MERCIFULLY, TIME is running out on the 1980 presidential campaign.

It has been a long, drawn out campaign, and an unusual one which has seen both the president and challenger Ronald Reagan having their "highs and lows."

At one time, just after the conventions, polls showed Reagan with a big lead, with Carter fading. Now, as the election approaches, Carter is making gains in the polls, and the race looks as though it will have a close finish.

One observer said this week "If the race were a football game, I'd say it's in the last two minutes, and Carter has the ball."

The president very definitely has the ball. As the incumbent, a variety of issues over which he at least has some control, will have an effect on the race.

One of the issues, which has been at least in the background throughout the campaign, is the hostage situation. The administration appeared to be making a push during the past week to effect a release of the hostages, and enhance Carter's re-election chances.

Although many voters say they would be appalled, if Carter, having had the hostage issue up in the air for virtually a year, pulled enough strings to get them released on election eve. This would approach sacrilege, in many people's opinion.

Yet, the polls demonstrate that if, somehow or other, a release of the hostages from Iran could be accomplished prior to the election, it would be a boost to the president's re-election campaign, political overtones notwithstanding.

Events of the past week would indicate that Iran is sticking by their guns on the hostage situation, and it looks from this vantage point as though chances for a release prior to November 4 are slim.

That brings us to the next "big issue," which is sure to have an effect on the election.

This is the Carter-Reagan debate, which almost never came about, but was resurrected at the last minute by Carter forces, who saw it as a necessity in gaining lost ground of recent months.

The presidential debate has become almost a tradition in our country, and we feel as though it would have been a shame to have denied the voters this opportunity of seeing and hearing the top candidates appear in a one-on-one situation.

Most voters remember the Nixon-Kennedy debates of 1960, and what an influence they had on the election. Probably no single event ever had such a lasting impression on voters as did those debates.

The Carter-Ford debate of 1976 also was a high point of the election, and was good exposure for Carter, the challenger.

We feel that the debates are necessary, although traditionally the incumbents feel that they have more to lose than to gain through such an event. Even though this might be true, we feel that they owe it to the American people to appear in such a forum, and "face off" on the issues, and then let the chips fall where they may.

Voters apparently were needing some sort of impetus, to help them with their final decision in this important election.

Hopefully the debate has provided that motivation.

Hang Glider

Jim Zehner, a Bovina resident, has a unique hobby. Zehner, with the help of Jim Guest, built a motorized hang glider, from a kit containing the parts which he and Guest built in Zehner's back yard. Zehner says it took them about one week to build.

The hang glider has a wing span of 32 feet from wing tip to wing tip. The wings are five feet wide and the glider is approximately 20 feet long and weighs 140 pounds. It is powered by a 15 horsepower Yamaha engine which sets on top of the plane between the wings. The glider can be folded up into a neat package that measures five feet high and two feet wide and six feet long.

Zehner said, "The only instructions that I was given to fly the glider came in one small paragraph with the kit. I went out to fly it and crashed the first time up, then I called a man from Midland to come and show me how to fly it."

Zehner is employed by a local business as a spray pilot.

Also on the Texas ballot in the presidential race will be John Anderson-Milton Eisenhower and Ed Clark-David Koch.

On the local level, Parmer County voters will elect a sheriff for the first time in 32 years, but the race for county sheriff has been very low key.

Candidates for the position are M.C. (Bill) Morgan, the present chief deputy, in the Democratic column, and Nick R. Hand, a city patrolman at Friona, in the Republican column.

The Morgan-Hand race is the only contested countywide race on the ballot.

Friona area voters will be electing a commissioner, and have a contest, with incumbent Ernest Anthony challenged by Raymond Euler.

Perhaps the race which will draw the most attention on local ballots is that for State Senator for this district, in which Bob Price, the incumbent, is challenged by Bill Sarpalius.

Price was elected in a special election in 1977, to replace Max Sherman after Sherman resigned to accept the position as president of West Texas State University.

Although it is a case of a political novice versus a veteran, the race has attracted considerable interest, and Price is expected to perhaps be pressed more in his bid for re-election than he was during the special race.

