long run, may well prove the most important single de velopment of the whole "new deal."

This changed outlook finds its reflection in the various legislative and administrative acts by which the adminis tration is seeking to implement recovery. But it is a deeper thing than any mere change in the machinery of govern ment or poltical theory; ; it is not born of any party and it narticular group on Capitol Hill.
Briefly, thsi change can be described by saying that the odd kind of idealism that characterized us durin nearly all of the '20s.
We have outgrown, that is to say, a stage in our history during which we were perhaps the most purely materialistic people on earth. In that stage we worshiped materia uccess in a way that was almost devout.
