Our harvest fields with snow.

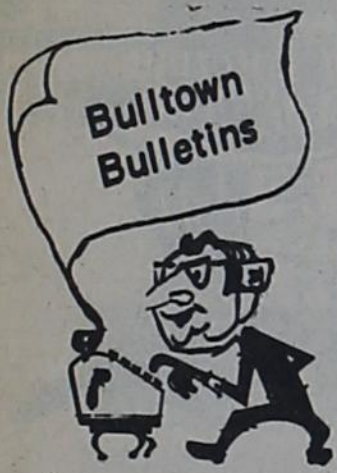
Through vales of grass and meads of flowers

The other contestant to correctly pick nine games was George Douglas, whose tie-breaker score was 27 points off.

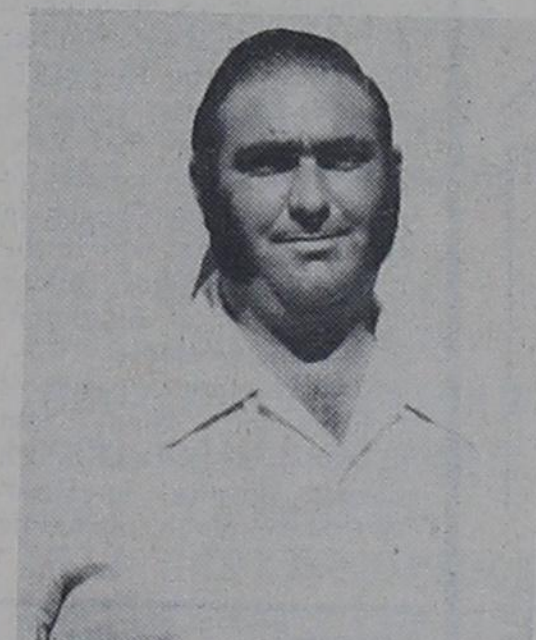

A.W. (Dub) Anthony Jr. of Friona, Texas was honored Thursday at the First Annual Golden Spread Agri-Business Seminar by being named as the Outstanding High Plains Farmer and-or Rancher for 1976. Anthony is the first High Plains resident to receive the award.

A total of 26 area counties were invited to submit nominees for the honor. Anthony was the Parmer County designee.

The Golden Spread Agri-Business Seminar is sponsored by the Agri-Business Committee of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce of which Steve Messenger is Chairman.

According to Messenger, it has long been the desire of the Agri-Business Committee to establish an annual seminar, at which businessmen and agri-businessmen may gather to honor the food and fiber industry and to learn more about the individuals involved in that endeavor. Centered at the Villa Inn Convention Center, the 1976 Seminar is hoped to be the first in a long succession of such yearly events.

Sales Tax Checks Sent

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that his office mailed checks totaling \$13.2 million Monday to 640 Texas cities as their November rebate of the one-cent city sales tax.

Bullock said this raises to \$252.2 million the amount that the cities have received in rebates this calendar year, an increase of \$28.5 million—or nearly 13 per cent—over the same period a year ago.

The rebate checks ranged from \$2,532,776 for the City of Houston to \$501.38 to Springtown.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by retailers. The comptroller's office rebates to the cities their share on a monthly basis.

Bovina's share of the sales tax rebate for November was \$838.17. Farwell received \$565.48 and Friona, \$4,188.79.

might be described as a farmer-rancher-cow-calf businessman. Presently concerned with a total of 1120 acres in dryland, irrigated and grass land, Anthony began farming in 1936 in Oklahoma, with 160 acres he rented and using his father's equipment.

By 1941, he had rented more acreage, purchased equipment with a FSA loan, and moved into Hobart, Oklahoma where he also worked as a mechanic to "make ends meet." In 1943, Anthony came to Texas and began the rental and acquisition of land that now comprises his operation at Friona.

Despite drought, hail, set backs and price fluctuations, Anthony has established himself professionally and in his community. He has followed agricultural research through the years, using many of the developing ideas in the area. As President of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, he helped finance Green Bug resistant work in milo. He has also moved more to minimum tillage practice and has changed and modified some of his machinery, particularly a six-row planter which he built to deliver the job he specifically wanted it to do.