Susie Pruitt Is Champ For 1980

Mrs. Susie Pruitt was named as the winner of the 1980 freeze contest. Mrs. Pruitt predicted that our first freeze would be on October 25, and we had our first "killing freeze" on October 24.

Mrs. Pruitt received \$5 for correctly predicting the first freeze. The other predictions were: Houston Bartlett, October 26; Laura Bartlett, October 28; Dean Stanberry, October 28; Delpha Vinson, October 29; J.L. Pruitt, October 30; Wendy Stanberry, November 1; and Rocky Bartlett, November 3.

The couple has five children, one of whom, Daniel, with his family, is also an OMS missionary in Haiti.

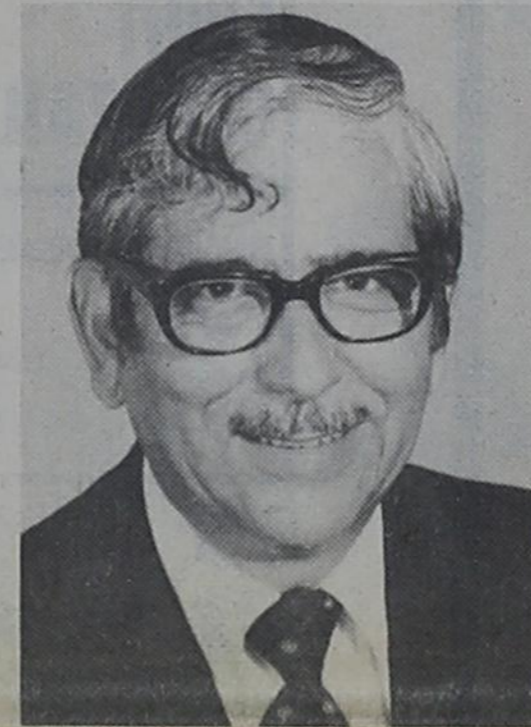

Paul Eugene Topliff, athletic director and head football coach at Bovina, was named a 1980 "Coach of the Year" at Westmar College Homecoming activities last week.

Topliff, a 1970 graduate of Westmar, had compiled a great four-year football record at Texico, N.M., the best record in the 32-year history of the school was 3-6. In 1978, the team had its first winning season ever in the history of the school, winning the district championship for the first time and advancing to the state playoffs. During the last two years, Topliff has had 20 young men achieve first team all-state honors as voted by the Associated Press and the coaches of New Mexico.

Topliff has led the Bovina Mustangs team to a 5-2 season record after seven games in his first year as head football coach for the Bovina Schools.

