'99 Mid-School Honor Students Announced

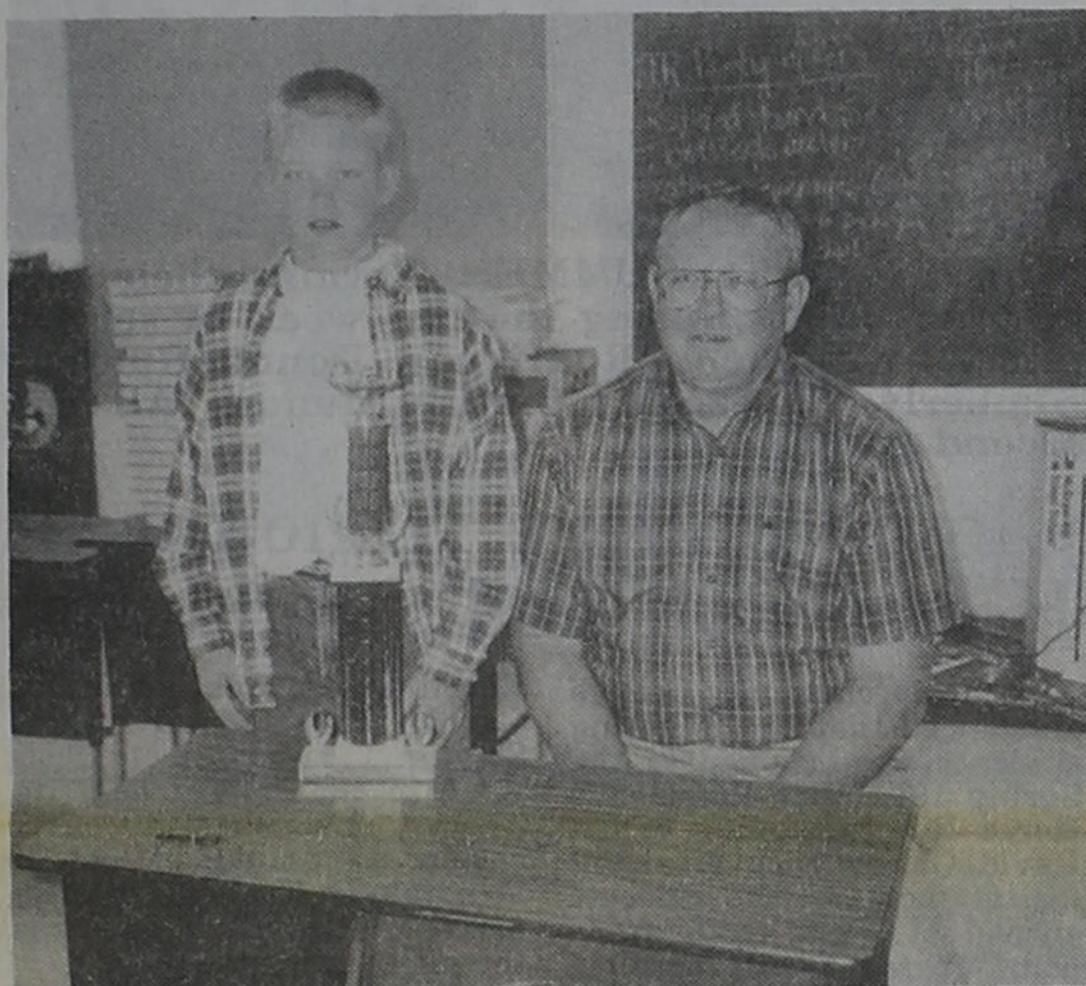

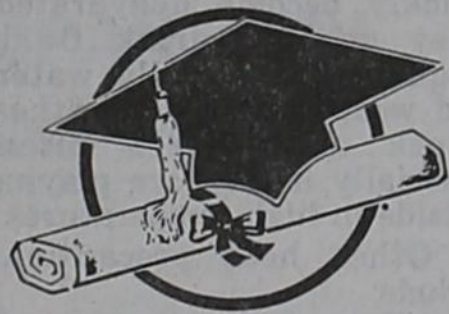


MATH WHIZ Zane Anderson is shown with fifth grade teacher Bob Martin and his top math trophy. See story.

