Though its observance may have taken different forms in different lands and times, it is everywhere suggestive of two great universal ideals which have taken root in the human heart. Time out of mind man has on this day rejoiced that the work of his head and hand has receive divine blessing; what he has planted has been returned to him many times over; his labors in the field have met with abundant success. His dreams for a full harvest have come true.

Even more significant than this, Thanksgiving Day brings another reflection. In the recognition that the happiness which the full harvest brings depends on a power greater than himself, the individual man is thus tied by inseparable bonds to all " his fellow men. NATION WANTS NO SUBSIDY

There is no doubt that at the present time President Harding's hold on the good will of the public is very slender. That he is not wholly responsible fo rit does not alter the fact. His machine was demolished and in the process saw hurled against a watchman's shanty, which was damaged. The pilot of the locomotive was dented and the crossing gate was broken.

The owner followed the customary course of suing the railroad for damages to his car and it responded with a suit for damages to its property. with the result mentioned. In Paris the police have long observed the rule of arresting persons who are run over by vehicles in the streets, on the theory that it is their duty to get out of the way and not clutter up traffic. In our country we believe the pedestrians have an equal right on the streets, provided they use the regular crossings. We have not yet learned, however, to respect the railroad's ownership to their right of way.

Because of competition, with tax exempt bonds, public utilities have to pay a higher interest rate on their bonds, according to P. H. Gadsden, vice president of the United Gas Improvement Company of Philadelphia. And the users of utility service in turn pay this money.

"They pay it in the gas rates," says Mr. Gadsden. "They pay it in the street car rates; they pay it in that it comes right back to the fact that economically you have transferred the burden from the man of large means, thinking that you are getting pays that is the man who goes back and forth twice a day to the factory to work and rides on the street car. Nacogdoches, Texas, Nov. 5 .- The Illinois rail splitter, who later directed the destinies of a nation, and the East Texas tie-hacker who is to direct the educational destinies of thousands of our best young men and women had much in common. Abraham Lincoln split rails as a partial preparation for the presidency of the United States; Alton W. Birdwell hacked crossties as a partial preparation for the Stephen F. Austin Normal College. The martyred president was never embarrassed by a reference to his rail splitting experiience. Fond parents and earnest educators have these fifty years held cut to the youth of our land that Lincoln's rail splitting experience was more worthy than the blue blood of a thousand years. Professor A. W. Birdwell, president of the Stephen F. Austin Normal College, is not above reference to his experience as a tiehacker along the banks of Mud creek, near Troupe. The story of his experience and of that particular Satturday morning when he rode into town on a load of crossties, and of how a big-hearted, loving school teacher met him on the streets and, putting a strong arm around him, said, "Birdwell, wouldn't you like to go to school," has been and will be an inspiration to thousands of big country boys whose environment has robbed them of early school advantages.

The school man was Judge J. W. Fitzgerald, who taught at Troupe and afterward entered the practice of law and now is a leading banker of Tyler. Fitzgerald knew and loved Birdwell's father, Rev. George P. Birdwell, a pioneer Baptist minister of East Texas, and, withal, a well educated one. He knew, too, that Alton Birdwell, the son, had in him the making of a great character. He knew and understood that the only missing factor in the big boy's make-up was opportunity. And if the truth must be told, Birdwell has never taken a prize at a beauty show. Later, he served as ward school and high school principal in the Tyler city schools. At the battle of the Nile I was there all the while, All the while I was there At the battle of the Nile.

Of course the above is a burlesque, but in my long life many tragedies and impressive alterations have come within my observation. Many will not do to write because of personal objectors, but I will relate a few others. In the year 1856, my father, W. E.

C. Mayfield, was elected sheriff of Nacogdoches county. He then resided two miles east of Douglass on the Old San Antonio Road. He moved to town and occupied a dwelling that stood near where the Captain Sturdevant present home stands. This house was known as the Judge Hart place. This put me in touch with many personal encounters and crimes.

But before this I had known things at Douglass, where such things often happened. I had been there on noisy election days, when blood and booze flowed freely. As the country boys expressed it. I had been to milk and I had been to school and to big meetings.


