Upsets Rule Contest; Sherbon Is Winner

Do not be discouraged. Everyone that entered Week Five's football contest had terrible luck.

If you had five or six correct guesses, you were in the majority. Several had less than five. A couple had two correct.

It was a week of upsets, especially in the college games. Texas Tech, Alabama, and Kansas State won but most players picked Texas A&M, Florida, and Texas.

Then there is Denver's Broncos. Remember that John Elway is retired, now Terrell Davis is out for the year and the Broncos are 0-4. If they show up in future contests, I'd bet against them for a while.

Two players had nine correct picks in Week Five. Eight players managed to pick 8 out of the 14.

Two Bovina High School students had 9 correct. Using the tie-breaker of Dallas 35, Arizona 7, Jerry Sherbon won the top prize of \$20 with a 25 off tie-breaker guess.

Melanie Stanberry placed second with the only other 9 correct entry. She was having a little fun with her tie-breaker guess of Dallas 88, Arizona 84, which was a contest record of 130 points off.

The third prize stayed at the school too as coach Jeff Neal entered for the first time and won third place with 8 correct and an 11 points off tie-breaker guess.

Others with 8 correct and their points off guesses were Adam Mejia (15), Jamie McNeely (17), Don Spring (18), Christen Stowers (21), Jerry Roach (25), Bobby Joe Johnson (26) and Tyler Walling (35).

The brutal results of Week Five shook up the race for the \$150 Grand Prize. Jan Smith and Jerry Roach are tied for the lead with 48 points.

Bovina PD Receives Computer

On Thursday, September 30, the City of Bovina Police Department received a surplus printer, computer and fax machine from the State Attorney General's Office.

The equipment was purchased by the state but never used. In order to help local law enforcement agencies maintain and report data concerning Victims of Crime as well as free up state warehouse space the Attorney General's Office offered the equipment to those departments that requested it.

Chief of Police Leon Saddler attended a course approximately 1 1/2 years ago in which he signed up the City of Bovina for some of the surplus equipment.

After a long wait that was well worth it the police department received computer equipment that significantly improves the technology available to city law enforcement. The estimated value of the surplus equipment received by the city is \$7,000.

Mustangs Improve To 4-1 With A 40-6 Lynching Of Lorenzo

It was 38-7 at the half and Coach Scroggins let some of his younger players get some varsity experience.

The Mustangs took advantage of five Lorenzo turnovers to trample the Hornets 40-7 after adding a second half safety.

Scroggins was proud of his defense. "We were young to start the year and our defense has stepped up and improved every game." For the year the Mustangs have scored 153 points while holding opponents to only 33.

By comparison, district foe Farwell's totals are 156-40 and tonight's opening district opponent Morton has a record of 139-26.

As Scroggins noted, this time last year Morton was 0-5 and Bovina was 1-4. The numbers are exactly reversed this year as Morton brings an impressive 5-0 record to face Bovina at 4-1.

Against Lorenzo the Mustangs intercepted three passes, two by Lucas Ramos and one by David DeLaRosa, who returned it for a 30-yard touchdown to give Bovina the 38-7 halftime lead.

For the second straight week Bovina had 212 yards rushing. Scroggins said "With the turnovers, we didn't have very far to go to score. The only thing that stopped our kids was the goal line."

Senior running back Josh

Quintana who has been hobbled for a couple of weeks with a knee injury, rushed for 69 yards and 2 touchdowns.

Kick-off specialist John Solorio, who put his kickoffs into the end zone most of the night, had a surprise performance at running back. Coming off the bench to spell Quintana, Solorio gained 65 yards on 11 carries.

Junior Carlos Rivera added 45 yards on 7 carries and Ramos had 34 yards on 7 carries.

