

'99 Mid-School Honor **Students Announced**


Bovina Middle School academic honors awards were named on Wednesday during an assembly at the school.

Parmer County Farm Receives Lone Star Land Steward Award The battle to save Texas'


The Four Osborn Brothers Farm will be honored at a June 1 reception in Austin along with nine other regional winners, a corporate winner, and a wildlife management association or cooperative. One of those will be named the most outstanding Lone Star Land Steward in the state for 1999.


The Four Osborn Brothers Farm is owned and operated by Robert, Mark, Matt and Ben Osborn. The Osborn family has owned the land known as Four Osborn Brothers Farm fifty years. Located in the heart of the Panhandle's premier ringnecked pheasant country, this farm is home to numbers of songbirds, waterfowl and pheasants in an intensively agricultural setting.

The Osborns made a number of improvements to the land including providing

additional cover and water for the quail and pheasants, rejuvenated fields by prescription burns and extensive reseeding, and returned some farmland to permanent cover thereby conserving Ogallala Aquifer water as well as providing a reduction in water erosion rates. Texas Parks and Wildlife recognized their skillful implementation of conservation practices, guided by local professionals in resource management agencies, in serving as a model for other landowners in Parmer County.

"The stewardship role of the private landowner is little known and seldom appreciated," said Andrew Sansom, executive director for Texas Parks and Wildlife. "They are literally on the front lines of maintaining our state's ecological resources. We owe them a heartfelt thank you."





TDH Offers Advice For Staying Healthy In Hot Temperatures

through 1998's deadly heat combat heat. wave may be dreading the conditioning is not available, long, bright days of spring, summer and fall. According to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), last year was a scorcher with more than 140 heat-related deaths recorded in Texas through October.

Most often, the elderly, the very young, people with other illnesses or those without access to air conditioning are the victims of intense, prolonged heat. The combination of high temperatures and high humidity can cause a person's natural cooling system, or perspiration, to work overtime. Dehydration and heat illness can result if a person does not replace fluids and salts lost during perspiration.

Symptoms of a heat illness include profuse sweating, muscle cramps, weakness, dizziness, nausea, weak but rapid pulse and headaches. People with these symptoms should find shade and ventilation and drink water. If fluids are not conditioning as much as replaced quickly, heat stroke possible. can follow causing extremely high body temperatures, red and dry skin, rapid pulse, confusion, brain damage, loss of consciousness and, eventually, death. For severe symptoms get medical help immediately. People can take precautions against heat illness, said Joe Stone, director of the TDH Emergency Preparedness Division. "Using common sense to stay cool is the most important protection you have," he said.

Texans who suffered the most efficient way to drink a cool beverage. Seek If air pull the shades over the windows and use crossventilation and fans to cool But in high rooms. temperatures and humidity, turn off the fans or aim them through a window to blow the hot air out."

Children especially can quickly become dehydrated. They need to drink fluids frequently, especially water, and wear light, loose clothes. Check on children often, especially if they are playing outside in high temperatures.

Other heat precautions include:

•Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle during hot weather.

•Drink plenty of fluids, but avoid drinks with alcohol, caffeine or a lot of sugar.

•Plan strenuous outdoor activity for early morning or late in the day.

•Pay attention to pets also. Be sure they have plenty of water and do not close them up in parked cars or hot buildings.

TDH's Division of Emergency Preparedness has a packet of heat wave-related publications available that includes a bilingual flier on heat precautions; a brochure explaining heat illness; instructions for school activity directors and coaches; and special reminders for nursing home and medical facility administrators.

"We urge the public to use and share these publications in any way they can to ensure that the high death and illness count of 1998 is not repeated," Stone said. Crop Scouting Methods Taught

As another crop year begins with the ever present threat of damage from various pests, a workshop will teach scouts to survey crops to assess pest infestation levels in integrated pest manage-ment (IPM) programs in the area. The training will be conducted June 1 in Plainview by the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-vice.

The workshop at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center, located on south U.S. Highway 87 (Business Route), is open to summer scouts of private consultants, pesticide applicators and producers who scout their own fields. The workshop will begin at 8:20 and end at 4:25 p.m. This year's workshop has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) to award 5.0 continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification of commercial, noncommercial and private applicators. Included in these CEUs will be one unit for laws and regulations, three for integrated pest management and one for the general category.