Zane Anderson Is A Top Fifth Grade Math Student In Texas

Bovina fifth grader Zane Anderson, son of Rick and Denise Anderson, had the top score in the state of Texas for students entering the MATHFAX competition. Fifth grade teacher Bob Martin conducted the math tests for Bovina's fifth graders, then submitted the tests through MATHFAX to be matched with other students. MATHFAX is a private educational testing company based in Macon, Georgia. According to Martin there were more than 15,000 elementary students nationwide that took the tests. He said the tests were administered once each month for four months. Each test had 25 questions (and a 30-minute time limit) for a possible score of 100.

Zane was the only fifth grader in Region 10 (which are participating schools in the state of Texas) to score 89 points and thus he won the top trophy. Each school was allowed to have as many students participate as they wanted, but only the scores of the top three students from each school were recorded. According to Martin, the tests were based on the college entrance exam format at 5th grade level.

Parmer County Farm Receives Lone Star Land Steward Award

The battle to save Texas' environment is not being fought in the Legislature or in the courtroom. It's being fought and won at the local level--on Texas' farms and ranches. In fact, while 80 per cent of Texas live in urban areas, more than 97 per cent of Texas land is privately owned. That's why Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) believes it is important to recognize and honor private landowners who have done extraordinary things to protect water resources, plant and wildlife habitat. A local High Plains farm--the Four Osborn Brothers Farm of Parmer County--was named one of ten regional winners of the 1999 Lone Star Land Steward Awards presented annually by Texas Parks and Wildlife. The award recognizes private landowners and managers who have demonstrated exemplary attention to maintaining and enhancing

the Texas landscape. The Four Osborn Brothers Farm will be honored at a June 1 reception in Austin along with nine other regional winners, a corporate winner, and a wildlife management association or cooperative. One of those will be named the most outstanding Lone Star Land Steward in the state for 1999. The Four Osborn Brothers Farm is owned and operated by Robert, Mark, Matt and Ben Osborn. The Osborn family has owned the land known as Four Osborn Brothers Farm fifty years. Located in the heart of the Panhandle's premier ring-necked pheasant country, this farm is home to numbers of songbirds, waterfowl and pheasants in an intensively agricultural setting. The Osborns made a number of improvements to the land including providing

