BREAD BONDS

AUSTIN, Feb. 28.-Governor Ferguson's signature of the \$7,-750,000 relief bond bill was awaited today by the state bond commission to speed the sale of "bread bonds" for relief of destitute persons in Texas.

Commissioners were to meet after the governor's signature to ascertain whether relief funds can be made available by private bond sale. Otherwise the legal processes of advertising and opening bids from prospective buyers will delay actual cash receipts.

Legislative mandate that the \$2,750,000 unsold portion of relief bonds from a previous issue be Reed, who plays the part of Thomwho will speak at Breckenridge \$5,000,000 additional bonds will cause some delay.

The legislature directed the bonds be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100 and multiples of \$100 to make them attractive to small investors.
