



To indicate the fine perceptions of these instruments, Professor Woodworth said that in times of severe storms at sea the crash of the surf on the rocky coast of New Foundland is registered at the seismograph laboratory here.

THE GOVERNOR'S RETRENCHMENT MESSAGE

Governor Neff's message recommending the abolition of unnecessary boards and commissiions is more important for what is may achieve in the direction of efficiency than for what it is apt to have in money. He estimates the saving of \$100,000 a year, or 2 1-8 cents per capita of population per annum, which is an insignificant sum when considered in the light of governmental efficiency.

What the governor strikes at is innecessary service, overlapping service and duplicated service. No doubt there is much of it in the state government.

The people are ever and eternally importuning the legislature to establish this board or that commission to do this thing or that, which may have much or little merit. Legislatures are composed of human units, and they respond according to the authority and influence of those who want something controlled, regulated or done.

And as years pass, no doubt, the government structure becomes topheavy and in a measure packed with men whose service might be dispensed with and not hurt anything.

The tax rate is low, and would be low if the assessed valuaions represented the whole wealth of the state instead of 20 percent of it. But duplicated government, having n mind federal, state, county, municipal, precinct, district, and what not, all operating together brings the total cost up to large figures. If it were possible to have the system thoroughly remodelled, without affecting one vital principle, but merely avoiding duplications, unnecessary operations and overlapping servise, to say nothing of the worthless overhead and useless red tape, we might have truly tolerable, conditions in this country. Perhaps Governor Neff has pointed the way to a great movement that may include counties, cities, precincts, states and the nation itself. They flew over in flocks so large and dense as to cause a shadow on the earth such as are made by clouds. Wild geese, wild ducks, pigeons, blackbirds, etc., flew southward as cold winter approached, and northward as hot weather came on. Wild pigeons had roosts in the tall timber of East Texas and would overload the trees to the limit, often breaking the limbs. In these flying flocks the roar was often like a windstorm. CHILD KILLED BY TRUCK

Mr. J J. Boyd of Appleby telephoned the Sentinel the news of a shocking accident which occurred at that place early Wednesday morning. Max, the 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Ed Hill, while on his way to school, was run over by one of the road-working trucks and instantly killed. The driver of the truck was a Mr. Wade, whose home is in San Augustine, and it is said he was not to blame for the unfortunate occurrence. The sympathy of the entire community is with the beart-broken parents. Mr. Wade came to Nacogdoches Wednesday morning for investigation of the circumstances of the death of the child, and from the officer who accompanied him it was learned that the boy undertook to swing on to the rear of a truck meeting the one which ran over him, and when within about two feet of the oncoming machine stepped from behind it and directly in front of the one driven by Mr. Wade. There was no possible chance to stop the truck in time to prevent it from striking the lad, and the tragedy followed. It appears to have been an unavoidable accident.


