Beauchamp made a motion to approve transfer student. Kerby seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

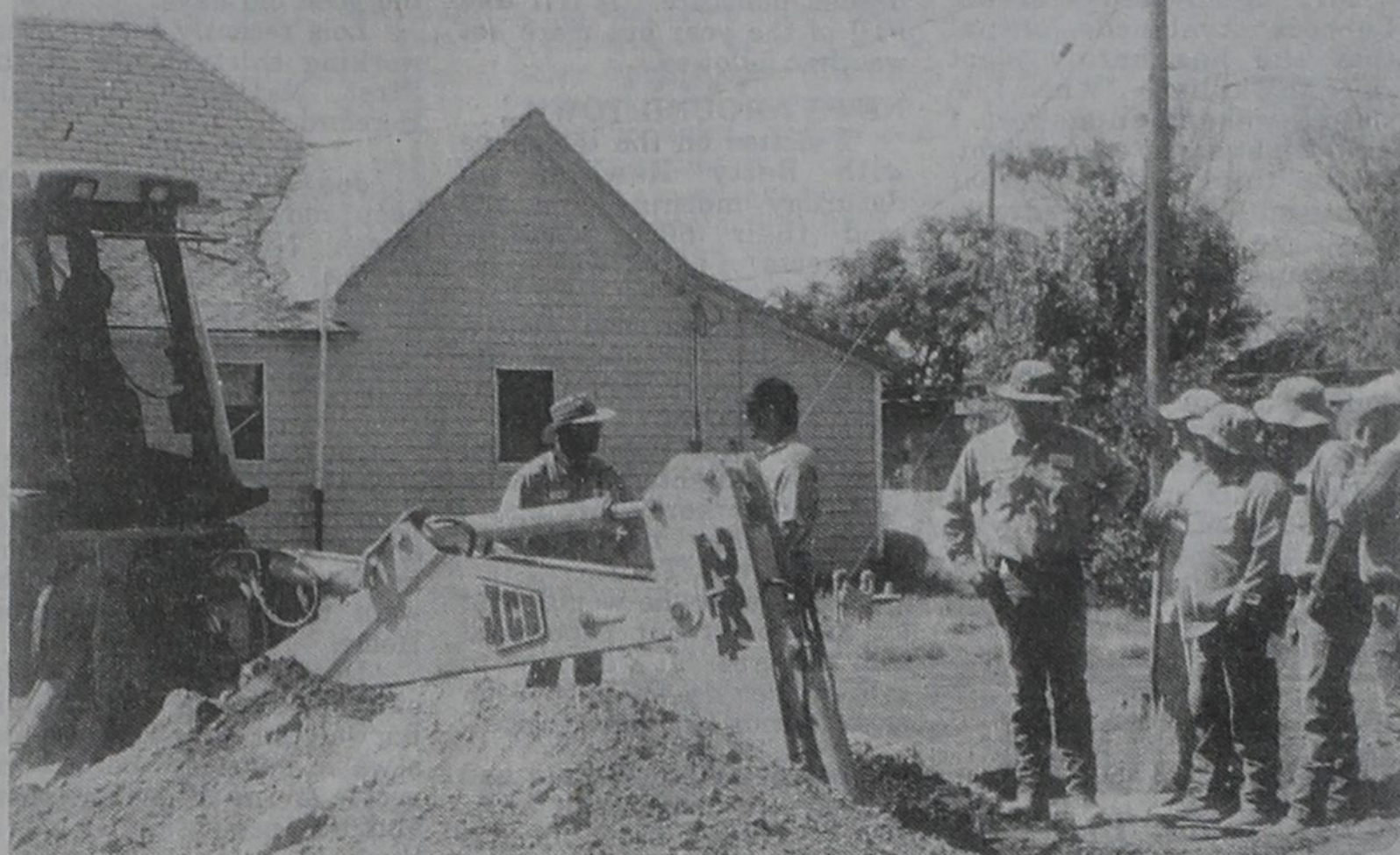
Kerby made a motion to accept the resignation of Mary Ellen Robertson. Coffey seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Killing The Weevil: Tools Of The Trade

Passersby along many rural road systems in the surrounding area will begin noticing yellow-green fluorescent objects perched on wooden sticks about the countryside.

The small device is a boll weevil pheromone trap and isn't much larger than a soda can.

The trap is the first line of defense against the cotton boll weevil, a destructive insect that has caused billions of dollars in damages to the U.S. cotton industry since entering from Mexico more than one hundred years ago.

The size, shape and color of the trap have proven attractive to the boll weevil through years of careful research. The plastic trap looks like an inverted cup, topped with a cone shaped

wire-mesh screen. A capture chamber on the top of the cone contains a wafer-shaped object that emits an attractant called grandlure. Once inside the capture chamber, a second wafer-shaped insecticide chip ensures that weevils don't leave the chamber.