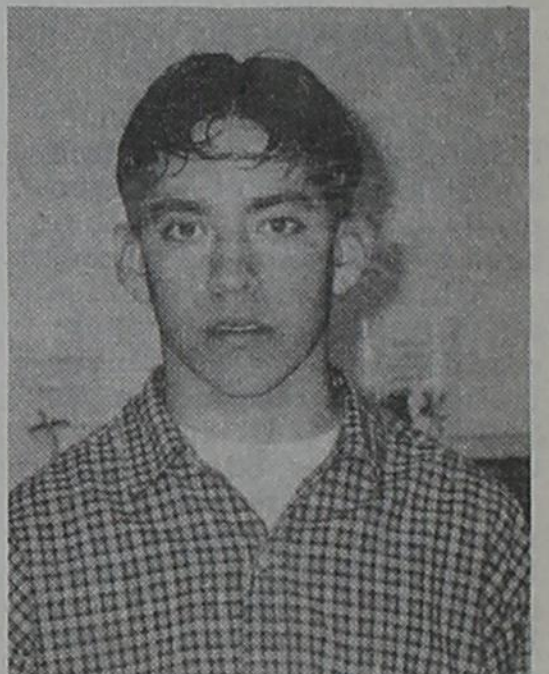
Quarterback Tyson Kerby was 2 for 4 in passing with both completions going for touchdowns, one to Juan Saucedo and the other to Quintana.

Saucedo was the Mustangs leading scorer for the night with five extra points, one field goal, and a touchdown, for a good night's work of 14 points.

Bovina put 242 yards of total offense on the books while holding the hapless Hornets to 94.

Through the first five games Ramos leads the team with 481 yards on 66 carries for an average of 7.2 yards per carry and he has scored 54 points.

The average age when 12- to 17-year olds say they first tried alcohol is 12.8 years. Kids today need to learn how to make better choices. We'll talk more about this next week.

