LAST TUESDAY'S General Election, while producing a better than average turnout in Parmer County as compared with the rest of the state, still was somewhat short of spectacular in some respects.

In Bovina, for example, with a new commissioner being elected, in addition to the important governor's, senator's and U.S. congressman's races, the voter turnout was 53 per cent of the total eligible voters.

This compared to a whopping 76 per cent turnout of the eligible voters in the Lazbuddie precinct, who also were electing a commissioner, and 47.3 per cent at Friona, where there were no local races.

Since the number of qualified voters amounts to only about 60 per cent of those residents who are voting age, that means that the local precinct elected a commissioner with just 37.8 per cent of the populace of voting age registering their preference.

So, although our county and precinct were above the state average in the percentage of voter turnout, we wonder if more of our residents should not become interested in who shapes their destinies.

One opinion is that the average voter has been "turned off" by the way their senator and-or congressman has been representing them in Washington. Perhaps this could explain the low percentage of interest in the Democratic process. It also might explain why our state elected its first Republican governor in more than 100 years.

People seem to be looking for a change—and hoping for a change for the better.

OUR CONGRATULATIONS to all of the winners in last Tuesday's election, and our thanks to the losers for making the Democratic process possible.

As our friend Preston Smith told us at the airport in Austin last May the day following the primaries, explaining why, in spite of all the hassle, he decided to make the governor's race one more time, "You have to have candidates for the Democratic process to work."

AT A RECENT MEETING we heard from Dorothy Rylander, who had been Congressman Mahon's secretary a number of years ago, and who went back to help the Congressman close his office, and collect his papers, which should have considerable historical merit.

Mrs. Rylander said that she recalled one time when Admiral Hyman Rickover stopped by Mahon's office. Rickover had been one of the most powerful military officials in the nation, and able to ask for and get millions of dollars for the nation's defense.

On this particular occasion, the general had a modest request: "Do you think you could get me one of those miniature bales of cotton that I could have for a keepsake?" Gen. Rickover asked.

Mrs. Rylander related that it was her pleasure to fulfill the humble request of this military giant.

THE BOVINA MUSTANG football team, which suffered its share of adversity early in the season, has battled back to the point that the Ponies will square off for the district championship when the team hosts Vega on Friday.

Folks hereabouts used to say that it was a successful football season anytime the Mustangs beat Farwell, which they did some three weeks ago. A win on Friday would presumably make it an ultra-successful season.

Good luck Mustangs! Get a Longhorn!

Host 'Horns In Friday Shootout

Mustang Field will be the place, Friday night, November 17 at 7:30 p.m., the time. The Bovina Mustangs will be vying for the District 3-A crown. This will be the game for all the marbles, and the opponent is the defending district champion.

The Mustangs will take on the Vega Longhorns, a team that boasts an abundance of quickness, especially in the backfield. Vega will be led by their All-District Quarterback, Randel Galbraith.

The Longhorns run off of the "Power I" formation and rely a lot on sweeps and trap plays. Their passing attack is also something the Mustangs will have to defend against.

Harvest Hampered By Fickle Weather

Cold, wet weather for most of the past week has caused an interruption to the harvest activities in the Bovina area.

Although most of the corn harvest has been completed, the cotton harvest has not even started, and harvest of grain sorghum and sugar beets has been hampered by the wet weather.

Ever since the late season thundershower of Friday, November 3, which left .94 inch officially in Bovina, the area has been exposed to a couple days of warm weather, then a series of cold, misty days, such as the past weekend, when temperatures stayed only in the high 30s all day Saturday and Sunday.

Cotton farmers in the area are beginning to get restless due to the delay. A year ago on this date, there had been over 17,000 bales of cotton ginned in Parmer County, and a comparable figure for 1978 would be only a few hundred at most.

The official recordings of moisture by Greg Hromas, local weather recorder for Bovina, showed that a total of .46 inch since Saturday in

Bovina. This brings the month's total rainfall to 1.3 inches, and has been a God-send for the area's wheat crop.