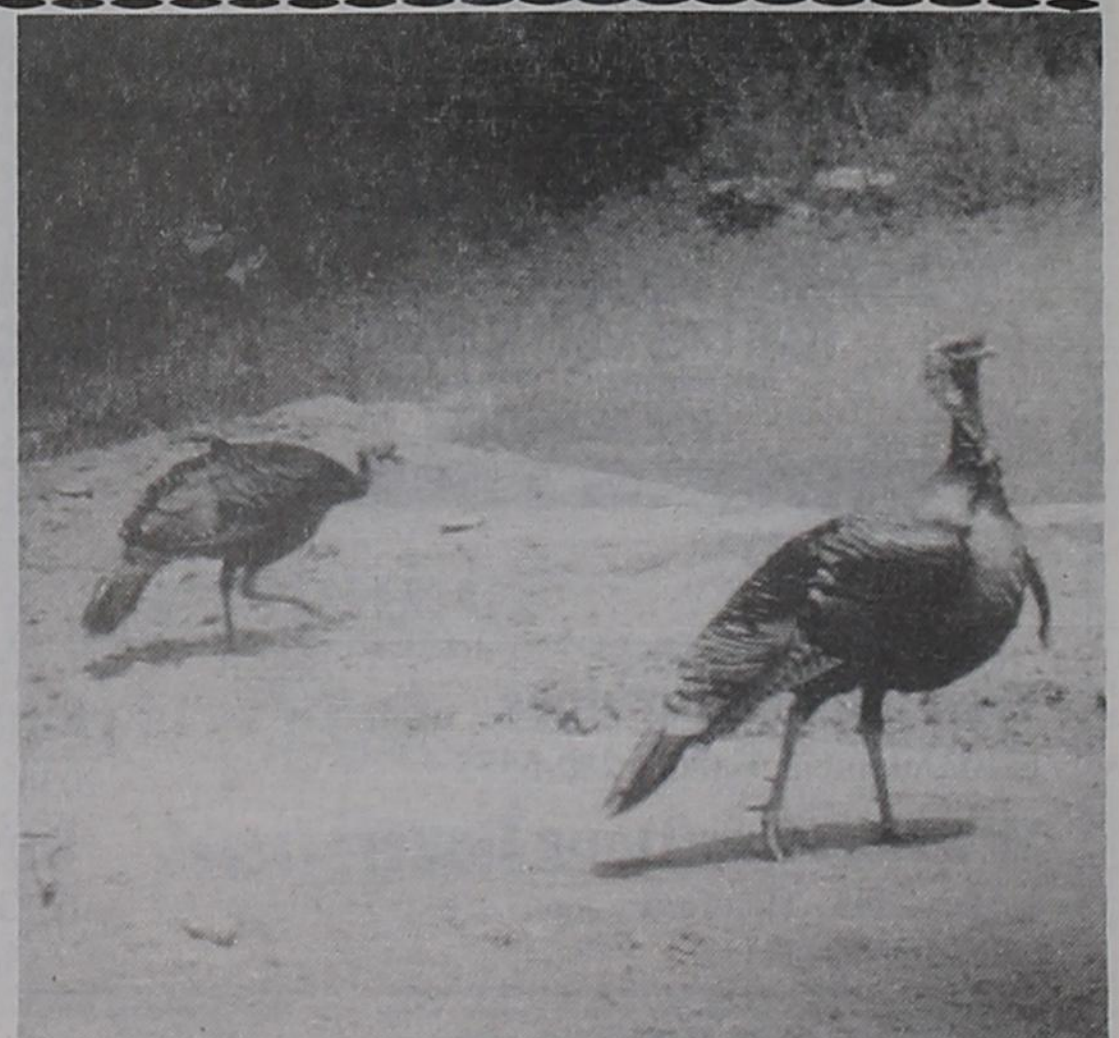
additional cover and water for the quail and pheasants, rejuvenated fields by prescription burns and extensive reseeding, and returned some farmland to permanent cover thereby conserving Ogallala Aquifer water as well as providing a reduction in water erosion rates. Texas Parks and Wildlife recognized their skillful implementation of conservation practices, guided by local professionals in resource management agencies, in serving as a model for other landowners in Parmer County. "The stewardship role of the private landowner is little known and seldom appreciated," said Andrew Sanson, executive director for Texas Parks and Wildlife. "They are literally on the front lines of maintaining our state's ecological resources. We owe them a heartfelt thank you."

IF YOU HAVE NOT made plans for the Memorial Day weekend, Carol and I would like to offer a suggestion. Take one of the days and drive up to Palo Duro Canyon. We showed off the canyon to our visiting cousins from Jackson, Tennessee, Lenny and Patty Ellis. Carol and I had been to Palo Duro at least half-a-hundred times, maybe more. But this past Monday, the canyon displayed itself for us and our visitors in its most beautiful state we could ever remember seeing. Maybe it was the fact that it's spring. Wildflowers in Central Texas, which draw thousands of visitors every spring, can't possibly be any prettier than those on the floor of the canyon at the present time. Carol identified broomweed, golden aster, yellow daisies, and naturally the yellow blooms on the prickly-pear cactus. Even the miniature white blooms of the bindweed growing alongside the highway looked pretty, although some of our farmer friends might disagree. The plains black-foot is a small, low-growing daisy-like flower that was in great abundance along the canyon rim. The poppy-mallow, also known as wine-cup, looks like a primrose, only the color is a deep fuschia. Indian blanket (which I erroneously called Indian Paintbrush for our cousins) is a red daisy-type flower with yellow tips and rust-brown center. True to its name, it blanketed every open area in the bottom of the canyon. There were a number of miniature blossoms of various colors that Carol identified as fleabane. There were asters of different colors, as well as purple thistles and Blue Gilia. There were also some tall, purple, hairy-looking plants that