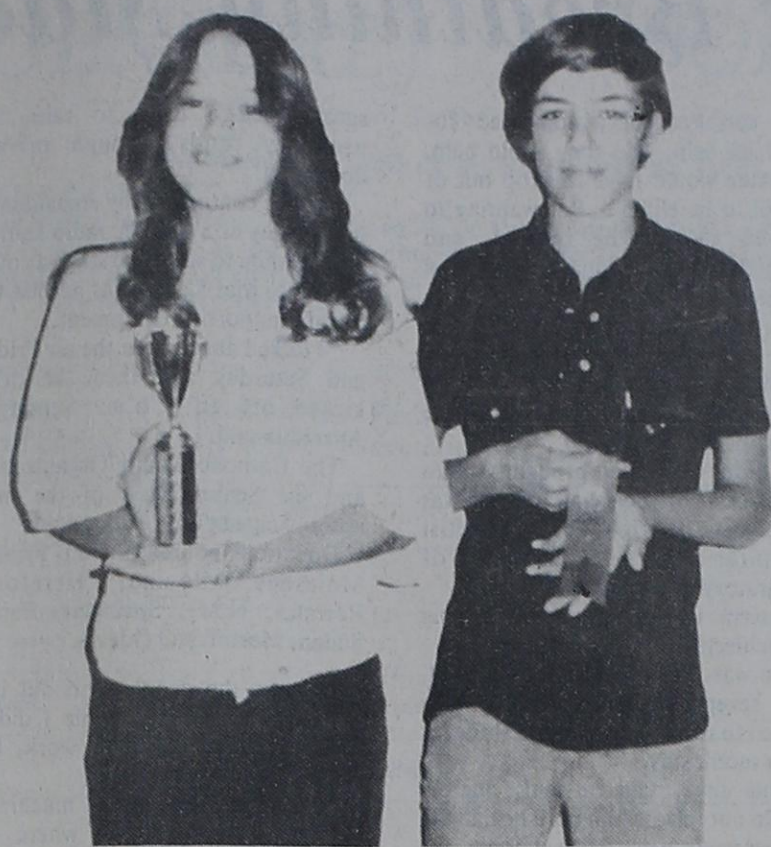

Area Friends Buy Breathing Machine For Guerra

With the help of friends, a 23-year-old man was finally able to return home to Friona.

Panhandle residents from Odessa to Hereford chipped in \$2,437 to buy Alex Guerra three respiratory therapy machines he needed before doctors would release him from High Plains Baptist Hospital.

The respiratory machines allow Guerra to live at home instead of the hospital.

Guerra, one of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Guerra, suffers from bronchiectasis—a condition in which the lining of the airways is interrupted and mucus remains in the lungs.

"I'm glad I've got a lot of friends and people that helped me out," he said.

doctors believed he just had a tendency toward colds.

When he was 14, he developed double pneumonia and doctors predicted the youth would live no longer than 12 hours. But Guerra said "through faith in God and my parents' praying I made it."

"The fever broke and my lungs began to clear and about a week and a half later I opened my eyes and knew my parents standing by my bed."

But illness continued to plague Guerra as a youngster.

"About four or five times a year I got sick," he recalled.

A social agency, contacted for financial help, said they could help, but Alex would have to drop out of school to be eligible. But wanting to get his degree, he refused, and graduated from Friona High School in 1976.

He then enrolled at West Texas State University in Canyon to study business. But he suffered another bout of pneumonia and was forced to drop out.

A kidney infection brought Guerra to an Amarillo physician. Guerra was admitted to High Plains Baptist Hospital where a number of respiratory tests were conducted.

Guerra was diagnosed as having bronchiectasis.

He was treated and then released. But several months later he was forced to return to the hospital for his most recent stay.

This time, Guerra said, doctors would not release him until he had the proper equipment to live at home.

The Social Services Department of the hospital began searching for funds to buy the needed equipment.

All efforts failed.

"It was just one of those cases where he fell through all the loopholes," said Kendra Elliott, case-worker.

Joe Bermea, president of the Parish Council of St. Teresa's Catholic Church in Friona,

spearheaded a drive to raise the necessary funds through private donations.

Bermea contacted Roy Anzaldua, a disc jockey at a KMUL radio station in Muleshoe to see if the station could announce that \$2,200 was needed for the life supporting equipment.

"I talked about it on the air Friday and Saturday and then the drive kicked off at 3 p.m. Sunday," Anzaldua said.

The Catholic Youth Organization and the Senior Class of the high school helped pick up donations.

Donations poured in from Friona, Muleshoe, Bovina, Hereford, Portales, N.M., Springlake-Earth, Sudan, Morton and Odessa.

"It was the people who did it," Bermea said. "For a while I didn't know if it was going to work, but God did it for us."

With the respiratory machines, Guerra returned home where his immediate plans are to "just take care of myself and stay away from the dust and cold."

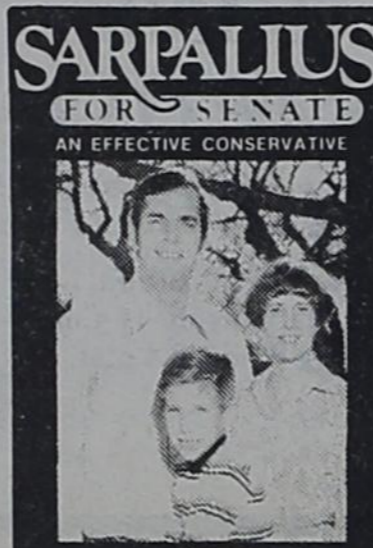
And, he said, "I'm getting my strength back little by little."

