Women Must Take Part In Program of Rehabilitation

AUSTIN .- Women must take a big part in the rehabilitation program of the state if it is to be more than a materialistic, bread and meat affair, it was stated today by Director Marie Dresden of the Texas relief commission when commenting upon progress made in the rural recovery program to

date. "Our first thought is to see that destitute families are enabled to provide themselves with food and clothing," said Director Dresden, "but if we stop there, we have built only the foundation. We are laving out plans which will enable people of this southwestern area to do more than merely exist. Work projects necessary under the relief program can be directed toward bringing shade trees to streets and lawns, to creating community parks, to building community clubhouses which reflect the native architecture of this area and set a model for homes of the same type. Our first settlers here often had an architectural type all their own, dictated by the native material and by the climatic conditions. We have reason to be proud of such architecture. Rather than imitate other types, we will do well to keep the honest and beautiful types which we ourselves developed.'







Lighting plays an important part in the scheme of the new Ford building, which is being designed to demonstrate the scope of the Ford World Empire. The building itself will be 900 feet long by 215 feet wide, terminatng at the south end in a circular court, 204 feet in diameter. A mammoth lighting scheme is being constructed in the outer edge of the court, designed to develop tints and shades never previously produced with electric lights. One lighting effect will show how pure white light can be produced when blue, green and red lights are all turned on at full intensity. Dimming equipment for the entire mobile lighting installation weighs twelve and one1half tons and requires 20 miles of wiring.









A second planting of bush beans prevents further planting. This keeps a fresh supply coming along potatoes. all the while

Late lettuce may be planted now. Black Seeded Simpson is a good variety of leaf lettuce that will be ready for use in about four weeks after planting. A number of the heading types will do well planted this late.

It is the time to set sweet potato slips. An acre should yield around 100 bushel, ready for harvesting in October. Set the slips 12 to 16 inches apart in rows 3 1-2 to 4 feet apart. Close planting will prevent the potatoes from getting too large. If set apart potatoes grow large and coarse. Slips set now can be trimmed in 3 or 4 weeks, using vine cuttings for increasing the planting of potatoes. One-half acre set in early arsenate slips will produce enough growth to set an additional one-half acre from vine cuttings a month from time of setting.