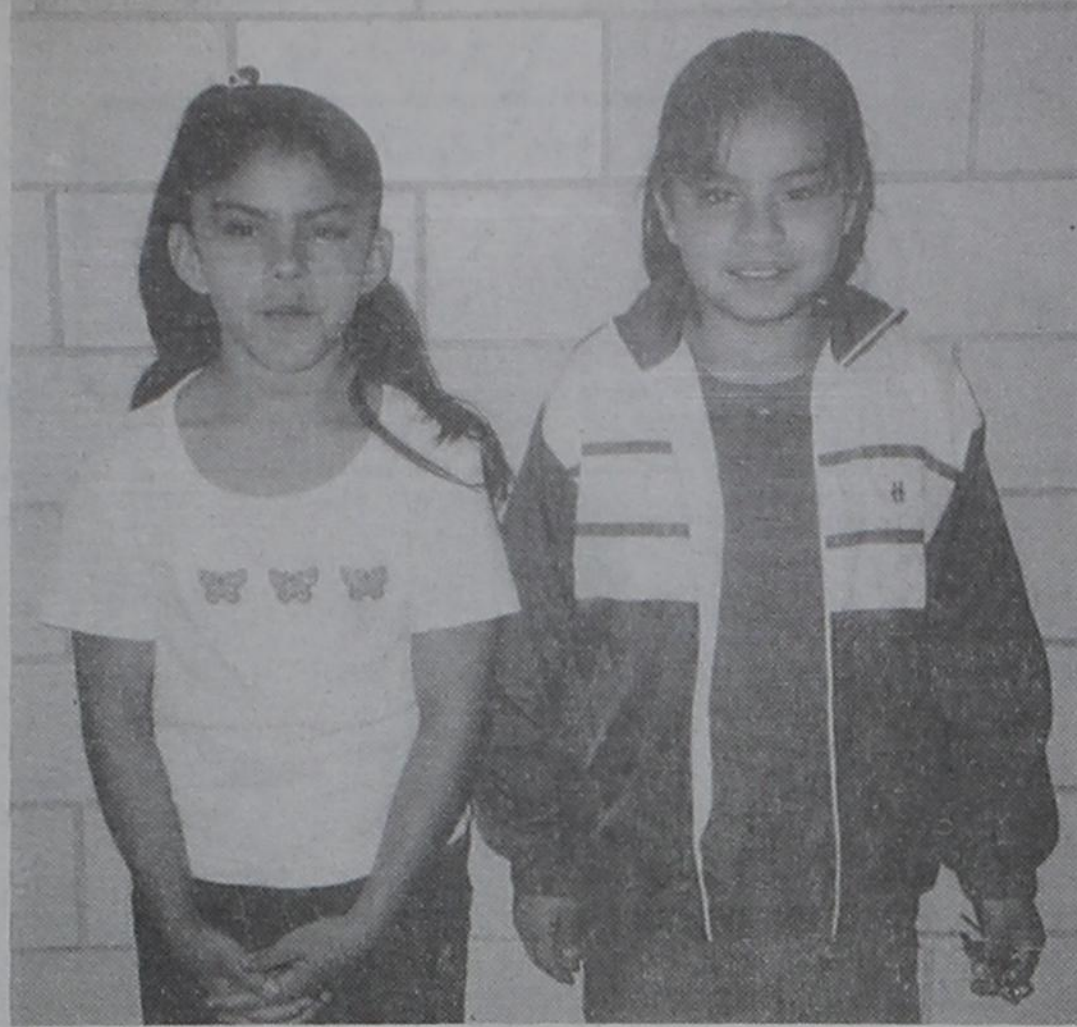
we couldn't even locate in our Texas wildflower guide. They might have been Indian Breadfoot. I told our guests as we reached the canyon floor that we might get to see some wildlife, especially since that area has received nice early-spring rains. I had barely got this hoped-for statement out of my usually not-prophetic mouth when Lenny shouted "There's a wild turkey!" Then, as I scrambled for my camera, Patty came out with "There's another one!" This was the first trip for the cousins to visit us in Parmer County, and we hope not their last. I think they enjoyed seeing the sights of the Panhandle area, and Carol and I definitely enjoyed taking them around. Many folks probably think this area is pretty "plain vanilla." But I think we have a lot to be proud of. Sometimes we just need to stop and look around us--maybe as though we were seeing things for the first time. Not so bad after all!

