





The tall grass and weeds near buildings MUST BE CUT NOW and removed or drastic action will be taken to have this done.



er the grave of Miss Bell Florine ("Dee") Ramsey, who was drowned while in swimming at Lufkin Wednesday night. The last rite were conducted by Rev. J. L. Massey of the Methodist church, and the remains of the beloved girl were laid to rest amid the sobs and tears of those who had known her in life, in some cases the grief displayed being piteous. A huge mound of beautiful flowers covered the grave, many of the offerings being of exquisite pattern-a floral display rarely, if ever, equaled here. Immediately after the interment of Miss Ramsey, the body of Eugene Johnson was laid to rest a short distance away, Rev. S. D. Dollahite of the Baptist church conducting the services. The young man was killed in a train wreck near El Paso Sunday and the stricken family had his body brought home for burial. Here, too, were evidences of the deep grief of relatives and friends, and the sympathy of those present went out to the sorrowing ones.

NACOGDOCHES YOUNG LADY WAS DROWNED IN LUFKIN

What has otherwise been one of the most pleasant Teachers' Institutes ever conducted in East Texas, the present one at Lufkin, was marred last evening by one of the most regrettable tragedies in the history of the town, when it became universally known about'8 o'clock that Miss Bell Florine Ramsey, one of the teachers attending the institute from Nacogdoches, was drowned at the Jones Lake while swimming with a merry party of friends. SEES CLOTHING AS BLESSING

Writer of Opinion That Some of World's "Big" Men Do, Well in Covering Themselves.

Wherever one goes in Polynesia one is reminded, by contrast, of the cost physically to men of our own race of our sheltered way of living, writes James Norman Hall, in Harper's Magazine.

There on every hand are men well past middle life, with compact, symmetrical bodies and the natural grace of healthy children. One sees them carrying immense burdens without exertion, swimming in the open sea for an hour or two at a time while spearing fish, loafing ashore with no greater apparent effort for yet longer periods.

Sometimes, when they have it, they eat enormous quantities of food at one sitting, and at others, under necessity, as sparingly as so many dyspeptics. It would be impossible to formulate from their example any rules for rational living in more civilized communities. The daily quest for food under primitive conditions keeps them alert and sound of body, so that, whether they work or loaf, feast or fast, they seem always to acquire health by it.

I thought of the strange appearance certain of the chief men in America or France or England would make under similar circumstances, deprived of the kindly concealment of clothing. What a revelation it would be of skinniness or pudginess! What an exhibition of scrawny necks, fat stomachs, flat chests, flabby arms!

To be strictly accurate, I had seen some fat stomachs among elderly Paumotuans, but they were exceptions, and always remarkable for that reason. And those who carried them had sturdy legs. They did not give one the uneasy feeling, common at home, at the sight of the great paunches of sedentary men toppling unsteadily along a strip of crimson carpet, from curb to club doorway.

HOARDER CHASTISED IN 1777

"Coffee Party," Composed of Boston Women, Confiscated His Gooda, According to Old Letter.

"Females" of ye olde Boston, staging a "coffee party" in 1777 which rivaled in a small way the famous "Tea Party" in 1773, personally chastised a profiteer hoarder of foodstuffs and confincated some of his stock, according to a letter from Abigail Adams to ber distinguished husband, later second President of the United States. Writing at Boston, under date of BAPTIST CHURCH AND SUN-July 31, 1777, Abigall wrote to John, then attending the Continental congress at Philadelphia:







The extensive researches of Kidder, Morris and Nelson dave established a relative chronology for the pottery types in this valley.

"Good Queen Bess" of England.

Elizabeth, the "Good Queen Bess" of England, whose reign from 1558 to 1603 was one of the most glorious periods in the history of her country, was the daughter of Henry VIII and Boleyn. When Anne fell from favor and was beheaded, the young princess was declared illegitimate and for a time had an unhappy life. Finally, however, she was given her place in the succession, after Edward and Mary, and during Edward's reign she lived a peaceful life. While Mary was on the throne Elizabeth was more or less an object of suspicion, for it was well known that she had been brought up a Protestant, but at Mary's death in 1858 her right to the throne was unquestioned. The great issue confronting her was that of religion. She restored Protestantism, reinstated the English Book of Common Prayer and asserted the royal supremecy over the church, but she avoided fanaticism and showed herself willing to call to her aid Catholic as well as Protestant ministers.-Kansas City Star.

Arabian Horse Has Less Backbone. The tradition ascribing to the Arab horse extraordinary endurance is sustained by abundant evidence. H. K. Bush-Brown, who presents the case for the Arab in the Journal of Heredity, offers an explanation of the extraordinary endurance of animals of this breed based in part on the fact that the Arab has only five lumbar vertebrae (between the ribs and the pelvis) while all other familles of horses have six. This difference in structure is believed to explain why the Arab, though small, can carry great weight. The anomaly illustrates the relation between structure and function.