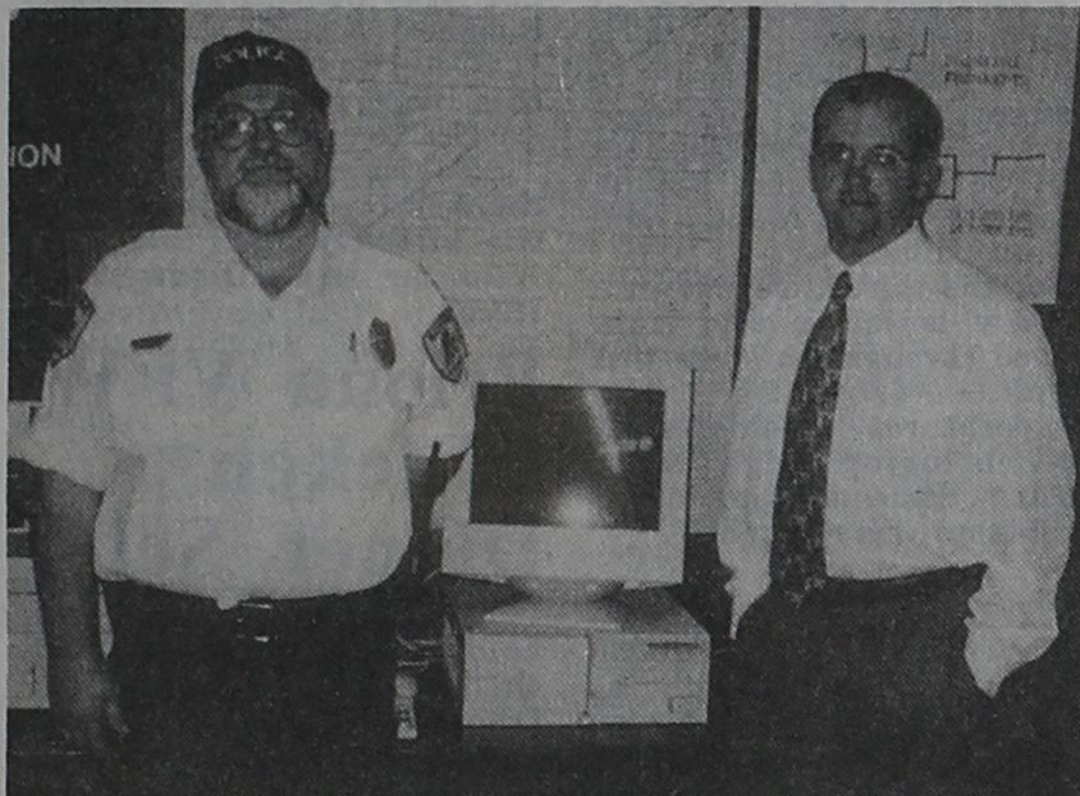

IT'S BEEN A BIG WEEK down here at the local office of the fourth estate. October 3 through 9 is National Newspaper Week. The actual celebration consisted of having an extra doughnut with our coffee on Monday a.m., otherwise it's been pretty much business as usual: covering the local goings on, snapping pictures of folks, grading football contest entries, fixing up ads for the business firms, and sticking all of it together into a form that vaguely resembles a newspaper.



I did notice, though, that October 3 through 9 is also National Squirrel Awareness Week, which is quite fitting, because you have to be pretty squirrely to go into this business in the first place. At least squirrels know who their enemies are. . . basically cats and an occasional hawk.

Newspaper folks are never exactly sure who their enemies are, because they (the enemies) write nasty letters if they didn't like what was in the paper, but they never sign their names so we can know who to watch out for, so as to duck out the back door if we see them coming in the front.

After being in the business for nearly forty years (close to fifty years if you count working on papers in high school and college), you'd think "newspapering" would begin to get a bit old. Not so! The opportunity to observe and comment on the human condition is what keeps this business new and exciting week after week. Our fellow beings never cease to amaze us. For instance:

In 1992, Frank Perkins of Los Angeles made an attempt to win the world flagpole-sitting record. However, he caught the flu and had to come down eight hours short of the 400 day record, only to find that his sponsor had gone broke, his girlfriend had left him and his electricity had been cut off.

The Bureau for "At-Risk Youth" of Plainview, NY, was forced to recall an "anti-drug" promotional pencil they were passing out to local school children. The pencils were printed with the slogan "Too Cool to Do Drugs." But as the pencils wore down and had to be sharpened, the message became "Cool to Do Drugs," and then later, "Do Drugs." When brought to the attention of the sponsoring group, a spokesman said they were "actually a little embarrassed about it all."

A woman came home to find her husband in the kitchen, shaking frantically with what appeared to be a wire running from his waist towards the electric skillet. Intending to jolt him away from the deadly electrical current, she whacked him with a handy plank of wood by the back door, breaking his arm in two places. Ex-Teacher Charged In Indecency

On September 24 Friona Police received a report from a local parent of inappropriate behavior toward their child by a local music teacher.

Chief Randy Geries, acting on the report, conducted a two-day investigation that resulted in the September 26 arrest of Charles Turner, 62, of Friona. Turner is a retired teacher who spent 35 years with Parmer County school districts in Farwell, Bovina, and Friona as teacher, special education teacher and school counselor.

He had been a private music and piano teacher for several years. On September 27 charges of indecency with a child were filed by local police. The incident, or incidents, involved more than one of his music students, according to Geries.

Chief Geries declined to reveal specifics of the ages or numbers of victims to protect their privacy.

Indecency with a child is a second degree felony punishable by a sentence of two to not more than 20 years in state prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

Turner, who officials say has admitted the offenses, is free on a \$5,000 bond. The case is expected to go before the November Parmer County grand jury.