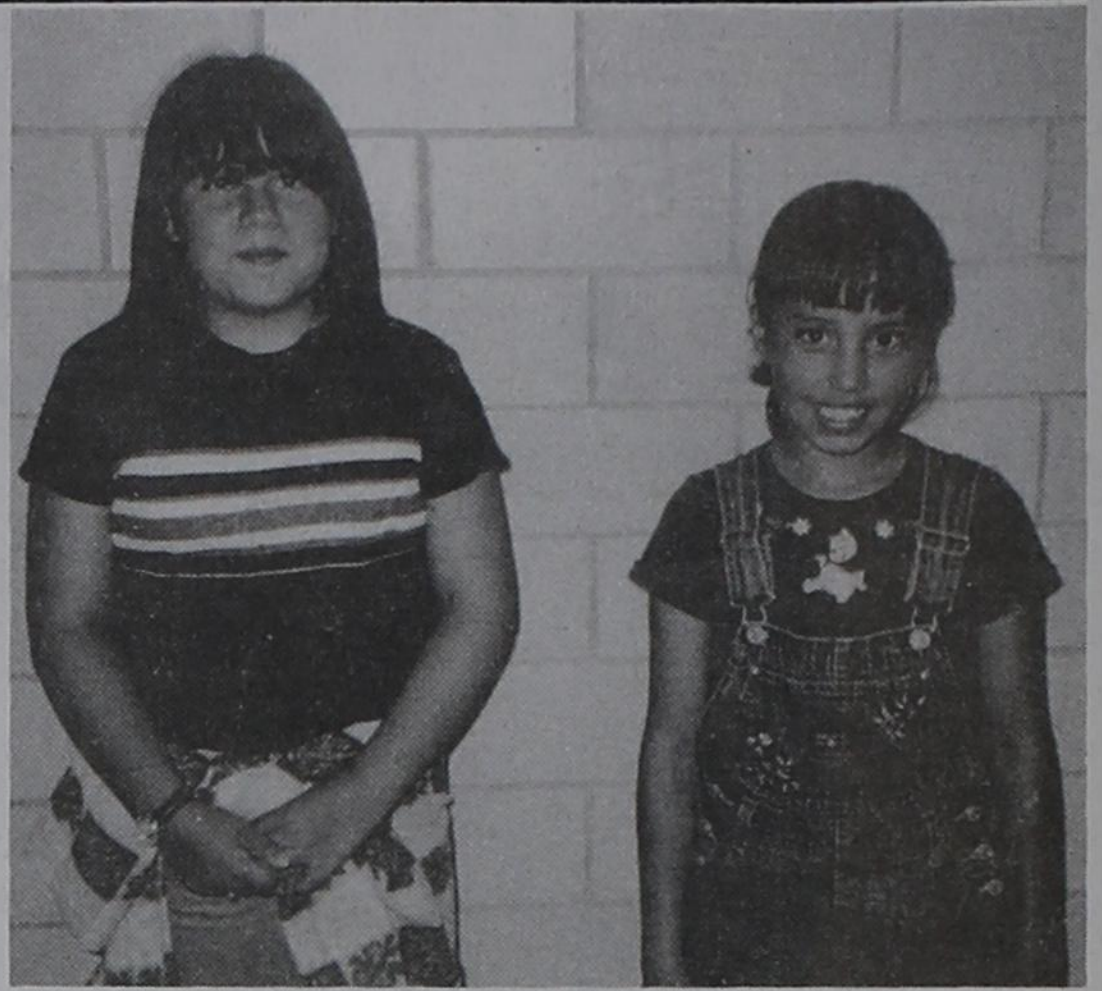

TDH Offers Advice For Staying Healthy In Hot Temperatures

Texans who suffered through 1998's deadly heat wave may be dreading the long, bright days of spring, summer and fall. According to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), last year was a scorcher with more than 140 heat-related deaths recorded in Texas through October.