SWPS Hosts Foreign Visitors

W.R. "Bill" Esler, vice president of engineering and construction for Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the electric company hosted visitors from

the Austria Power Authority last Thursday at the request of the White House and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The visitors included an environmentalist and a planner, and the group toured Southwestern's Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo. Austria, like many other countries, is in the process of switching from fuel oil and natural gas to coal as a fuel for the generation of electricity.

The visitors were especially interested in the fabric filter system or "baghouse" at Harrington. The system is used to control the fly ash that results from burning coal in boilers.

"Southwestern Public Service Company was selected by the EPA to measure and analyze the performance of a large fabric filter or baghouse on a boiler using low sulfur western coal, because of its progressive approach to environmental control. The information being collected under this agreement with EPA is being shared with other utilities in the United States as well as others around the world," Esler said.

Southwestern has had visitors from Japan, Australia, Israel, West Germany and the Netherlands who are all responding to the same need for change to the utility from burning petroleum fuels to coal. Most of the

foreign visitors have similar environmental quality controls that make their interest in Southwestern's research on fabric filters a valuable asset to their engineering and design knowledge.

Besides these foreign visitors, Southwestern has shared through national conferences and correspondence baghouse characterization, operation and maintenance information with utilities in Canada and India.

Information Is Available At Agent's Office

Producers that are considering placing stocker cattle on wheat pasture, corn stalks, milo stubble or nature grass would probably like to take a look at the Stocker Cattle-Budget Analysis Computer Program. This service offered by Extension has been well received by area producers. It is designed to aid producers in making management decisions. Decisions such as what weight, grade and sex of cattle to purchase must be made. I now have the necessary forms at my office for producers to complete and mail in.