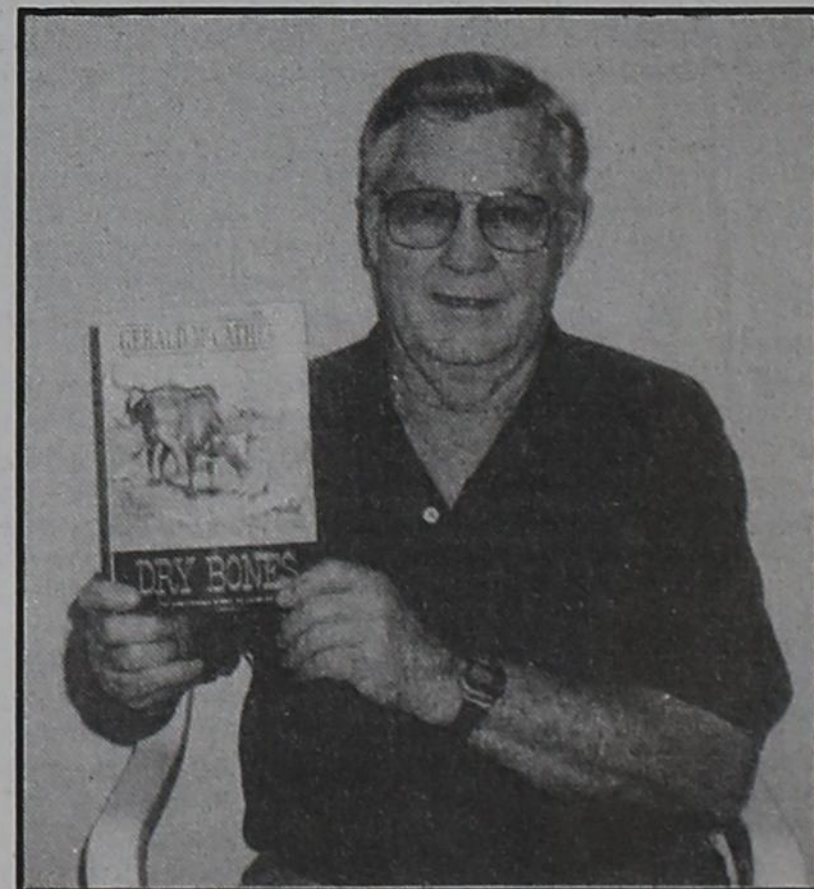

Margaret Moore's Family Submits Her Life Story

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This week we feature Margaret Moore.

Margaret Moore was born in Commerce, Texas on December 11, 1900 to Jeff and Nancy Boyles. She was the third born of nine children. There were two sons and seven daughters. Her parents were farmers so that meant everyone had to do lots of chores.

Her mother had to help with outdoor farm work so, at a very young age, Margaret learned how to do many household duties and also care for her younger siblings. Often she had to stand on a wooden box so she would be tall enough to prepare meals. She also learned to sew clothes, grow a vegetable garden, hoe and pick cotton and many other skills that she continued to use throughout her grown-up years.

Margaret married Robert J. "Bob" Moore, Sr. near

Memphis, Texas on April 23, 1922. The story is told that Bob was so determined the wedding would go as planned, that he invited two different ministers to come and perform the ceremony.

They lived in Hall County for a short time before moving to Claude, Texas where they lived until 1950. They then moved to PanTech Research Farms near Panhandle, Texas. Bob was employed by Texas Tech University in a cattle feeding research program. They both enjoyed this work until their retirement. In 1968 they moved to Amarillo.

They had three children: a daughter Mildred Davis and her husband Woodrow; a son Robert Moore, Jr. and his wife Jane; a daughter, Margaret Wilshire and her husband Bill. They all live in Amarillo.

Bill and Margaret were former Friona residents. Margaret and Bob have four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. They both were very proud of their family and always very interested in all their children.

Bob passed away February 20, 1982, just two months before their 60th wedding anniversary.

Margaret came to live at Prairie Acres in February of 1996. We all appreciate the good care and kind attention she receives here.

In her almost 99 years of life, Margaret has many memories, all the way from riding to school in a horse drawn buggy to memories of seeing man go into outer space. Lots of wonderful memories.