But the milo, as well as cotton, is still needing a good killing freeze to hasten its maturity, according to local observers. Although it has gotten cold enough to make ice several mornings, we still had not had a "hard freeze" as of Tuesday, November 14.

School To Dismiss

School will be dismissed in Bovina for the Thanksgiving holidays next Thursday and Friday.

School will also be out this Friday for an in-service day for teachers, so students can look forward to some days off the regular grind.

School will resume at the regular time on Monday, November 27 following the Thanksgiving break.

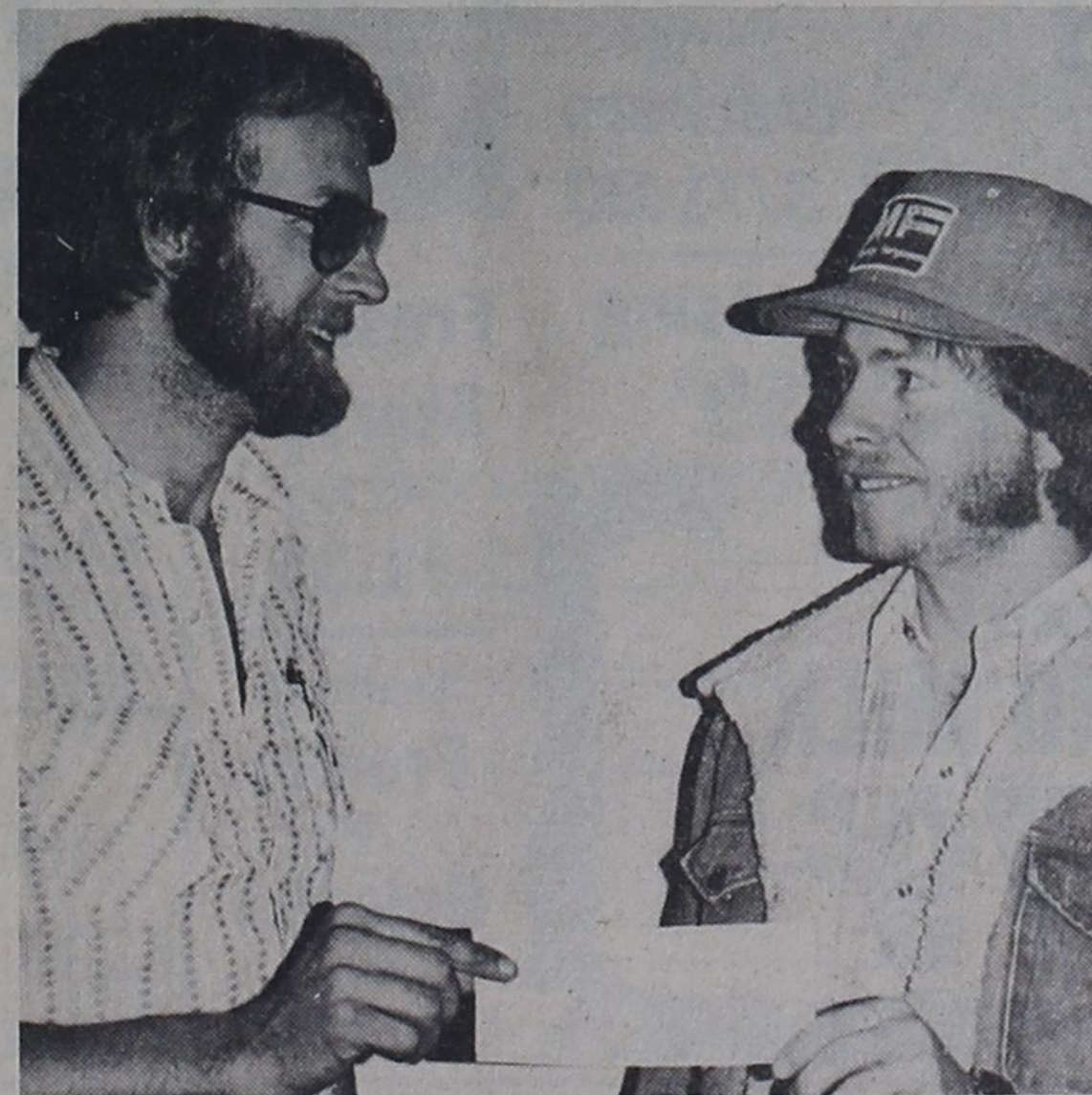
Contestants are vying for a grand prize of \$100 cash in the football contest. The prize goes to the contestant who has the best score at the end of the 13-week contest period.