Most often, the elderly, the very young, people with other illnesses or those without access to air conditioning are the victims of intense, prolonged heat. The combination of high temperatures and high humidity can cause a person's natural cooling system, or perspiration, to work overtime. Dehydration and heat illness can result if a person does not replace fluids and salts lost during perspiration.

Symptoms of a heat illness include profuse sweating, muscle cramps, weakness, dizziness, nausea, weak but rapid pulse and headaches. People with these symptoms should find shade and ventilation and drink water. If fluids are not replaced quickly, heat stroke can follow causing extremely high body temperatures, red and dry skin, rapid pulse, confusion, brain damage, loss of consciousness and, eventually, death. For severe symptoms get medical help immediately.

People can take precautions against heat illness, said Joe Stone, director of the TDH Emergency Preparedness Division. "Using common sense to stay cool is the most important protection you have," he said.

"Staying in an air-conditioned area, either at home or in a public place, is

the most efficient way to combat heat. If air conditioning is not available, pull the shades over the windows and use cross-ventilation and fans to cool rooms. But in high temperatures and humidity, turn off the fans or aim them through a window to blow the hot air out."

Children especially can quickly become dehydrated. They need to drink fluids frequently, especially water, and wear light, loose clothes. Check on children often, especially if they are playing outside in high temperatures.

Other heat precautions include:

- Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle during hot weather.
- Drink plenty of fluids, but avoid drinks with alcohol, caffeine or a lot of sugar.
- Plan strenuous outdoor activity for early morning or late in the day.
- Take frequent breaks when working outside.
- Wear sun block, hats and light, loose-fitting clothes.
- Stay indoors and in air conditioning as much as possible.
- Eat more frequently but be sure meals are well balanced and light.
- Avoid dressing babies in heavy clothing or wrapping them in warm blankets.
- Check frequently on people who are elderly, ill or may need help.
- Check with a doctor about the effects of the sun and heat exposure when taking prescription drugs, especially diuretics or antihistamines.
- At first signs of heat illness--dizziness, nausea, headaches, muscle cramps--move to a cooler place, rest a few minutes, then slowly

drink a cool beverage. Seek medical attention immediately if conditions do not improve.

• Pay attention to pets also. Be sure they have plenty of water and do not close them up in parked cars or hot buildings.

TDH's Division of Emergency Preparedness has a packet of heat wave-related publications available that includes a bilingual flier on heat precautions; a brochure explaining heat illness; instructions for school activity directors and coaches; and special reminders for nursing home and medical facility administrators.

"We urge the public to use and share these publications in any way they can to ensure that the high death and illness count of 1998 is not repeated," Stone said. The information also is available on the TDH Web site at www.tdh.state.tx.us Click on Emergency Preparedness in the Healthy Community directory, then click on the Texas Heat Wave logo. People also may get the information from their local EMS, local health department or from TDH by calling 512-834-6700, ext. 2322, or faxing 512-834-6736.

"How About Some Chinese Take-Out"

