The appointment of Will Garwood to the Texas Supreme Court sounds like a chapter of Texas history repeating itself. The Garwoods have a long record in
the judician. Will Garwood's grandfather, Hiram Garwood, was county judge of Bastrop County in 1888 and at one lime president of the Texas Bar Association. W. St. John Garwood, son of the county judge and father the new associate justice, was he first Houstomian to be named the Texas Supreme Court in 80 years...