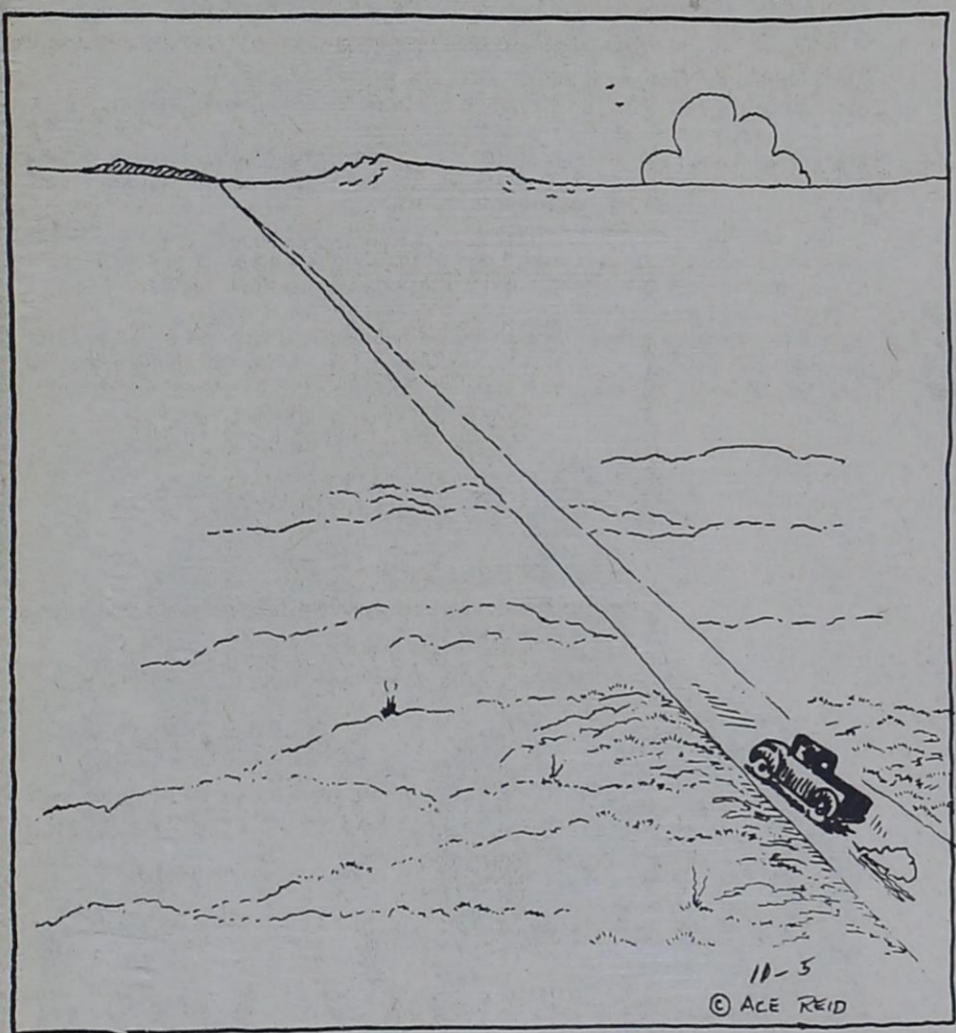

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Schrock Family Visits In Bovina

Air Force Tech Sgt. Robert Schrock, wife Maureen, and their two sons Robby, 8, and Christopher, 3 1/2, were visiting in Bovina this past week. They dropped by the Blade

office and visited for awhile. The Schrocks are stationed in Germany at this time, but were home visiting with their relatives, Joyce and Larry Hammonds.

