

LIFE TERMS FIGHTSUSPE

#### Keenan Advises Clemency For Armon Shannon In Talk To Jury.

By United Press OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 28 .-The Urschel kidnaping jury was

told today to decide whether the people of the United States shall have a government of law and order or "abdicate" in favor of machine gun gangsters.

Only for 22-year-old Armon Shannon, Texas farm boy defendant, did the government recom-mend mercy. Notorious Harvey Bailey. Albert Bates and the others accused were condemned in unmincing manner.

Assistant United States Attorney General Joseph Keenan demanded conviction of "each and every one of the nine men and one woman," Roscoe Turner was receiving the congratulations of his wife at Floyd on trial in the \$200,000 ransom

But, he told the jury, that "my own advice would be to let young Shannon go." He suggested that the jury might find Armon guilty and leave the question of a sentence to Federal Judge Edgar

The fate of all will go to the jury sometime tomorrow, with life sentences for each possible.

"The government of the United States stands on trial here today for its life," Keenan told the jury. "These defendants have chaienged the government's power to protect its citizens. We had beter frankly turn its control over to the Kellys, Baileys and the others, pay tribute to them through justly listributed taxes and admit the failure of our present form of



#### AN END OF REMISSIONS

The legislature's purpose to start a drive against delinquent taxpayers able to pay, who are accused of having used penalty remission laws for profit, shows that Texas has had about the last law of the depression further to waive penalties and interest.

The penalty remission bills did benefit some who would not have been able to pay back taxes and the severe penalties and interest. It permitted small home-owners for instance to save their properties.

From now on, the small homes-\$3000 assessed value of all homesteads-have been exempted from state taxes, and thus the burden has been somewhat lightened.


But it was found those property-owners best able to pay taxes were taking advantage of the generous attitude by waiting for laws to remit their penalties and interest. In some cases, the property-owners were using the money they owed the state, county, schools and city for speculation in real estate, or the building of rental property, all on the delinquent-tax rolls.

That was what has turned the state policy away from further remissions and waivers.

At the next regular session, the legislature may shift the tax load about somewhat. There is little prospect in the remaining three weeks of this session that anything of a substantial nature can or will be done about taxes, despite a pre-session campaign by a state group for a sales-tax substitute for part of the present load of ad valorem levies and for amortizing the bonds to be issued.

Much is being said, in the state rehabilitation program, about the proposed subsistence colonies, or small group farm-operations.

These subsistence farms, at best, are but a first step toward the rehabilitation goal, and a step twice-removed from its achievement.

The objective is to get industrial misfits back upon land where they can produce their own food from the soil. But, as swelling tenantry, and perpetuating the old system of huge plantations all in catton or wheat, with low paid labor, or poverty-stricken share-croppers, that would be worse than futile.

The real objective must combine living on the farm with farm-ownership. It is predicted upon the independ- improved ence of owning land and a farm home, of working for one's self, for growing food and feed, for creating a con- to Dallas to make his home. tented home life in which money is needed for only a few wants and a few luxuries.

France, with the highest acreage of any nation of landowners, has over half its landowners in possession of less than  $2\frac{1}{2}$  acres. In China, nearly 90 per cent of the families subsist on less than two acres of land each. In those countries it was shown that a family can live on an extremely small plot of ground, intensively cultivated.

The subsistence colonies, where community facilities are provided, will enable families to get a modest start on small tracts. But they can serve only to speed the transiation, not only back to the farm, but back to ownership of their farms and their farm homes.



THAT the attempt on the part of many polticians to put certain lines of commercial business out of business and the government into commercial business in dertc competition with its ctilzens is causing much concern to the business world, as it endangers all business.

It does not seem fair to those citizens who have invested their money to gain for themselves an occupation and a means of making a living and those millions of citizens who have invested their savings in stocks and bonds of private enterprises to be attacked in an unfair manner.

There is only one end to a private enterpsise owned by citizens that must enter into direct competition with the government-the citizens lose.

A corporation is nohing more or less than a lot of people putting their money together to do what one person cannot do alone.

There seems to be nothing wrong with these different business concerns except that they are big and successful and, as yet in this country, it is not a crime to be successful.

Some politicians seem to think that abuse of private capital is a short route to applause and public office.