Anthony uses water pits to conserve water on his irrigated land, strives to develop better tillage practices, and rotates crops to prevent water and nutrient loss. He leaves stubble to work into the soil

and summer-fallows a portion of land each year. Crop yields, according to Anthony, are above average for his area.

The Anthony cattle operation involves a cow-calf herd which he believes is as good as any Herefords "anywhere." Steers are run on grass in the summer, in New Mexico and are fed in winter.

An Anthony philosophy is an obligation to improve the land and community where he lives. In that vein, he has served the ASCS committee, helped raise money to build a hospital, rest home and other community centers.

He is a life-long member of the Methodist Church and has served in the following capacities: Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agri-Business Committee; Agriculture Advisor to Senator Lloyd Bentsen, two years; Agriculture Committee Advisor to Federal Energy Office, three years; Secretary, Board of Directors, Parmer County Hospital, thirty years.

Also, President, Grain Sorghum Producers Association, eight years; Director, Grain Sorghum Producers Association, twenty years; Director, U.S. Feed Grain Council, eight years; Director, Secretary, Deaf Smith Rural Electric Board, eleven years; Director, Plainview Production Credit Board, four years; President, Friona Farmers Co-op Gin Board, fourteen years; and Director, Friona Wheat Growers, six years.

Anthony and his wife, Irene, are the parents of three children. In 1976, Anthony and his son formed a partnership which now operates the family holdings.

Trophy for the Outstanding Farmer and-or Rancher recipient is a Cowboy sculpture work by Garland Weeks.

American farmers will soon be replacing professors and economists... at least in the ranks of one international agency. Officials of the U. S. Agency for International Development (AID) have decided the farmers of this country can be far more effective for training farmers in underdeveloped countries than anyone else. Part of the criticism of the current and immediate past programs has been that the Ph.D.s and agricultural economists have so overwhelmed the natives of underdeveloped countries with technology relatively little has been accomplished. Under the new guidelines, an American farmer would work directly with a group of about 100 native farmers... at a realistic pace the natives could understand. Although just now getting off the ground, AID executives hope to soon have several American farmers in each of the 40 underdeveloped countries participating in the program.

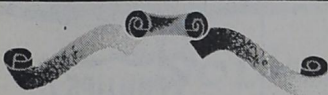
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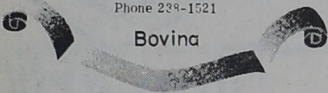

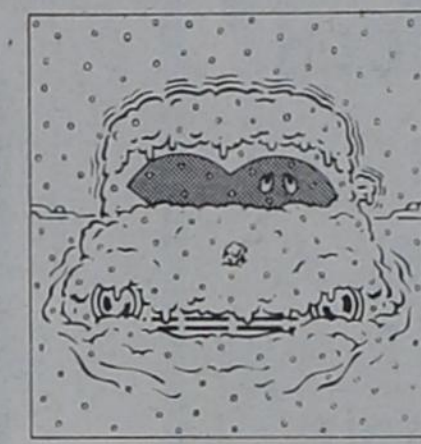
Art-Craft Jewelry Fair

MATURITY

"So that we may no longer be children." It would seem that there is a sense in which a person should always be a child. He should retain a child's simplicity of heart, a child's teachableness, a child's faith, and a child's sense of wonder. Doubtless Christ was thinking of these qualities when he said, "Except you be converted and become as little children you shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven."

It is a sad thing to lose a child's heart, but it would be just as tragic to retain forever a child's mind. It is not that a child's ideas are necessarily wrong, but that they are inadequate, partial and incomplete. The Christian life is represented everywhere in the Scriptures as a process of growth. But as we grow in mind toward Christian maturity, let us be careful not to lose our childhood heart. As Pascal says: "The heart has reasons which reason cannot know. It is the heart that feels God, not the reason." None of our problems, whether they be individual, social, political, or religious can be rightly solved apart from the childlike spirit. The beauty of the Christian life is that it enables us to possess both the heart of a child, and the mind of an adult at the same time. Christ possessed the sincerity and purity and faith of a little child. But at the same time, his wisdom and judgment surpassed that of all others. Let us grow in maturity but at the same time not lose these qualities of heart.