Robert is with the Headquarters U.S.A.F.E. command in Germany and is currently stationed at Ramstein Air Base. He is in charge of storage management for munitions at all the bases in the European theater.

The Schrocks first went to North Africa in 1969, but were forced out when the revolution took place. They then went to Hahn, A.B., Germany in 1970. Both boys were born in Germany and were probably two of the best behaved children we've seen in a long time.

Robert told us of the trouble some of the military personnel are having overseas because of the "shrinking dollar." A two bedroom house costs about \$350 a month to rent, and the price goes up to about \$600 a month for a three or four bedroom house. McDonalds has just opened up a chain in Germany, and a "Big Mac" costs about \$2.25.

The Schrocks will be leaving shortly to return to Germany. Robert has about two years left on his tour of duty in Germany.

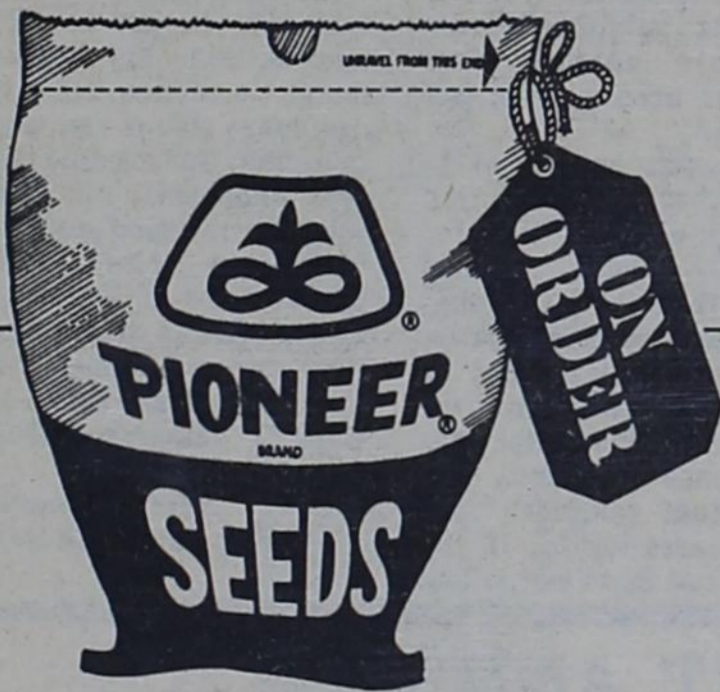

Mr. Kaltwasser was recognized for his outstanding demonstrations in water use which compared center pivot vs. furrow irrigation. This four-year study was the first of its type conducted in Texas. Mr. Kaltwasser is the vice-chairman of the Program Building Committee.

It was the success of the first farm demonstration on the Porter farm near Terrell, Texas, that led to the creation of the Cooperative Extension Service nationally, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in this state.

A documentary film on the Porter farm, "I Am Thinking of the Harvest" was shown for the first time during the anniversary celebration.

The next performance by the Colt Band will be at the 1978 Winter Concert on Thursday, December 21.

