

### RELIEF FOR INDEPENDENTS.

While the ways and means committee of the congressional house is vacillating in its consideration of a bill to place an embargo upon imports of petroleum and petroleum products, after having first voted to postpone action on all tariff and embargo measures because of "insufficient time" for their consideration, State Representative Bailey W. Hardy, of Breckenridge, has an oil bill pending in the Texas house. Hardy's bill proposes to aid the independent operators, refiners and retailers by making it illegal for a "corporation operating as a producer, transporter and refiner of petroleum and its products from operating also as a retailer of the products of petroleum." The author of the bill insists that if the present conditions continue and "the system progresses as fast as it has in the past it won't be long until the independent retailer will be driven out of business and when he goes there will be no market left for the sale of the products of the independent refiner" and "with the elimination of the independent refiner the independent producer has no market for his oil except the major pipeline companies and the pipeline companies are the private carriers of the giants of the petroleum industry."

He insists his bill simply eliminates the major producer, transporter and refiner from handling the retail end of the business. A reminder that in his closing term in the senate of the United States the late Joseph Weldon Bailey introduced a bill placing the pipelines of the nation in the jursidiction of the interstate commerce committee for governmental control and rate making purposes. His bill was strangled. His political power and prestige waned. He was assailed by his enemies as a political pawn of the giants of the oil trade and he was marked for defeat on the other hand by the interests which he sought to regulate.
