DALLAS, Feb. 13. — Sixteer federal projects in Texas, representing approximately \$7,337,000 in construction work, are "under contract," according to a report or the federal building program in south and southwestern states received here.

Construction of the \$470,000 marine hospital at Galveston and the \$100,000 postoffice at Mexia are the farthest advanced.

Blue print plans have been made for the \$430,000 Brownsville postoffice, \$100,000 postoffice at Coleman, \$1,445,000 postoffice at Fort Worth, \$615,000 postoffice improvements at Houston, \$335,000 postoffice at Lubbock and \$130,000 postoffice at Sweetwater. Sweetwater.

Disputes over the site of the \$535,000 El Paso postoffice have delayed progress there, the report, released by President Hoover's emergency unemployment commission, points out. Sites have been accepted at Wichita Falls for a \$725,000 post-

office, Plainview postoffice costing \$152,000, and a \$200,000 postal building at San Angelo. Condemnation proceedings were required for the \$375,000 quarantine station at Sabine Pass, the report said.





A POET'S BID FOR FAME.

Edgar Lee Masters, a lawyer, a poet and a prose writer of national fame, is in bad with all men and women who are admirers of Abraham Lincoln, the Emancipator of chattel slaves. Poet Masters gave his conception of the Emancipator "as grossly dressed and unkempt," and other traits of character too numerous to mention. Now the custodian of Lincoln's tomb gives the lie to the lawyer poet. This is his contribution to the literature of the period:

"I have 300 pictures of Lnicoln, taken at various ages

after he was five years old, showing him in many poses and not one even hints that he was unkempt. On the contrary, in each, he looks as though he had just stepped from a band box. His clothes were neat, his hair well-combed and his features pleasant."

Edgar Lee Masters sought trouble and he found it. Regardless of his writings or his motives Abraham Lincoln is an immortal of American history—an immortal of world history. Just as Robert E. Lee, magnificent soldier and statesman and Christian gentleman, will remain an immortal of history while time shall last. It was late in the day but the lawmakers of Texas honored themselves and their constituents when they enacted the statute making the birthday of the great son of Virginia a public holiday.

Why should the graves of America's heroes be invaded to form sordid reading for the people now on earth? Why should modern literary ghouls desecrate those sacred influences which spring from the pages of history and fall from the lips of tradition like hallowed rain upon the plastic minds and characters of young America. Why should we be made to lose faith in those virtues we have long been taught to revere and emulate? What possible good can Poet Masters hope to accomplish? Better a fictitious Christ than a genuine devil.



These suggestions may help the inexperienced marketer in making her selections. All vegetables have certain "points" to watch for

when purchasing them. New cabbage will not be as hard and heavy as the old has been, but it should be firm and fairly solid. It should be free from sponginess or softness and reasonably heavy. It should be closely trimmed, with the outer leaves crisp and green. Wilted or yellowed outer leaves mean age and a general wiltiness throughout the head. The head

injury or decay spots are perfectly apparent and mean just so much

The size of cabbage heads has little relation to quality, small heads often being as firm and desirable in every way as large ones. Individual needs must determine the adivisability of purchasing large or small heads. It is usually economy to select heads of a size that will be used in not more than two meals.

New cabbage is cared for after cutting much as head lettuce is. Wrapped in a damp cloth and placed in an air-tight container, it will stay crisp several days.
