

The findings of this investigation are shown below, in full, for your information.

Billing Period For January Bills Includes Seven Days More Than Billing Period for December Bills

The billing period for January (including the last half of December and the first half of January) covers a period averaging seven days longer than the billing period for December, which includes the last half of November and the first part of December.

This difference in the number of days for which bills were rendered is due to the fact that meter reading was started three days earlier than usual in December, in order that employees could arrange their wok to allow time for a Christmas holiday. The chart below however, starting three days earlier in December, including the extra day in December over the number of days in November, and then going back to the original meter reading day in January, makes 28 days in the December billing period (covering the last half of November and the first half of December) and makes the January billing period 35 days, a difference of seven days in the bills rendered for December and January.



All meters cannot be read in one day. The opening and closing days of the billing period as shown in the above chart are necessarily averaged. In some individual cases the extension in January billing period over December was only three days, others four, and on up to as many as eleven days. The average over all


consumers, however, is seven days as shown in the chart and includes the Christmas Holidays.

Information as to the exact number of additional days billed to each customer for the January period may be obtained from the records on file in the office of this Company.

Much Colder During January Billing Period

Weather conditions between November 20th and December 17th, the billing period for December bills, were considerably milder than between December 18th and January 21st, the billing period for January bills. The Chart below was based on figures taken from United States Government reports and shows

graphically the variation in temperature. There was 43.4 per cent more cold weather (below 65 degrees) during the January billing period from December 18th to January 21st than there was during the December billing period from November 20th to December 17th.

One of the contributing causes to this condition has been the large amount of rainfall during this period in comparison to former years which has increased the humidity of the air. During the past three months we have experienced more rain in and around Ranger than over a similar period of time since 1919. It is natural that we who are accustomed to a high dry climate would require more heat with the same temperature when humid, than when dry.

W. TEXANS SAY

AMARILLO, Feb. 6.—A number of West Texas cities from Amarillo to Midland are up in arms since receiving their gas bills for the month of January.

Although January was one of the warmest Winter months ever known generally in West Texas, householders are complaining that gas bills were the highest they have paid during the period of from three to five years they have burned natural gas.

A petition being circulated in Lubbock requesting the city commission to investigate allegedly "exorbitant prices we are now paying for gas" has been signed by more than 400 customers of the West Texas Gas Company; Although city officials have declined to comment on the protest, they have ordered an instrument installed to test the heat quality of the gas.

More than 200 users attended the last city council meeting at Childress, and some of them have refused to pay their bills until an investigation is made. A petition presented to the city council at Memphis was signed by 400. These towns are served by Northern Texas Utilities Company, and the row has led to a protest of the rate to domestic users of 75 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Reports reaching Amarillo say protests have been entered at Hereford, Friona, Plainview, Wellington, Vervnon, Quanah, Chillicothe, Electra, Midland and others,

'High officials of the gas companies have been called on to investigate. They have announced that meter readings will be checked and the mains examined for defects.

This clipping is one of many that has been brought to our attention indicating that the increase in gas bills is not confined to Ranger territory. The same combination of circumstances which caused the increase here has resulted in similar increases in Southwestern cities from Northern Oklahoma to the Gulf of Mexico and from the Mississippi River to the Continental Divide.

Texas leads as a producer of natural gas and, according to the director of the Texas Public Service Information Bureau, 8300 miles of natural gas pipeline were built during 1930 at a cost of \$100,000,000 and brought the total to 80,-000 miles. Gas statisticians predict the total will be 150,000 miles within the next decade. Texas, which went into the lead in natural gas production in 1929, more than held its place in 1930 with a total output of 539 billion cubic feet against 400 billion for Oklahoma, in second place. Much of the new construction of pipeline is for Texas gas and since the first of the year plans have been announced for a new line from the Panhandle fields to Colorado and Nebraska and Montana.