All traps are checked on a weekly basis by Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation program personnel and the number of weevils found inside the trap provides important data about levels of infestations in various fields.

This data is critical in determining when cotton fields will require applications of Malathion ULV, the most useful tool in boll weevil eradication.

THE OLDEST PERSON IN THE WORLD

died a month ago (June 13) and made the front page of the Lubbock paper. The deceased was a little old colored woman named Emma Massey who was living in a nursing home at Ralls. They listed her birthdate as Jan. 15, 1881. She was 118 years old.

Emma would have held the distinction of being in the Guinness Book of World Records as the oldest person alive, if she had had an official birth record. Back then, they simply were not issuing birth certificates in Louisiana when she was born in 1881, so she had no way to prove her age. Had she lived seven more months, her life would have touched three centuries.

If I had known about Emma, I would like to have questioned her about what life was like in the '80s... the 1880s, not the 1980s... and what was the earliest thing she could remember. The newspaper article didn't tell any of that, but it did say that she enjoyed her coffee and snuff every day and she maintained a pretty laid back attitude toward life. Sounds to me like a couple of small vices might just help to keep a long lifetime from being boring.

Since more and more people are now living to age 100, "they" took a poll... you know how "they" will take a poll on just about anything. A few hundred folks were asked if they'd like to live to age 100 and most of them said no. The magic number was 91, when asked how old they'd like to get. I don't know what they thought was so interesting about age 91 or so UN-interesting about age 92.

Emma was probably as surprised as the rest of us at all the many amazing things which happened during her lifetime: automobiles, radio, phonograph, movies, television, airplanes, space travel, world wars, earthquakes, assassinations, and all the many great medical advancements, some of which probably helped her to reach such an old age. But what about the more obscure things that happened during Emma's lifetime?

For instance, when Emma was age seven in 1888, George Eastman perfected the first Kodak box camera and gave us all the new hobby of amateur photography.

Growing up in Louisiana, Emma may have been aware at age 12 of the world's longest boxing fight which took place in New Orleans on April 6 and 7, 1893, between Andy Bowen and Jack Burk. The fight lasted 110 rounds which took seven hours and four minutes. Then Mr. Gillette invented the safety razor in 1895 and his Gillette Blue Blades sponsored all those boxing broadcasts on the radio for many years in the '30s and '40s.

The popular dessert Jell-O was invented in 1897. Emma was age 16. The first bowling tournament was held in America (Chicago) in 1901. Oklahoma became the 46th state of the U.S. in 1907. Grand Central Terminal was opened in New York in 1913. Daylight Saving Time was first introduced in 1916.

Prohibition went into effect in 1920 when Emma was 39. Decaffeinated coffee was introduced in 1923. Electric motor refrigerators for keeping foods cool without blocks of ice, was introduced by General Electric in 1927, followed by Clarence Birdseye patenting a process for frozen vegetables in 1930. Emma was 49.

In 1936 Boulder Dam was completed, making Lake Mead the largest reservoir in the world. In 1937 Disney produced "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," the first full-length animated movie. "Citation" won the triple crown in 1949. Birth control pills were introduced in 1952. The U. S. launched the first weather satellite in 1960. The first heart transplant was performed in 1967. Hank Aaron hit his 600th home run in 1971 when Emma was 90. The first internet computer virus was launched in 1988 by a U.S. student, Emma was 107.

Emma was born 16 years after slavery was abolished in 1865 and she lived during 99.5 percent of the 20th century. It was the best of times.

Mrs. Mohr: At Least He Won't Hurt Anyone Else

"It doesn't bring my son Skip back, but I'm glad he can't do this to someone else," said former Friona resident Anna Belle Mohr, regarding the fact that the accused murderer was taken into custody this week.

Rafael Resendez-Ramirez surrendered Tuesday. He is suspected in at least nine murders, including a former Friona minister.

The Mohrs, who lived in Friona from 1964-71 while Paul was pastor of Union Congregational Church, now live in Lubbock.

Mrs. Mohr was recovering from open heart surgery when the word came back in May that her oldest son, Rev. Norman "Skip" Sircin and his wife Karen had been murdered.

"Skip and Karen were in Lubbock for my surgery, and that was the last time we saw them alive," she said. "We just deal with this one day at a time," she said,

regarding her and Paul's efforts to cope with the situation.

"We still have Mark (their other son), and Nathan (Skip's son), to deal with. We celebrated Nathan's 20th birthday this week," Anna Belle added, pointing out that Nathan had been born in Friona.

Mrs. Mohr had told the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal that she has hardly slept since the killings. "When I do sleep, I wake up in a sweat. I have nightmares every night. I keep thinking about what went on in that bedroom when he attacked my son and daughter-in-law. I need to get some rest and get this off my mind," she said.

Anna Belle's surgery was done to repair a hole in her heart, caused her to be extremely short of breath. "I couldn't walk across the room. I'm not back to normal yet, but I am able to do a lot more than before," she told us this week in a telephone interview.
