It was pointed out today by the executive committee that it was urgent that every committeeman attend the meeting, because the last-minute details must be taken care of and a concerted drive to sell tickets to keep the enterprise from being a financial failure must be started immediately.

"Nearly everyone is taking it for granted that a large number will buy tickets on the night of the performance," Miss Kaufmann, advance agent for the players, stated today, "but it has been our experience in the past that every town believes it is different and people won't buy tickets until the last moment, but in each instance where drive was not conducted early the play has not been the financial success that it should."

The Passion Play is being advertised over an area including Mineral Wells to the east, Dublin to the south, Cisco and Baird to the west and Graham to the north, and in each town it was indicated that a number would attend from out of town. The meeting tonight is to get the ticket buying started locally so that reservations can be made both for the local people and for the out of town visitors.

We Honor the Finest in Men and Machines

In the last decade New York City has held two of those hysterical, ear-sattering receptions which set a high-water mark for the outburst of popular enthusiasm.

One was to celebrate the return of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh after his great flight to Paris.

The other, held just the other day, marked the arrival in New York harbor of the French ocean liner Normandie.

By contrasting the two events which were able to summon forth this melange of screaming whistles, swirling storms of ticker tapt and cheering of massed thousands of people, you can get a pretty fair line on the kind of things which really touch off our enthusasm these days.

In its greeting to the Normandie New York was paying the homage that we all feel to a great mechanical triumph.

This is an age of machinery, as some thousands of solemn commentators (including this one) have frequently remarked. It is a machine age, that is, not merely because it has a great many intricate and ingenious machines, but because it lives through them and by them. New York itself, for instance, could not survive a fortnight if it had to return to the horse and buggy age.

So it is only natural that the Normandie's arrival should, provoke a storm of cheers and a deep intensity of interest. A great ship of this kind sums up the mechanical age as well as any contrivance ever built. In the mere details of its construction there is a series of near-miracles; and the fnal fitting touch is supplied by the fact that for all its size and perfection of detail, the big ship probably will never

So much for the Normandie. Now for the other demonstration—the one held some eight ytars ago in honor of Col. Lindbergh.

That, too, was part of our mechanical age, inasmuch as the airplane itself is one of the most characteristic bits of machinery of this generation. But the celebration honored the man, not the machine. It was a people's instinctive tribute to a demonstration of man's power to confront danger, hardship and fear, single-handed, without falter-

And when you contrast that feat with the one represented by the liner Normandie you can draw a little moral

Two things are able to touch off our enthusiasm these days; fine machnes—and fine men. Everything considered, we seem to be able to produce about as many of one as the other. And we have the saving grace to realize that the machines are the lss important of the two.





Indications and symbolism had to take the place of the reality. A cask standing on end represented the mountain Christ stood upon when the Devil tempted him. Thunder was imitated by the report of a gun. In order to show that the Devil had entered into him Judas held a blackbird in front of his mouth and fluttered its wings. The suicide of Judas was an execution in which Satan was the hangman. He dragged Judas at the end of a rope, an animal concealed in front of his clothing. Satan tears open the garment, the bird flies away, the intestines fall out and Satan and Judas slide the rope into Hell. The entrance of Hell was pictured by a wide open mouth of a monster, and souls captured and released during the play passed through this mouth. A painted picture, representing the soul was hung from the mouth of each of the two thieves who died upon the cross. The angel takes the soul of the penitent thief. The Devil snatches the soul of the impenitent one.

The actors remained on the stage during the entire performance They sat upon barriers of their respective divisions and were permitted to leave their places only to recite their lines. As each finished speaking, he returned to his place. All costumes were of the period of the living players. History was utterly ignored in that respect. The costumes were magnificent and costly, and silks, velvet, jewels and ine carpets decorated the Passion Plays of the time. They gave in this highest development, a true picture of German city life. Serious and lively humor were developed, but as time went on and the seventeenth century went along, the plays fell more and more into the hands of the lower orders. The ecclesiastical authorities forbade their presentation, usually on the grounds of disgraceful and irrev erant farce. The Reformation was unfriendly to the Passion Plays. They were relegated finally to small out-of-the-way villages and towns. Public interest in the Passion Play did not return until the last decade of the nineteenth cen-


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
