The sailors brought a story of grim privation suffered by 52 survivors on the Silver Hazel wreck. The wreck victims, marooned on

a small rock without food or water since Saturday when the British vessel struck a reef and broke in half, included three women. While three vessels stood by helpless to aid because of the breakers, the three Hindus launched their craft.

It tossed like matchwood but escaped being smashed on the rocks.
