#### **RETRENCHER IN ACTION**

Rep. B. F. Vaughan of Greenville, who ranks with Pope of Nueces as one of the extreme retrenchers of the legislature, wrote an amendment upon the horse-racing bill to limit the racing commissioner to \$10 per day or \$1200 a year, instead of th \$3600-a-year salary that some thought they were granting this official. The yearly limit would hold the racing official actually to 120 days work a year, or a little better than two days a week.

Mr. Vaughan insisted that some of the revenues from licensing horse racing and betting on horse races should go to the state, rather than to a set of office-holders for administration.

#### CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

The Texas house of representatives has approved ratifying the federal child labor amendment. State senators say the upper branch will in all probability return also a favorable vote.

In this case, the depression, the need of finding jobs for adults, will confer a great boon on children, in stopping exploitation of their labor, in keeping them in schools. during their childhood rather than pushing them toward prisons when grown up.

## GORMAN WINS FROM MAVS BY 12-7 SCORE


The Gorman boys outclassed the Mavericks and carried away the heavy end of a 13 to 7 score in the game played here Friday afternoon. Sweeping around Eastland ends almost at will the visitors chalked up gain after gain through out the game. The absence of Garrison, Simmons and Railey from the playing was very noticeable to the Eastland fans.

The Mavericks were in scoring position three different times during the contest and lost their opportunity on fumbles. It appeared that Coach Petty was using this game to try out all of the men on his squad; and, if so, he made the find of at least one, as Dick Mays showed the promise of becoming a very fine backfield man.

Eastland's lone marker came in the last two minutes of play. Gorman got off a bad punt that went out of bounds on her own 32 yard line. Tully hit right tackle for no gain. Gorman was penalized five yards for being off-side. Tulley made good a five-yard pass and immediately shot another one for 10 yards. On the next play he passed over the line to Taylor. Taylor also took a pass for the extra point.

The Mavericks' first chance to score came on the first play after Eastland had kicked off to Gorman. The visitor's attempted punt on the first down was blocked and recovered by Eastland on Gorman's 10 yard line. Two line bucks lost ground for the home boys and a fumble on the third down lost them the ball.

Eastland's second opportunity came in the third quarter, when



an opponent's fumble was recovered by a Maverick on Gorman's 49 yard line and Tulley opened up a single hand drive that carried the ball to the goal line. He hit the line for three yards; his pass to Taylor netted 10 more; a drive off left tackle gained 9; a similar drive at right tackle was no gain; another at the same point added 8 a line plunge got one more; a five yard off-side penalty against Gor-man put the ball on the three yard line and Tulley hit left tackle for the remaining distance but fumbled as he crossed the line and the ball rolled out of bounds in the end zone and his drive failed.

Following the Maverick touchdown, Tulley kicked to Rider on the Gorman 20 yard line and he raced to Eastland's 48 yard marker before being brought down with such force that he fumbled and Eastland resovered. Tulley shot a 32-yard pass. On the next play he rifled one to Maxey on the goal line. For an instant it looked as if the game was won but Maxey failed to rold the ball. And so went the Maverisk's last chance.

Gorman took off on the first touchdown drive late in the second quarter. Tulley punted to the visitor's 30 yard line and Rider ran the ball back to Eastland's 40 yard mark. A pass and three line bucks advanced to within five yards of the goal and Rider raced around left end for the counter. The visitor's second touchdown

The visitor's second touchdown was made late in the fourth quarter ,after Tulley had punted out of bounds on Gorman's 16 yard line. Taking off at this point they drove steadily down the field, using straight football until they crossed the goal. Hamrick booted against the goal post on his try for the extra point.


