

Wholesale Business 100 Per Cent Ahead of Figures For the Past Year.

United Press Staff Correspondent DALLAS, Aug. 12.—Texas today stood definitely committed to President Roosevelt's revolutionary policies in the drive toward in-

dustrial recovery. Three outstanding recent developments proved the state has placed all its business chips on the side of the national program:

1. Texas cotton growers retired approximately 5,000,000 acres of their current crop from produc-

2. Texas employers are flocking under the wings of the Blue Eagle of the NRA. 3. Texas retailers are stocking

## YOU EVER STOP

GAULT MACGOWAN, managing editor of the Trinidad Guardian, (British West Indies) Writes:

"Some time ago I said that there was no hope of a return to prosperity until those who produced also learned to sell. I pointed ou that producers of primary products are the ones that advertise least. They let luxury manufacturers advertise to the trade, and forget that those who 'manufacture' crops need to advertise also.

"Now, I find cultivators of tropical products are responding to my appeal. From Martinique comes the report of a movement among banana 'manufacturers' first to find their market and then to produce for it.

"In the past, producers there-like producers most places-have first 'manufactured' and then looked for a market. They planted in hope and reaped in sorrow. Now, realizing they can grow when they want to, they are aiming to reverse the process. First make your market, then grow for it. Production then automatically regulates itself to the xtent of prospective business.

"If 100 farmers gave ten dollars a year each, they would have a thousand dollars for a fighting fund to tell head Motor company. the world about the crops that are coming. If a few cents were collected on every bag of cocoa or coffee or other produce sold, then the fighting fund would swell into millions of dollars. And once the primary producers of a nation, or group of nations, begin to unite to preach the virtues of healthy, scientifically grown produce, planted and OLD HEN CHOKES reaped under civilized conditions, we should cease to hear about over-production.

"For if our planters and farmers sold more, they would also employ more. And employing more means raising the saying, "My heart was in my spending power of the nation. 

Boxer funds are now used to support Tsing Hua University in Peiping. This has been been decided to suspend the activities of its Washington mission.

It is expected that next year no more than 40 students will study under Tsing Hua University or Boxer fund auspices in the United States. Latest reports indicate that from 40 to 50 Chinese students now in America will return to China during the coming summer, either because of adverse financial conditions or because they will find adequate facilities for continuing their studies at the Tsing Hua University in Peiping.



ege has fewer and lower fees han any other college in the state so far as we know. Thus, the year's expenses in Ranger Junior College are lower than those of rivate or denominational coleges and about as low as those of state schools. And in addition, board and room may be had cheaper here than in most college towns, and clothing expenses, too, are lower than in most schools, because of the fact that students feel perfectly at home in simple dresses for most of our students have shown their willingness to deny themselves fine clothes in order to attend college. Taking all these facts together, we challenge any other college to offer a year's college work as low as Ranger Junior College does.

Ranger Junior College permits students to pay for their education on the installment plan. The first payment each semester amounts to \$18.00 for five courses, and then the students pay three more payments of \$11.50 each semester, making the total for the year only 5 per cent higher than t would be if paid by the semester in advance. This arrangement makes it possible for many stulents to attend college that could not otherwise attend.

Last week we told you how the 8-cylinder motor made its entry into the low-price field.

But an "8" is not the whole story. There are two varieties of the

We have chosen the V-8 -- a motor with two banks of cylinders set at an angle opposite each other, instead of all eight cylinders in a line. There are good reasons for this.

When we take 8 cylinders and set them four on a side, the length of the motor is reduced about half: it becomes a sturdy and compact power plant. The V-8 motor is 4 cylinders long; if the cylinders were set in line the motor would be 8 cylinders long. This would sacrifice compactness.

One simple advantage of the V-type is that it gives more room in the body of your car. In the medium-size car that is built for economical operation this is important. And it accounts for the generous interior body room of the new Ford V-8.

Another advantage concerns the motor itself. The V-8 type of motor, with its two short banks of cylinders, cuts in half the distance which the gas mixture must travel to the end cylinders. This gives a more uniform distribution to each cylinder and makes a smoother running motor. Also, two water pumps and two streams of water cool the cylinders instead of one stream. This means more uniform cooling.

Other points of advantage I reserve for another letter. To mention one: --When we seemed to be slow in introducing the new Ford V-8 the delay was caused by our doing a very important thing in the interest of strength, long service and efficiency.

We were perfecting the V-8 cylinder block as a one-piece casting. As a result our cylinder block is not made of two or three castings bolted together. It is one compact whole, which permanently keeps the operating parts in perfect alignment. We cannot expect the general reader to appreciate the difficulties we had to overcome before this could be done. But if you ever have a chance to see our cylinder block casting before it goes into an engine, you will marvel that it could be done at all.

We are the only manufacturers now doing it this more expensive way. Our new car is making its way so rapidly, on its own merits, that it is worth knowing some of the reasons for its success.
