## NO GAG ON TARIFF BILL

Defeat in the United States senate of a rule to gag debate on the iniquitous tariff measure now under discussion is evidence that desperate as the special privilege crowd is, it is meeting opposition.

It is not surprising that the comparatively few beneficiaries of the indefensible tariff code now being prepared shrink from the thought of what will happen if all the people understand how completely and shamelessly their pockets would be rifled by this measure. One of the ways to stop debate of the bill's features, indescribably vicious as was the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill, it is an amateur in comparison with the Fordney bill now under debate. There is scarcely a necessity of life that is not taxed so heavily that the consumer is bound to feel the pinch if the bill should ever be passed. Foodstuffs, material for clothing, household necessities are made the subject of high imposts. The consequence will be a swollen cost of living which plus the high taxes will make for most persons a harried, wearied existence.

The defeat of the cloture rule conveys the hope that this brazen robbery will not be committed without the people knowing still more about it, and knowing about it the consumer probably can be trusted to serve such convincing notice on their representative in congress that the great economic crime of a century may be averted.

### "WHELPS" AND THE LAW

"I refuse to get excited about some whelp. They brutally mistreated him, while other crimes go unchecked."

The above remark is attributed to J. Dixie Smith, candidate for district attorney of Harris county.

It is from a newspaper report of one of his campaign speeches.

If Mr. Smith has been incorrectly reported, he should so inform the public.

If he made such an utterance, he puts himself beyond the consideration of any law-abiding citizen for the office to which he aspires.

No man should be district attorney who condones mob violence.

Who knows when a man is a "whelp", Mr. Smith?

Is the mob to decide, or the courts? How do you know any "whelps" have been tarred and feathered in this state?

You do know many cowards and "whelps" have taken part in such acts of violence. You certainly know that any man who joins a mob instantly becomes a criminal.

A mob at Bakersfield, Cal., punished a man they had condemned as a "whelp." They brutally mistreated him. Three members of the mob have been convicted by the efforts of a fearless district attorney and they will serve penitentiary sentences.

No member of the mob has been able to prove anything against the man they condemned as a "whelp." The mob made a mistake. They acted without evidence and without legal authority. They obeyed some grand cyclops of an "invisible government."

The California courts would not stand for it. A brave sheriff and a real district attorney stopped mob law in that state.

Somebody in Bakersfield got "excited", especially the district attorney's office.

If you refuse to get "excited" because the mob condemns and tries and metes out punishment, what will excite you, Mr. Smith?

Utterances like those attributed to you encourage the mob. It is only a step from the mob to anarchy and from anarchy to revolution.

Harris county wants a sheriff and a district attorney who will become "excited" when the mob takes charge of a "whelp."

If the mob is to decide who is a

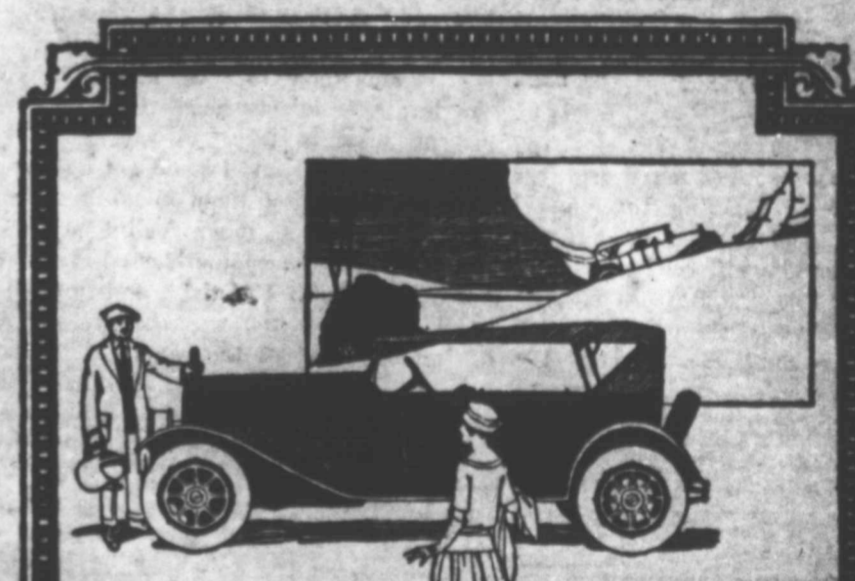
Whelp, why have our courts and a sheriff and a district attorney? Why not be a candidate for the office of grand cyclops of the "invisible empire," Mr. Smith?