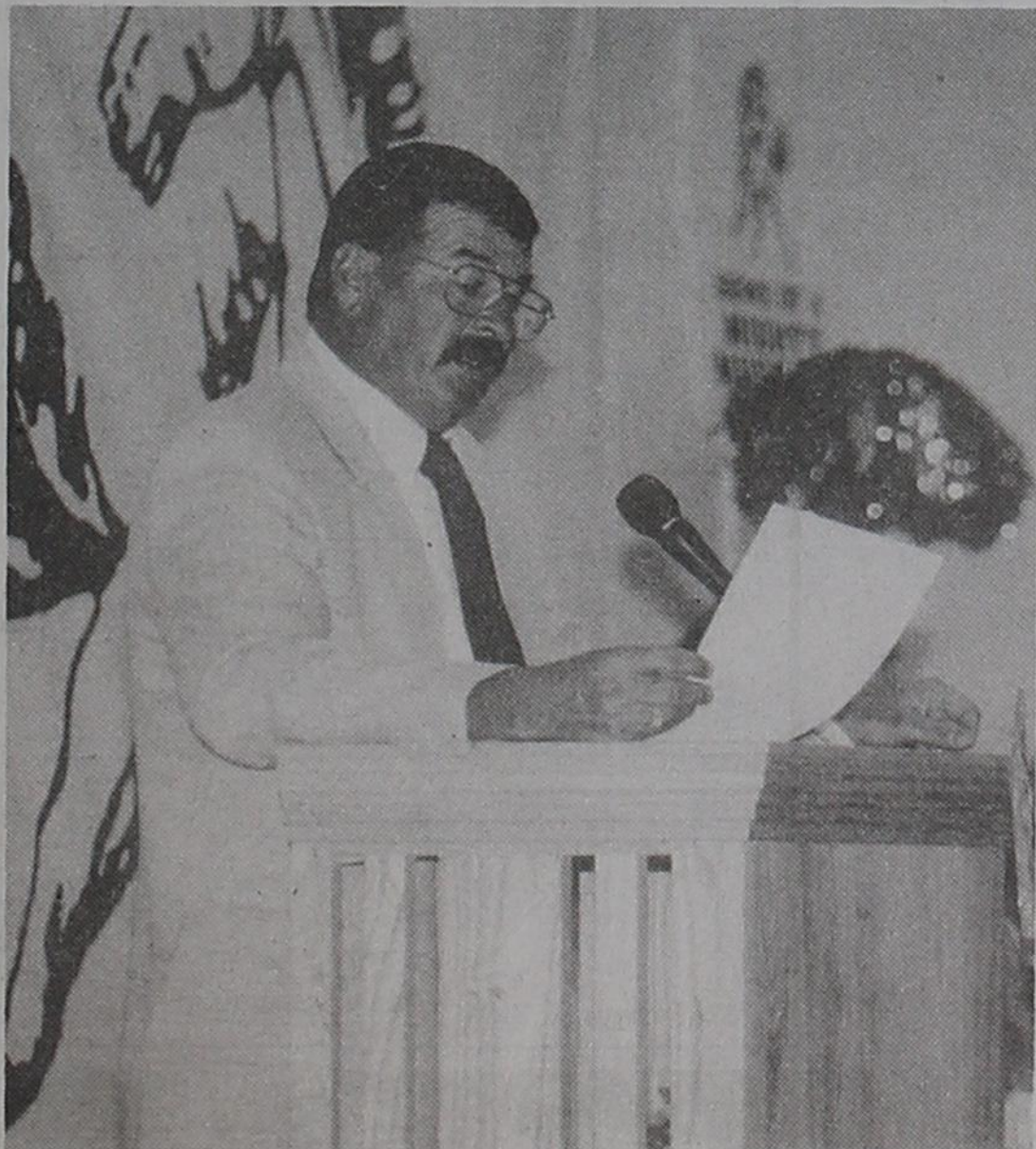
Crop Scouting Methods Taught

As another crop year begins with the ever present threat of damage from various pests, a workshop will teach scouts to survey crops to assess pest infestation levels in integrated pest management (IPM) programs in the area. The training will be conducted June 1 in Plainview by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The workshop at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center, located on south U.S. Highway 87 (Business Route), is open to summer scouts of private consultants, pesticide applicators and producers who scout their own fields. The workshop will begin at 8:20 and end at 4:25 p.m.

This year's workshop has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) to award 5.0 continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification of commercial, noncommercial and private applicators. Included in these CEUs will be one unit for laws and regulations, three for integrated pest management and one for the general category.

Additional information is available from the Parmer County Extension Office.
