews, and took turns at running the level. Superintendent R. F. Davis came out on Friday with a group of his high

school boys who manifested keen interest in the work. Quite a number of business men from town were present to see what a rolling hillside farm looked like when protected with a broad based terrace.

County Agent McKnight plans to conduct three or four similar schools in other parts of the county early in January. These schools will probably be conducted in the Appleby, Garrison, Cushing and Douglas communities, and will be held for the express purpose of training a number of farmers in the work of terracing.

The Nacogdoches State Bank was busy Saturday morning removing its old fixtures and replacing them with new. The bank would have had its old fixtures removed long ago and its new furniture in use, but the contract-

ers who were doing this work were delayed, according to Mr. Guy Stripling.

## PEANUT SEED SELECTION

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, A. & M. College, after making exhaustive tests at Nacogdoches Substation with sixty-four families of Spanish peanuts, has found one or two to be outstanding as high yielders. Those prolific strains are being rapidly increased for distribution among growers, so that much greater production may be possible and this already profitable crop may become even more profitable. Distribution of these improved seeds should begin for the 1922 crop season, says a bulletin from the experiment station.

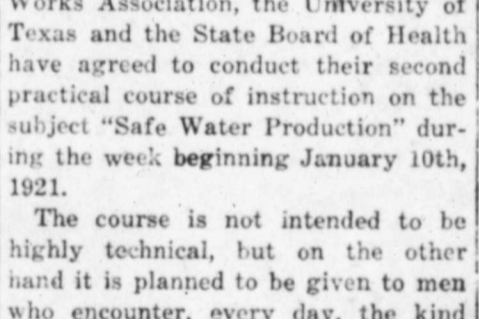

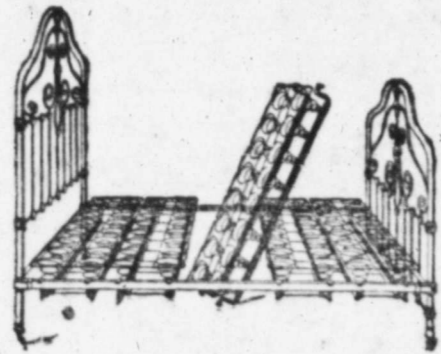

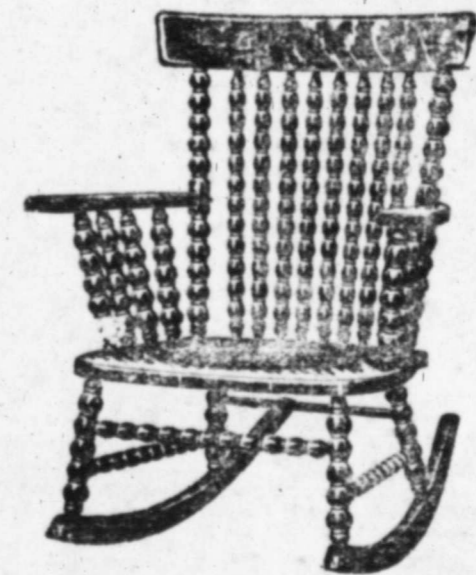