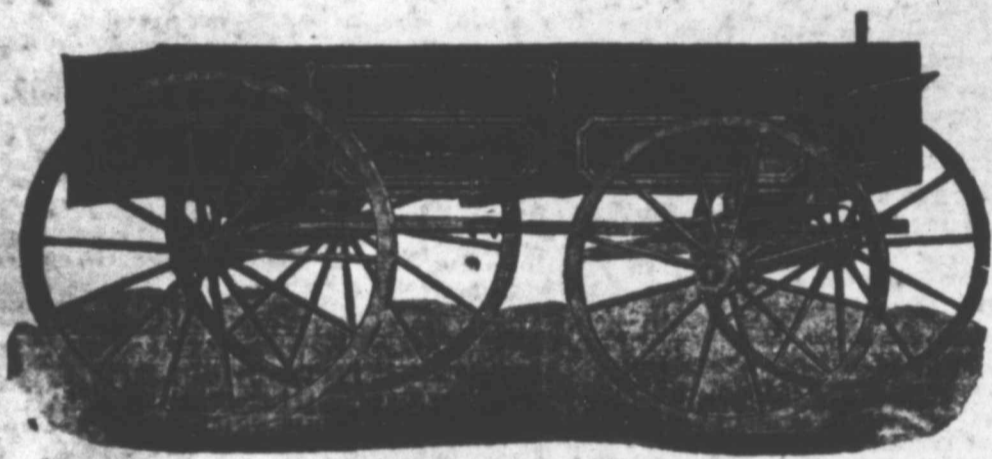

### FAIRCHILD FOR CONGRESS

From the Lufkin News, 18th.

It is not often that the people of any certain county have an opportunity to vote for and support one their home men for so high a position as that of congressman, for it is generally accepted that a congressman should be avowed the average man in point of ability in order to render faithful and efficient service to the people he represents. He should be both quick in thought and action, a man who is able both physically and mentally to uphold the interests of his state and his district in any matter coming before the American congress for action. He should have back of him a reputation second to that of no man for getting results.

The News does not believe that the second congressional district can lay claim to a man who comes nearer meeting these requirements than our own Senator I. D. Fairchild. He has served in both the Texas legislature and the senate and with honor and distinction. He was recognized as one of the biggest and brainiest men at Austin and whenever a question was presented in which the people of Texas, especially East Texas, was vitally interested, he was always ready to take an active part, and be it said to his credit, he was invariably on the right side. For instance, when there was a disposition on the part of the governor and the legislature to curtail the appropriation for educational purposes and appropriate all the money available to state institutions already established, it was Fairchild who bared his breast to the enemy and blocked the whole proceedings until an agreement was finally reached to provide the necessary funds to build the Stephen F. Austin Normal at Nacogdoches. He contended, and very correctly, that the educational interests of East Texas, so far as the establishment of state schools was concerned, had been getting nothing for year and years and he successfully contended that his section of the state should no longer be overlooked. As a result of his ability as a legislator and his high standing among the law makers of the state, he won out where other men of less determination and less ability would have failed.

Again, when it was shown that the state railroad running from Palestine to Rusk was in a dilapidated condition, had been a losing proposition for the state and the taxpayers and a resolution to junk the road was about to be passed, thus practically killing all the towns along the route by depriving them of railroad facilities, it was Senator Fairchild who again threw himself in front of the procession whose program had been thoroughly agreed upon, and introduced a resolution taking the road out of the hands of the penitentiary commissioners and placing it in the hands of a committee of business and railroad men to devise ways and means to rehabilitate and if possible to place the road on a paying basis. The lieutenant governor, Hon. Lynch Davidson of Houston, John Glenn of the Santa Fe railroad at Beaumont, and E. C. Durham of the Texas Southeastern railway of Diboll, were placed in charge. The result is perhaps best told by a recent editorial in both the Galveston and Dallas News, which, in part, is as follows:

"Our State Railroad had been reduced to the condition which suggested to all of the many who had considered its case that junking was the only treatment that could be advised. Then it was the lieutenant governor and Mr. Glenn and Mr. Durham were called into consultation at the instance of our state senators. Whether their treatment was magical or not The News does not know. However, results of it stand manifest. A railroad over which a handcar could not be operated without endangering the lives of all who live along the right of way, and without making a sound that echoed dolefully in the vaults of the state treasury, it is now a highway of traffic, over which all manner of cars, even to Pullmans, are hauled with speed and safety and with comfort to those who take passage on its trains. Our State Railroad was rejuvenated, even regenerated; made young and virile. And, mirabile dictu, it was done in a manner, which instead of putting the state to an expense, put money into its exchequer. A junk heap, save for the heaping, in the estimation of all who sat on its case, was metamorphosed into an efficient common carrier worth far the better part of a million dollars, and by a process which converted a cash deficit into a cash balance. Whatever the name of the art employed, it was a marvelous performance."

Had it not been for the foresight of Senator Fairchild, for this resolution introduced and fought through by him alone, our state railroad today would have been only a couple of streaks from Rusk to Palestine at a loss of more than a million dollars