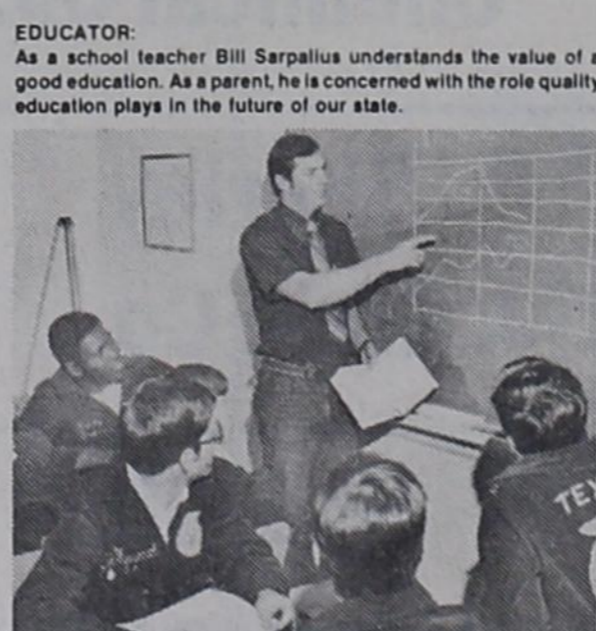

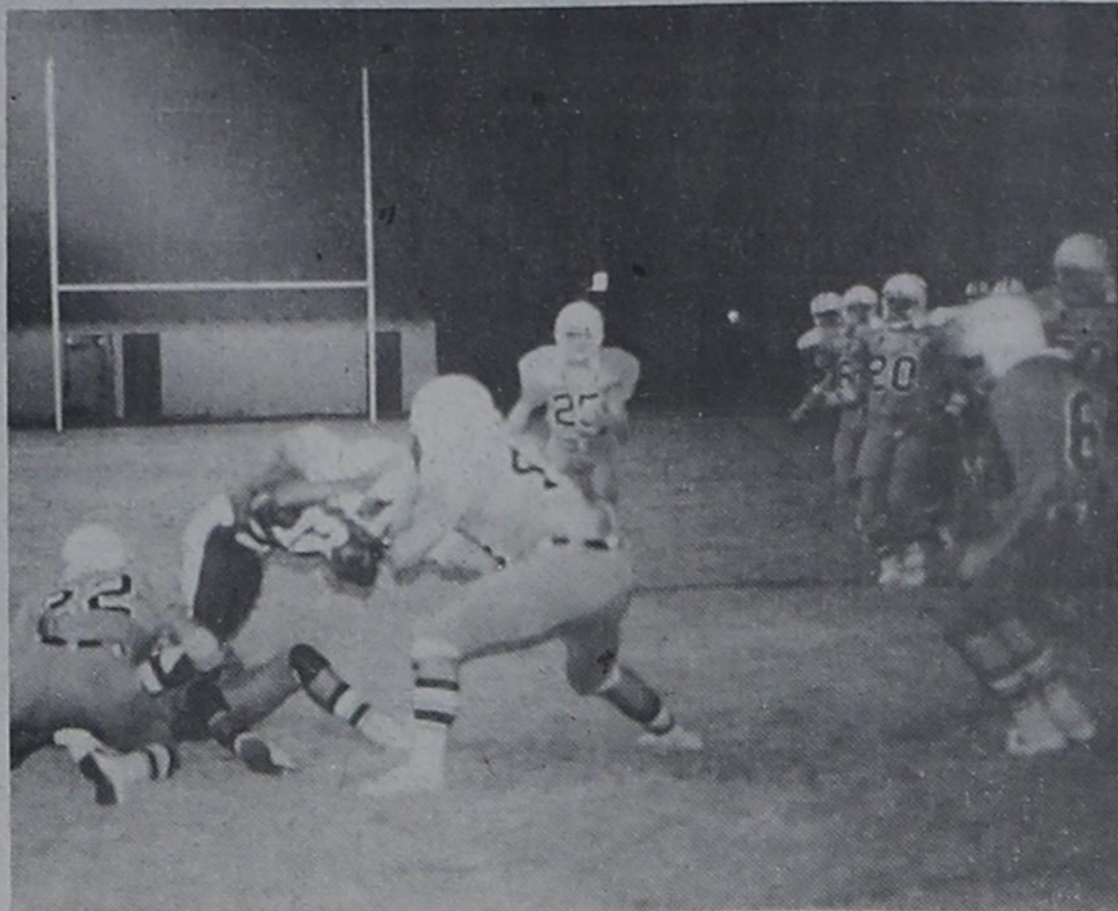
Topliff expressed his appreciation to the fans. "Coaching in Bovina is fun, the people are very appreciative. I'm very proud of the support of the Bovina fans."

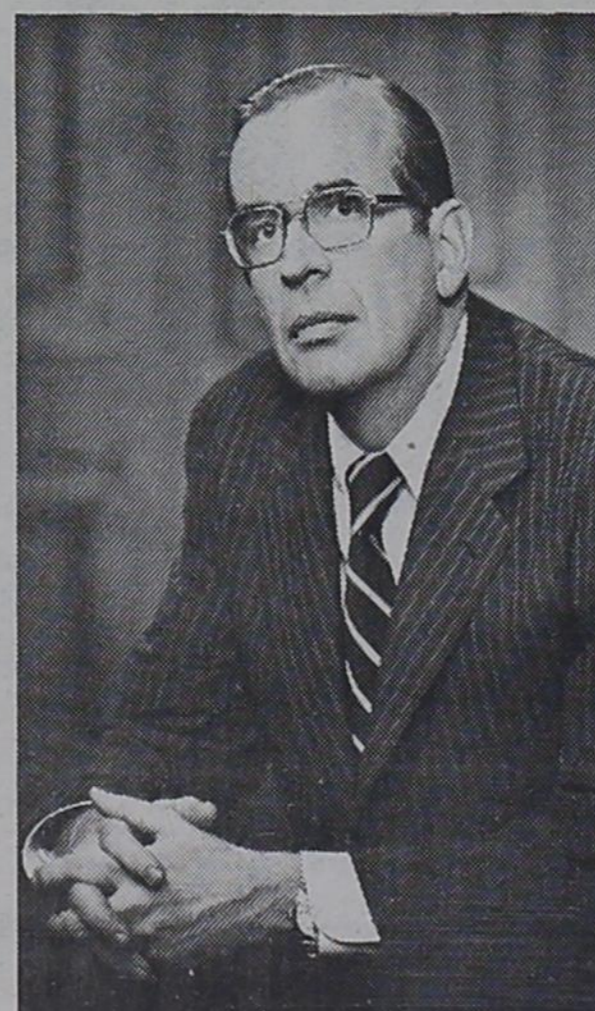


