Savannah, Ga., June 20.-Deserted streets guarded over by the law today stood out in marked contrast over a stormy scene last night, when a mob of more than a thousand persons assembled before the jail where Walter Lee, negro, charged with criminal assault upon a white woman, was being held. Claud Parker, Jr., shot in the onrush of the mob, died and several persons wounded are in hospitals. The firing ensued when the mob began to close in on the troops called to guard the jail. Guards are still on duty today. Forty-nine alleged members of the mob were arrested.

NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

"We entertain angels unawares." The so-called Old Stone Fort at Nacogdoches is an instance of such events, during its past two hundred year of existence.

This can be better appreciated by remembering that when it was started it was designed for the nucleus of a Cathoric mission or convent, and was in an unsettled locality. No town was there beyond a few rude adobes of primitive Indians. It became a núcleus for Texas. When adventurous people from the East started to Texas, there was no Dallas, no Texarkana, no Beau mont in mind. These places were not settled. They were in Nacogdoches county, and this was Texas.

One of the notable stories of events onnected with the Old Stone Fort of Nacogdoches is to the effect that when Davy Crockett reached here on his way to San Antonio, where there was something doing, he was sworn in to the Texas army by Col. John Forbes, in an office on the second floor of the Old Stone Fort. Before signing the oath he added to it that his loyalty should cease if Texas joined another country. He was agin Andrew Jackson and his party, because they defeated him for another term in congress. He said Tennessee could go to hell, and he would go to Texas, where men were men.

GOVERNOR WILL SIGN

Austin, Texas, June 14 .- The rural aid bill appropriating \$3,000,000 for the next two years was sent to Governor Neff for his signature today when the house without a record vote adopted the conference report. No opposition was expressed, the bill being reported practically as passed by the house. The report was returned by the conference committees on emergency school appropriation bill by reducing the fund from six million to four million. An agreement on the emergency school bill leaves only one departmental appropriation to be

worked out.

The conference report on the emergency school appropriation bill placing the sum at four million dollars instead of six million dollars as passed at the last session, was adopted by both branches of the legislature after unsuccessful opposition in the house. The house disposed of another bill when it adopted the conference report on the \$363,000 reclamation and flood control appropriation bill. The general education bill carrying a total of approximately eleven million dollars was disposed of in the senate when it adopted the conference report. The senate held a brief flag day ceremony. A resolution introduced by Senator Wirtz urging the teaching of the state and federal constitutions in public and private schools, stressing the principles of free speech and freedom of religion was adopted unani-