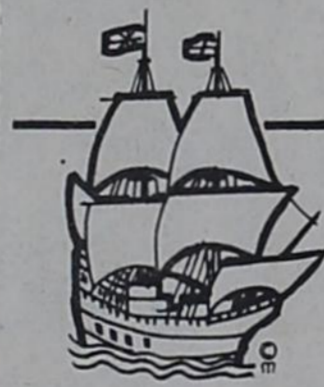

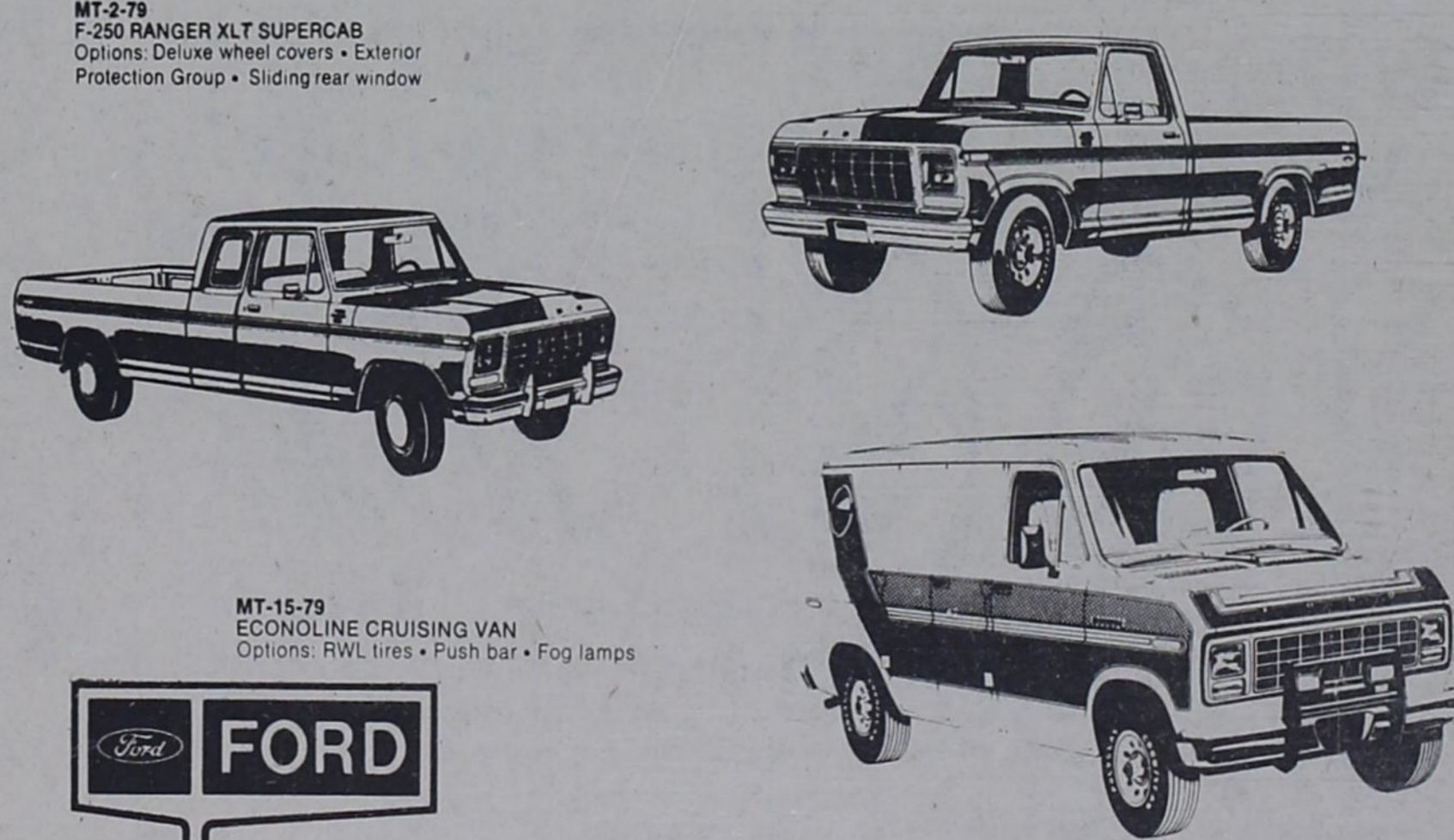