Before I forget, I am really getting tired of Jesse Ventura.

I had to tell you that before I forgot because I seem to forget often these days. The only time I remember to gripe about Jesse Ventura is when I see his big old Minnesota face on TV, which is every time I turn it on.

Just in case you try to sneak up on me next week, I do remember that on Friday, October 15, I will celebrate my 60th birthday. If you were going to throw me a surprise party, forget it. I wouldn't be surprised anyway.

At least turning 60 gives me an excuse for forgetting things. I have company though.

Carol Ellis won't let me and Bill go anywhere by ourselves. She is afraid we wouldn't remember how to get back. Worse yet, we might forget where we were supposed to be going.

Fall is my favorite time of year. The fall colors, pumpkins, leaves blowing, cooler weather, and new calendars.

Right about now many Hallmark and book stores and office supply places pile up stacks and racks of next year's calendars. It looks strange to see calendars advertised for the year 2000 when we have been writing 19-something all our lives.

Like most folks I couldn't get along without a calendar. When I was a teen, we looked for an excuse to go out to Wes Hickey's Garage and sneak a peek at the pin-up calendar he always had up just above his work bench.

Some company that manufactured automobile hoses always made sure that Wes wouldn't forget the date. Of course when you went out to Wes' place in October, his calendar would still be reading July. Sometimes last year's calendar would be hanging right along side this year's.

It depended on how pretty Wes thought the ladies were as to how long he left them up. Seems the July pin-ups were always a blouse full.

Later on when I went to

work in Dallas I had to have a calendar to plan my daily sales routine. By then calendars had become pretty fancy, with names like Day Runner and Day Timer.

They were so complicated that they had to be carried around in a zippered notebook with pages for each day and supplemental pages for other activities. They called them planning calendars.

I soon found out that it was a pain to unzip a notebook and flip through multi-pages just to find out where to be at 2 p.m. Tuesday.

Back when my life was really, really important I used a calendar with a page for each day. Later on, I was able to function quite well with a week-at-a-glance calendar.

Nowadays I carry around a month-at-a-glance book I bought over at Office Max in Clovis. The entire month is divided into little daily boxes.

I figure that if my daily activities do not fit into a one-inch square box then I am too busy and need to slow down. Much to my delight, many of the daily squares have nothing in them.

I received a 2000 American Century calendar from Time-Life Books with patriotic pictures for each month. Virtually every day on the calendar has some notation.

It gives birth dates for a lot of famous people like Nat King Cole and Shirley Temple. The debut of "I Love Lucy" in 1951 was on my birthday.

When they put all those notes in the calendar squares, it doesn't leave much room for your daily appointments, not to mention birthdays and anniversaries.

My mother has had a calendar in the same spot on the side of her refrigerator for 30 years. Every year she fills out another calendar with birthdays of her kids, grandkids, and now great-grandkids.

She lists birthdays for friends and relatives along with the weekly and monthly doctor's appointments for her

and Harry. Mother could not function without her refrigerator calendar.

Because of our newspaper deadlines every week and our need for accuracy, a calendar is indispensable in a newspaper office. Fred Ferguson at Lakeside Parts and Machine gives his customers a calendar each year that has two months on each sheet.

It is about 18" X 24" with nice western art at the top and two months displayed side-by-side on the bottom half. No squares to write in but a great calendar for what I do.

The only way to improve Fred's calendar would be to have one of Wes Hickey's pin-ups on the July-August page.

You can get calendars today that are more works of art than ways to count the days. Cat and dog calendars are popular sellers.

There are Native American calendars, astronomy calendars and those featuring trains or storms or religious motivation.

I was wondering whether there will be calendars to hang on the wall in 2050. With technology taking over, folks will probably have all kinds of neon, digital, electronic calendar options and full-blown wall calendars might be obsolete.

As I approach 2000, basking in the glory of 60 years on earth, I need to write things down and I'm glad that people like Fred will still be giving out calendars for a while.
