

Report Is Made To Judge Vaught During Recess At Kidnap Trial.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 21.— The terrified uncle of Katherine Kelly fugitive defendant in the Urschel case told U. S. Judge Ed-gar Vaught that Machine Gun Kelly threatened the lives of his entire family on their farm near Stratford, Okla., last night.

This revelation came at noon to scene in the heavily guarded courtroom where Harvey Bailey and 11 others are on trial accused of conspiracy in the kidnaping of Charles Urschel, Oklahoma City oil millionaire.

Fred Coleman, 40, confided the death threat to Judge Vaught after he was arrested following his appearance in the courtroom with his 72 year old father to demand five minutes speaking time.

Two hours later, after Coleman had refused to tell federal agents anything, the judge gave him a private interview during a recess. "He was scared," Judge Vaught said, "and said George (Machine Gun) Kelly had threatened his

Among the ancient institutions that have had a good bit of their gloss rubbed off by contact with a rough-necked world during the last few years one must not forget to list the once snooty game of tennis.

This game, which started 'way back when as an amusement for the nobility of Europe, has been carried along on the tide of events until now it is becoming a diversion for the masses, much like baseball and football; and the sign of its change is to be found in the way the gallaries behave at the big matches.

If you have followed the newspaper accounts of the recent matches at Forest Hills, you can hardly fail to have noticed that players, umpires and presiding officials were pained every so often by the effervescence of the paying spectators. A one-time tennis queen was booed lustily when she walked off the court; shouts of applause punctuated all of the games, the umpires were obliged often to call for quiet, and the players protested that the yells of the cash customers disturbed the Sabbath-like quiet in which the games were being conducted.

All of this is contrary to the ancient dignity of tennis. You are not supposed to cheer loudly, or to administer the razzberry, in a tennis stadium. A little refined hand-clapping, now and then—that's the limit.
